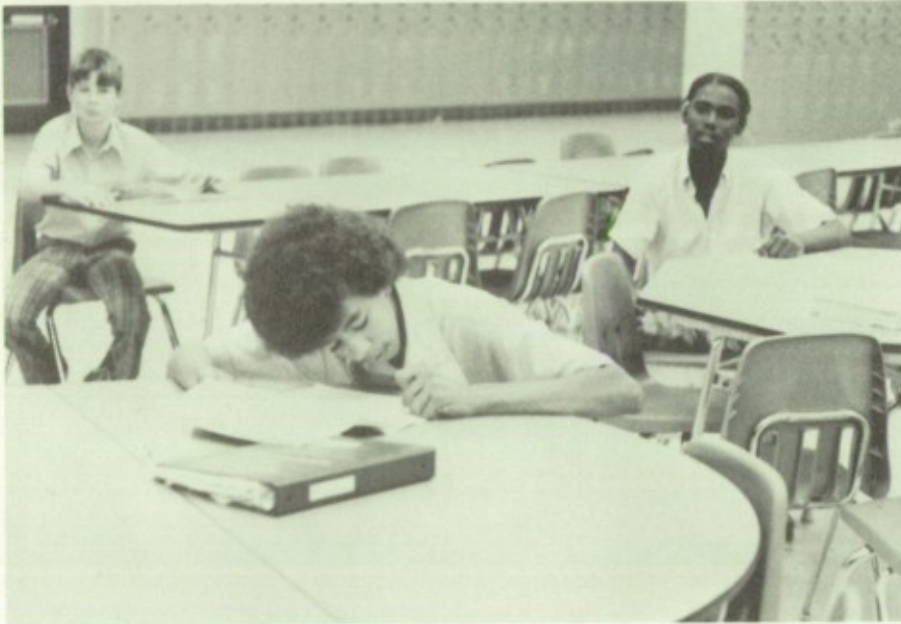

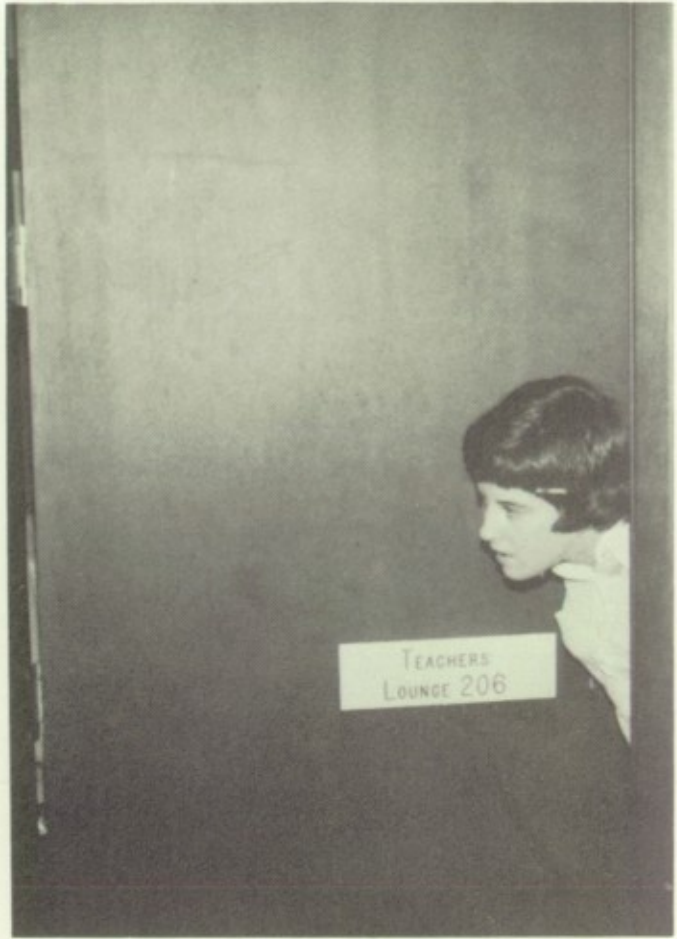

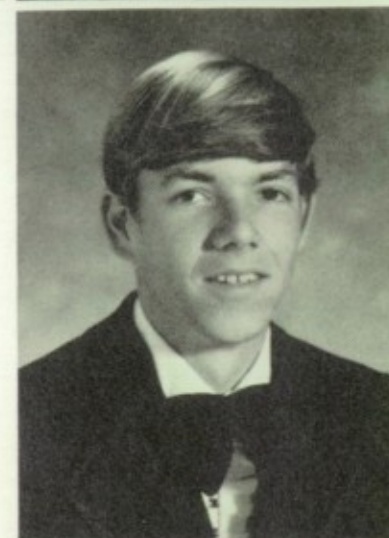

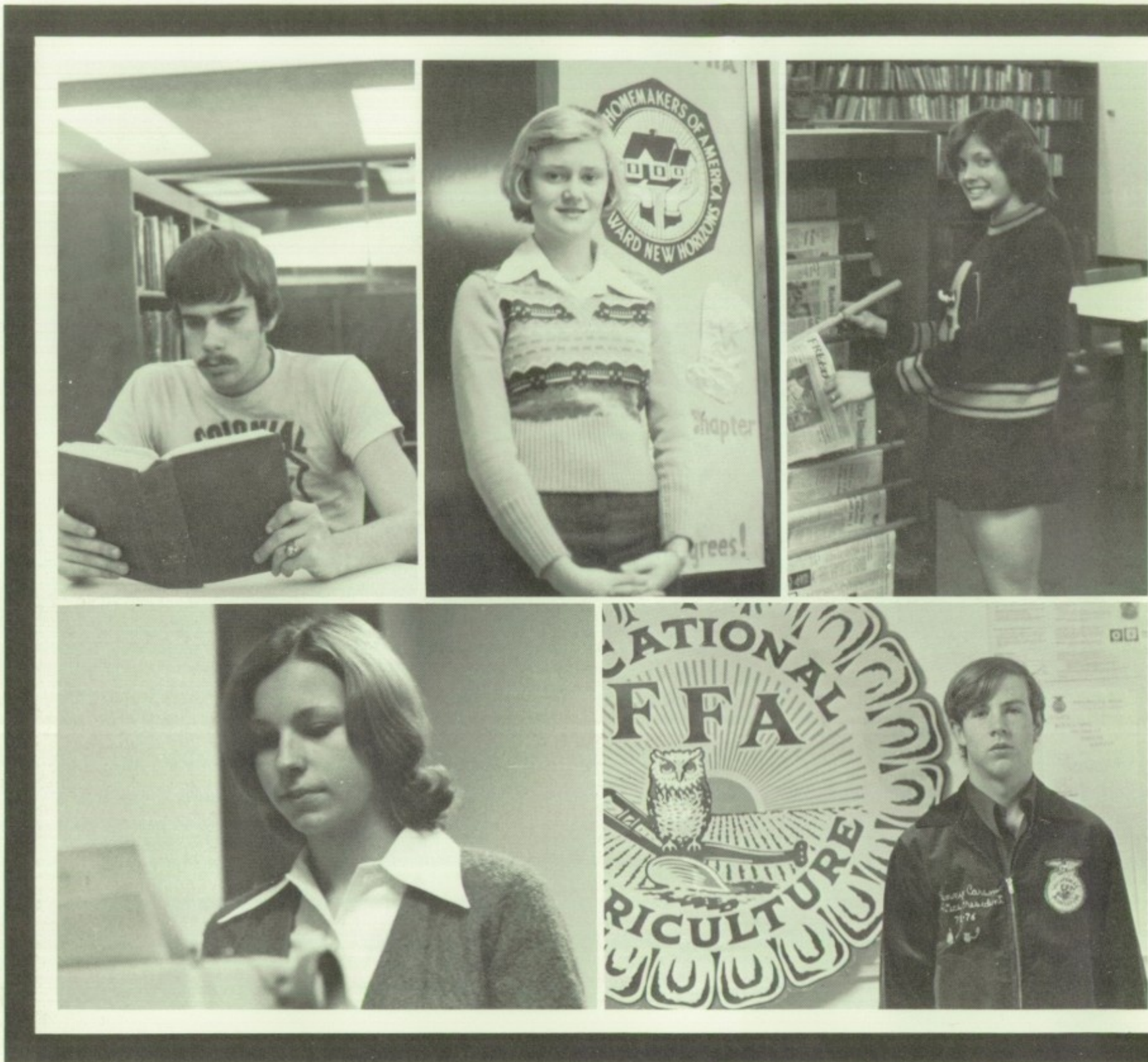

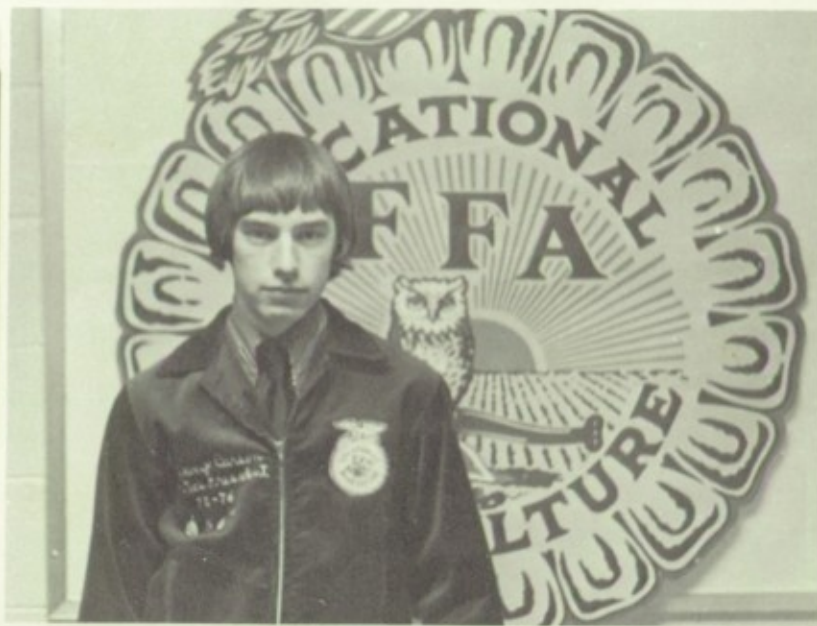

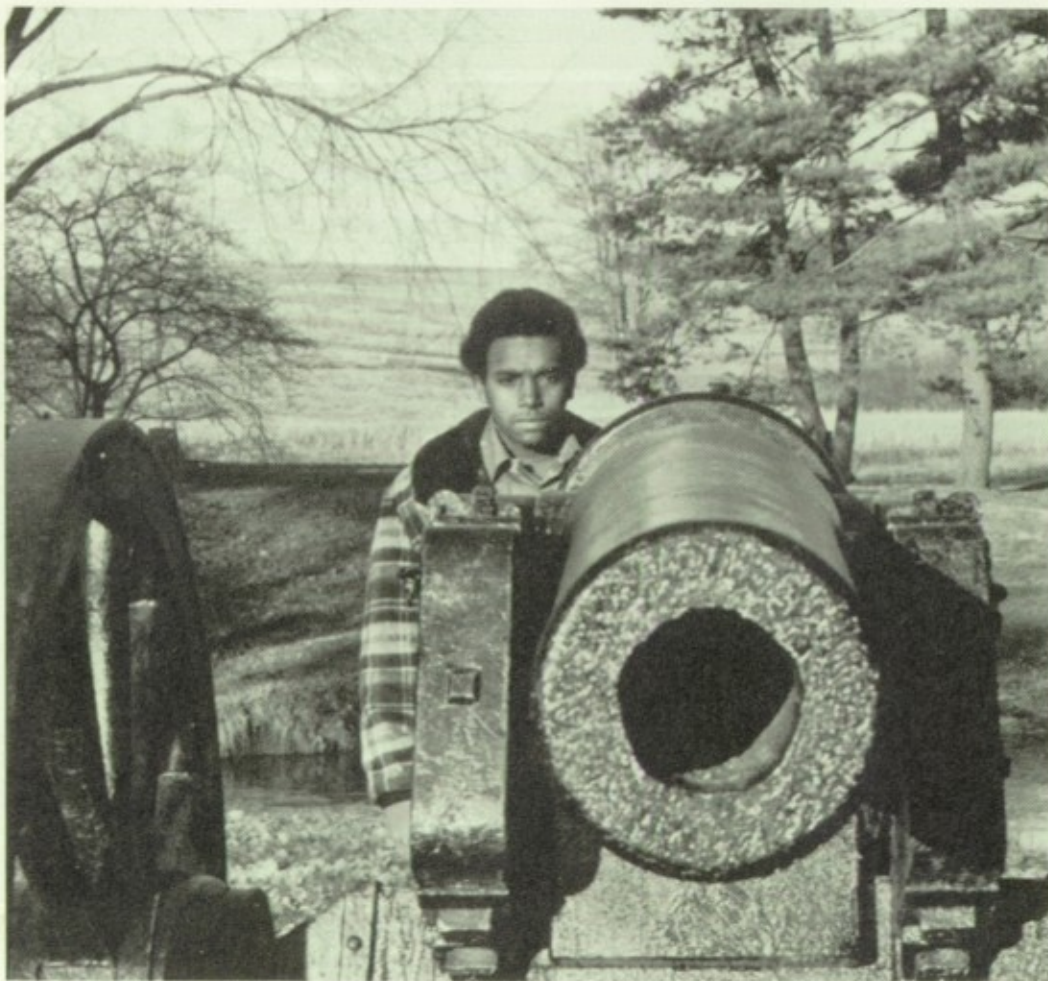

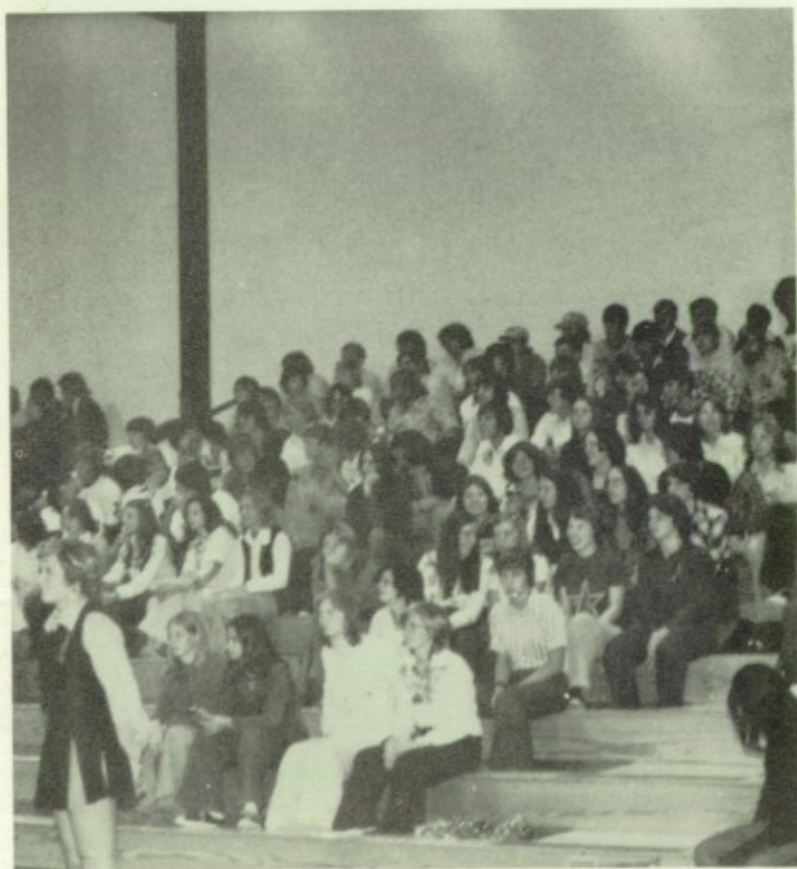

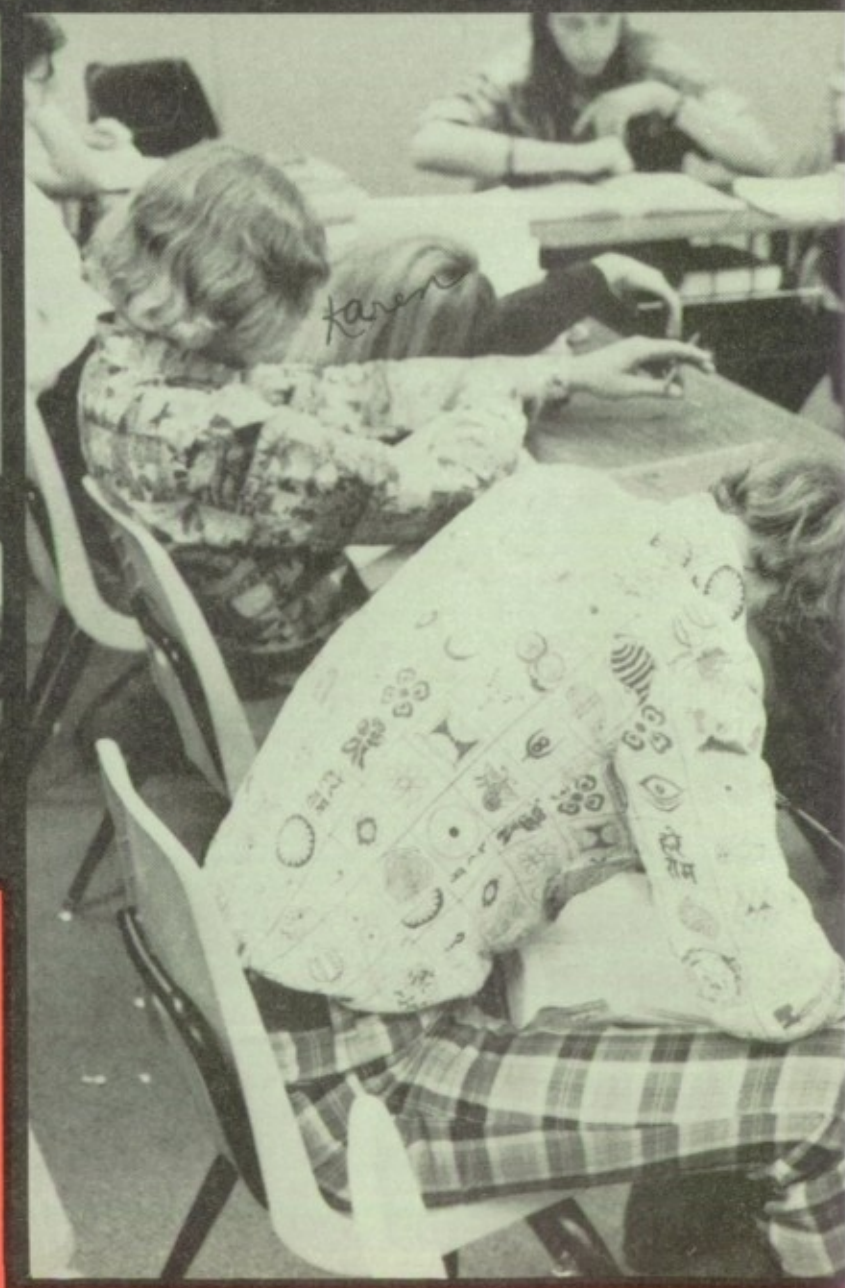
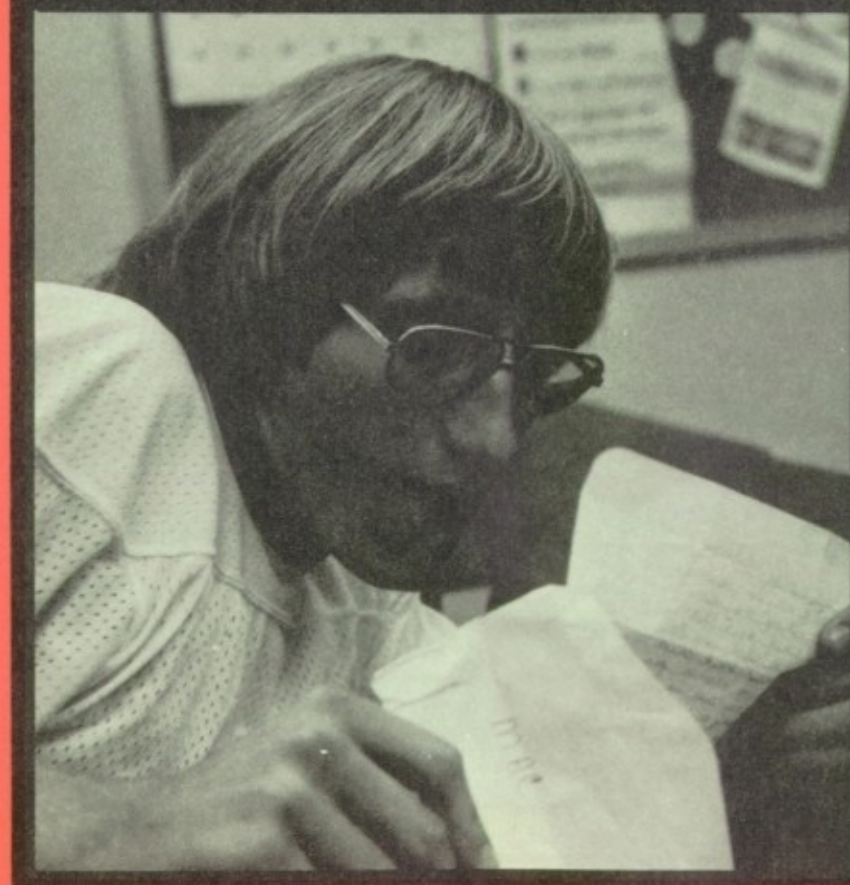
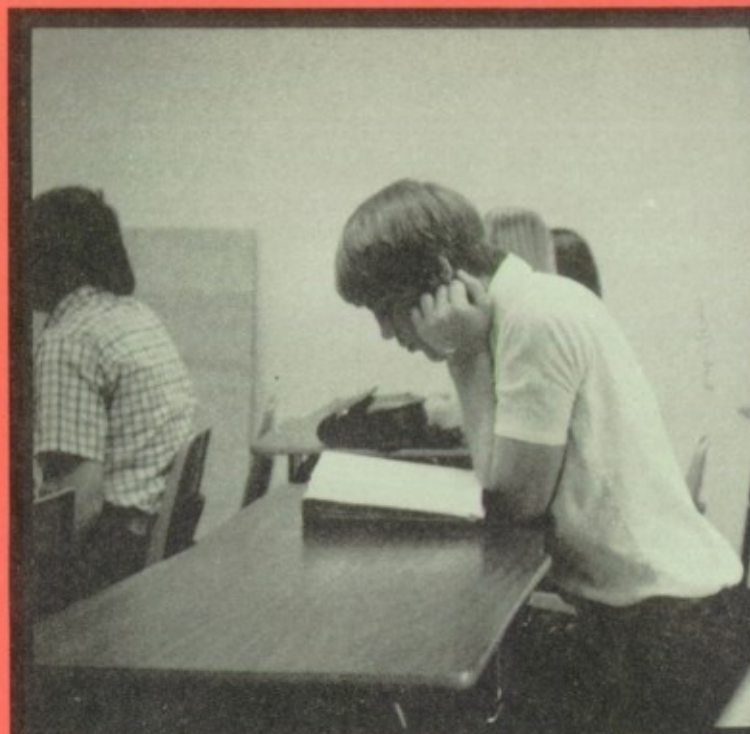
The evening was rounded off with a dance in the cafeteria. The students danced and enjoyed the music of "The Soul Brothers Plus". Homecoming '75 was a big success!

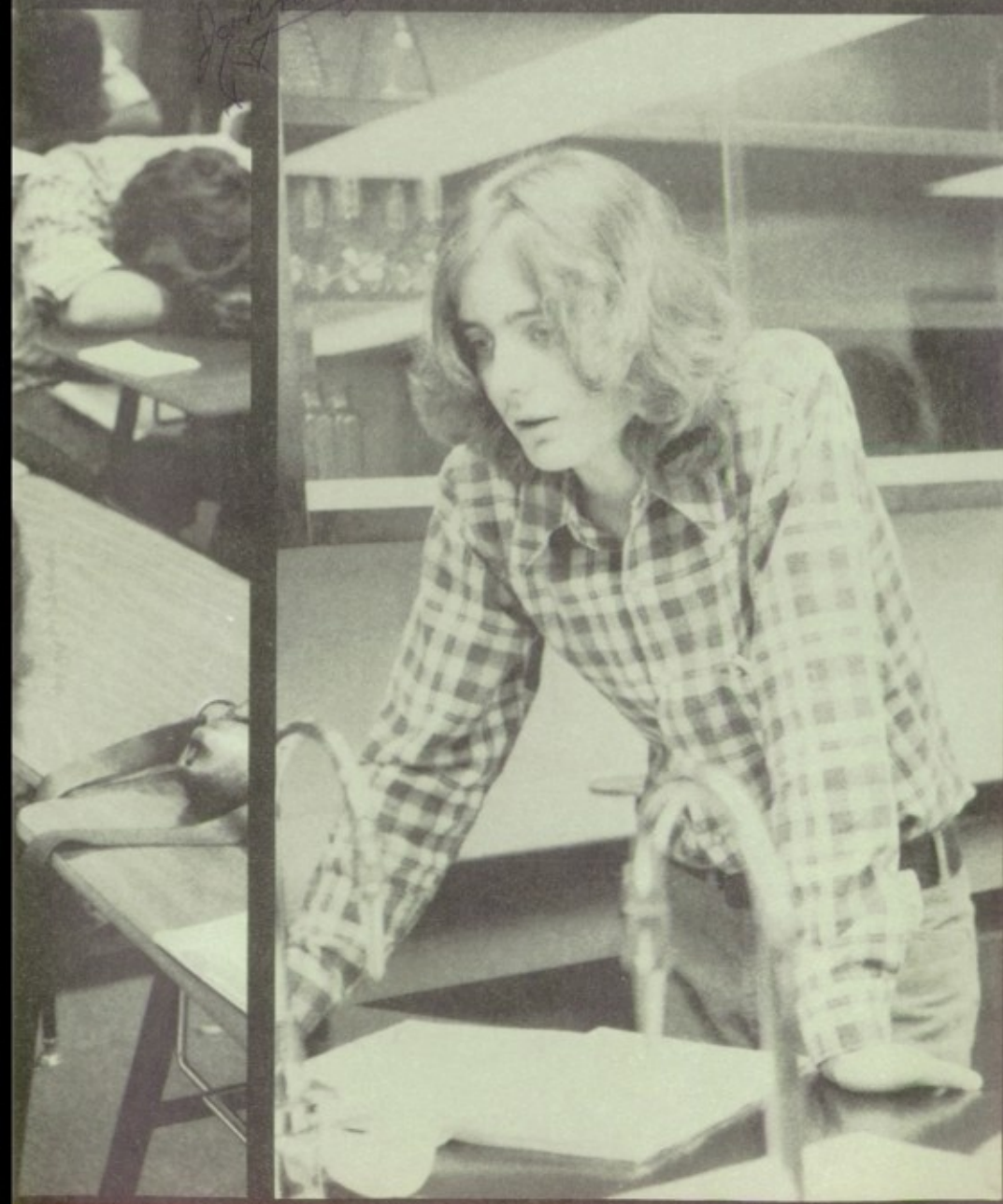

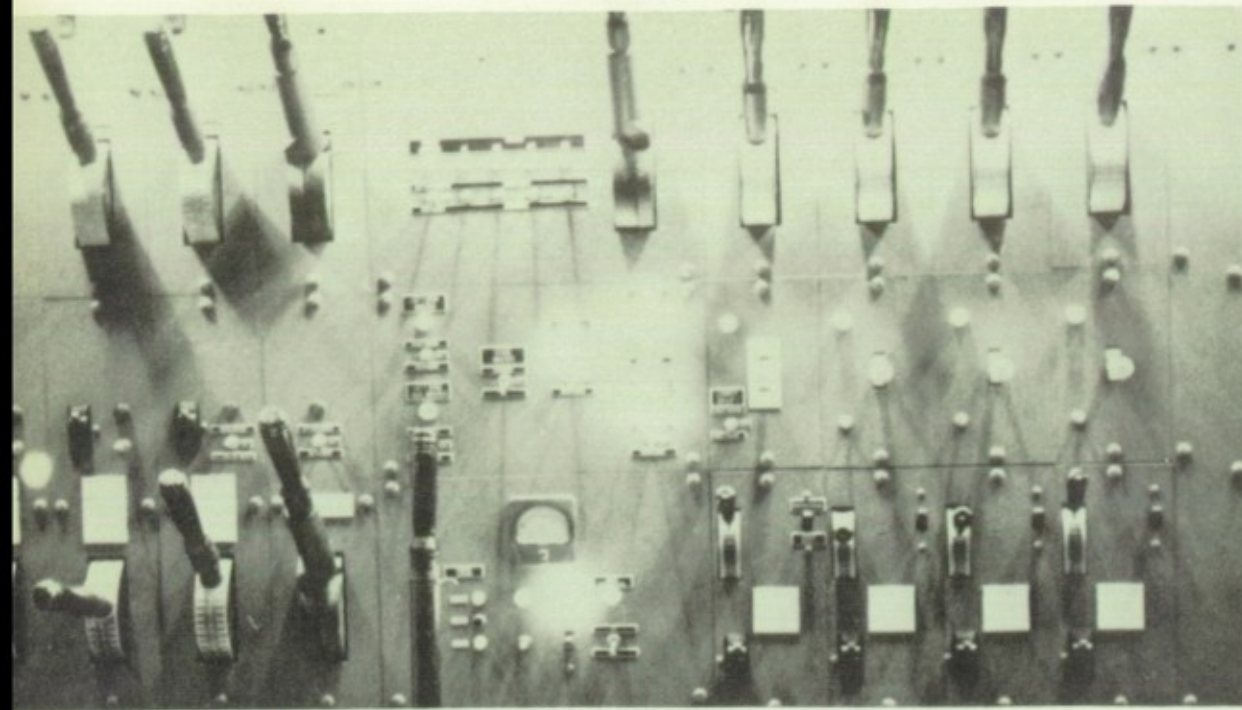

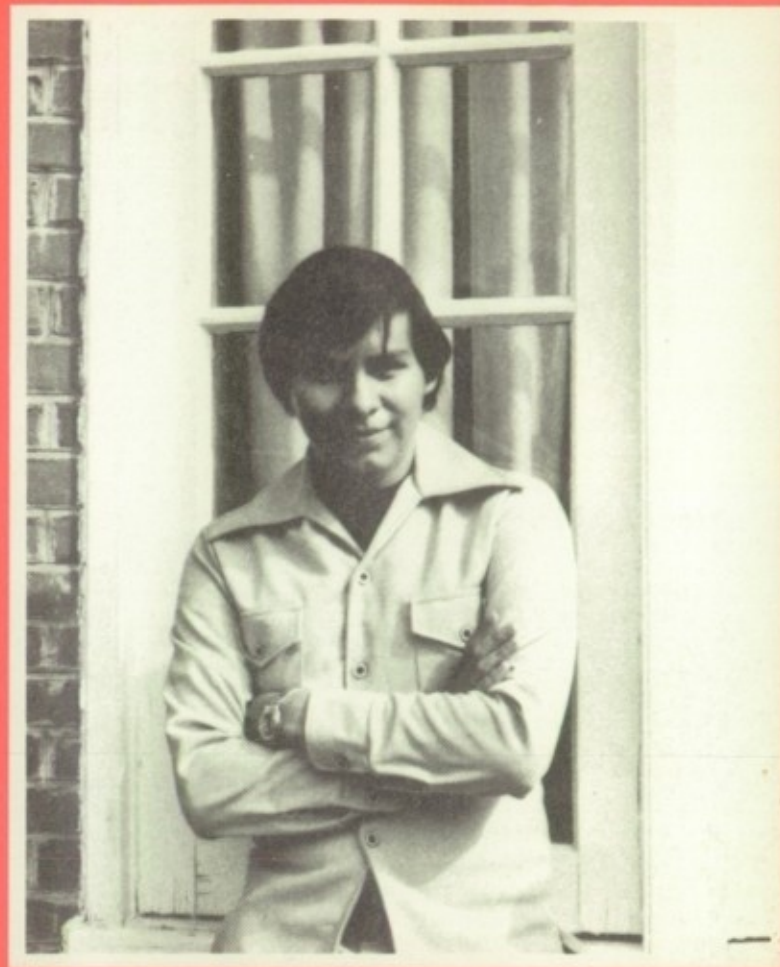

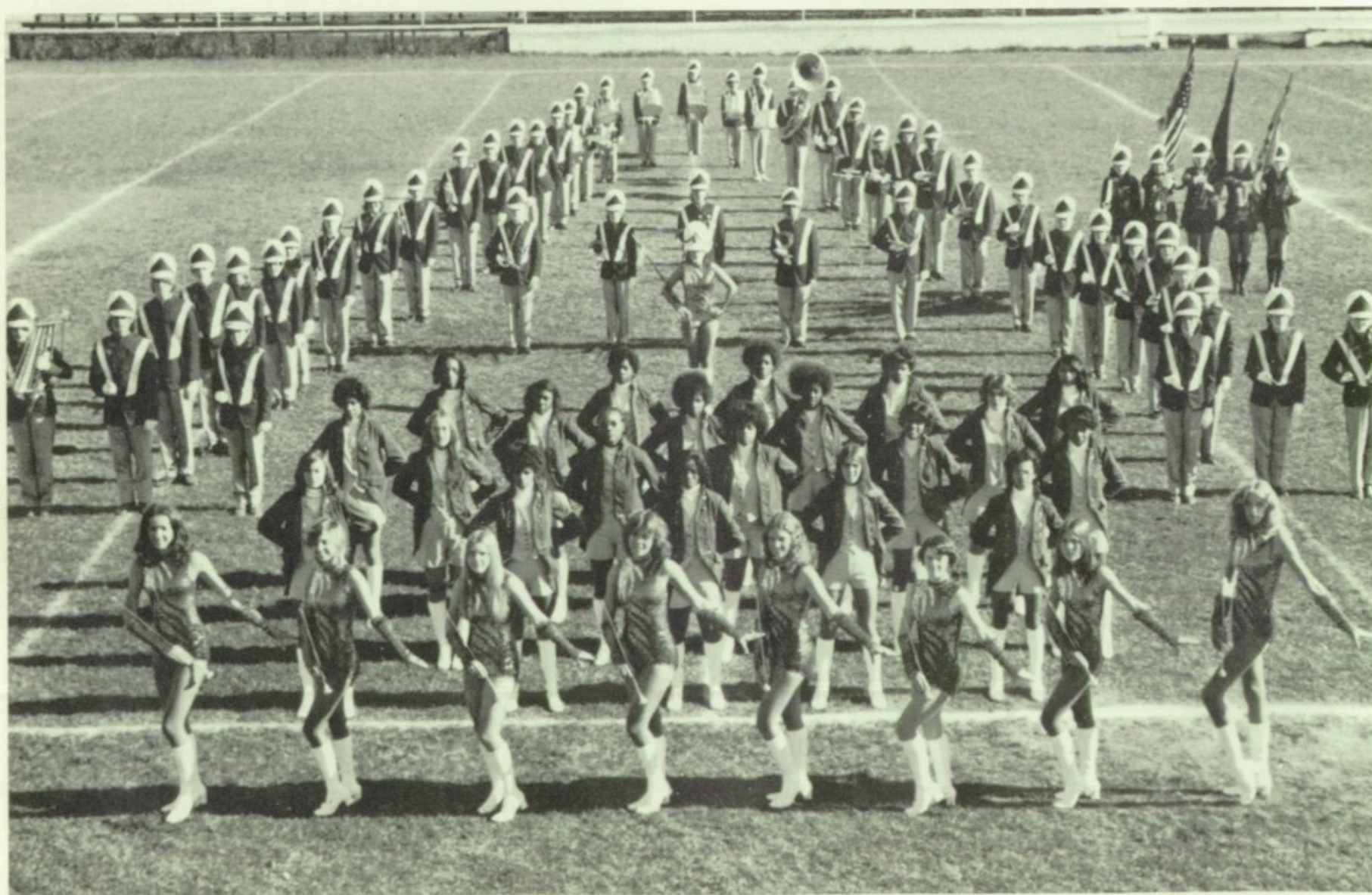

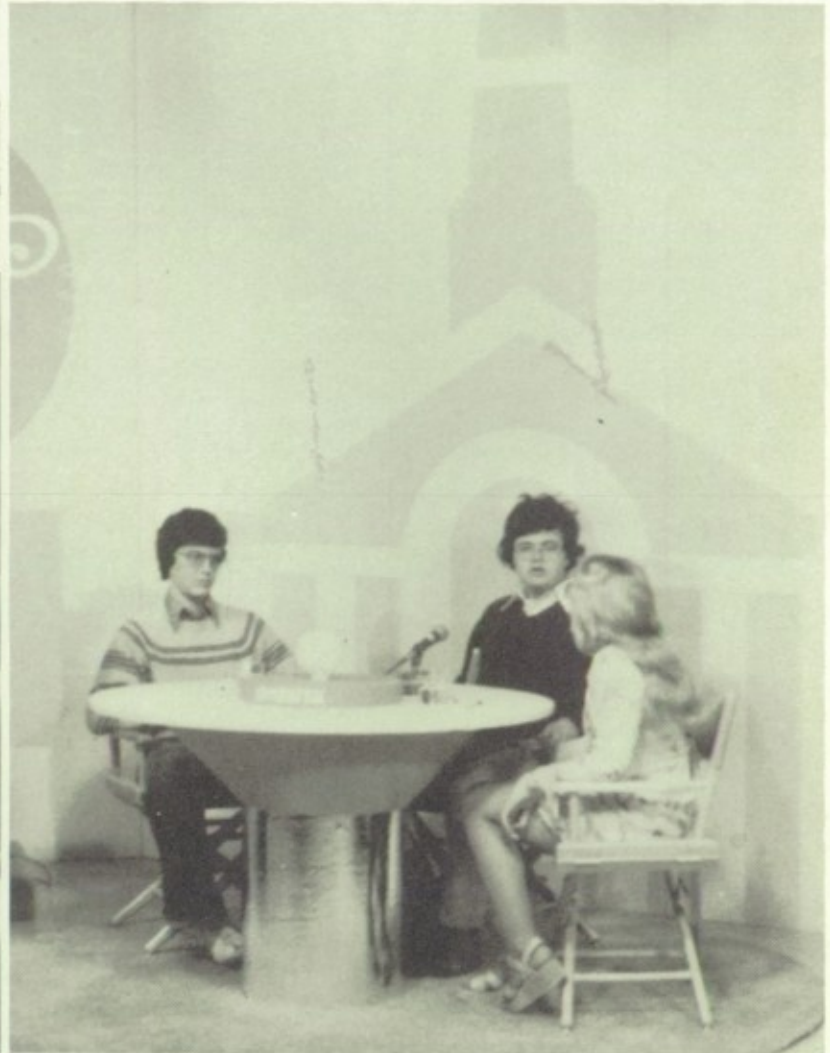

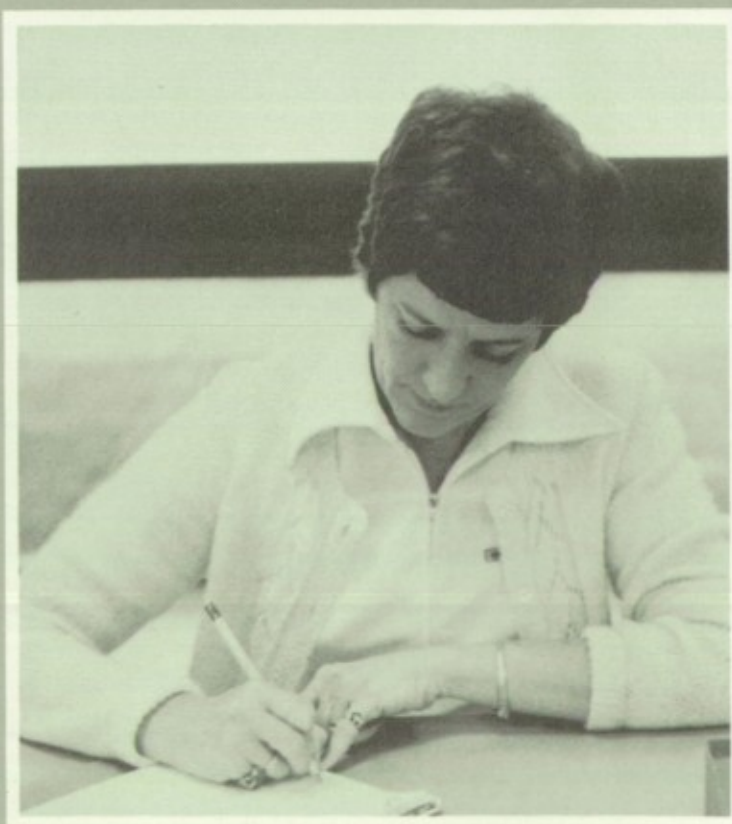

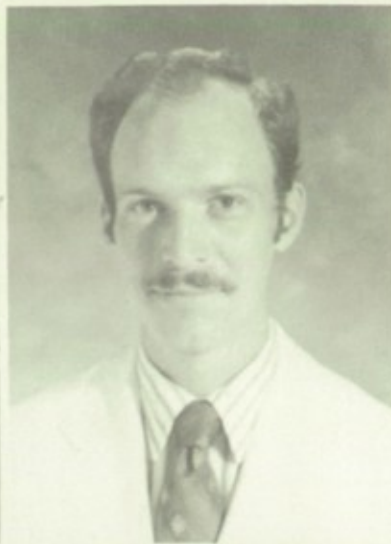

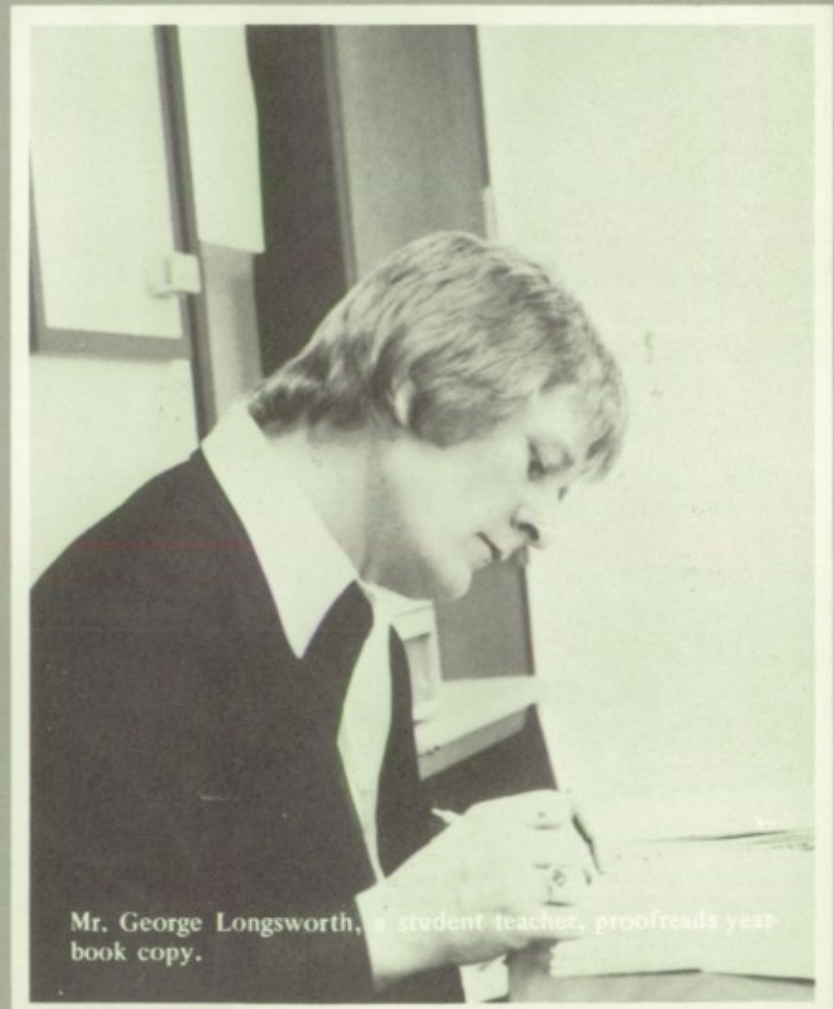
TEACHERS, STUDENTS, AND STUDENT TEACHERS ALL WORKING TOGETHER

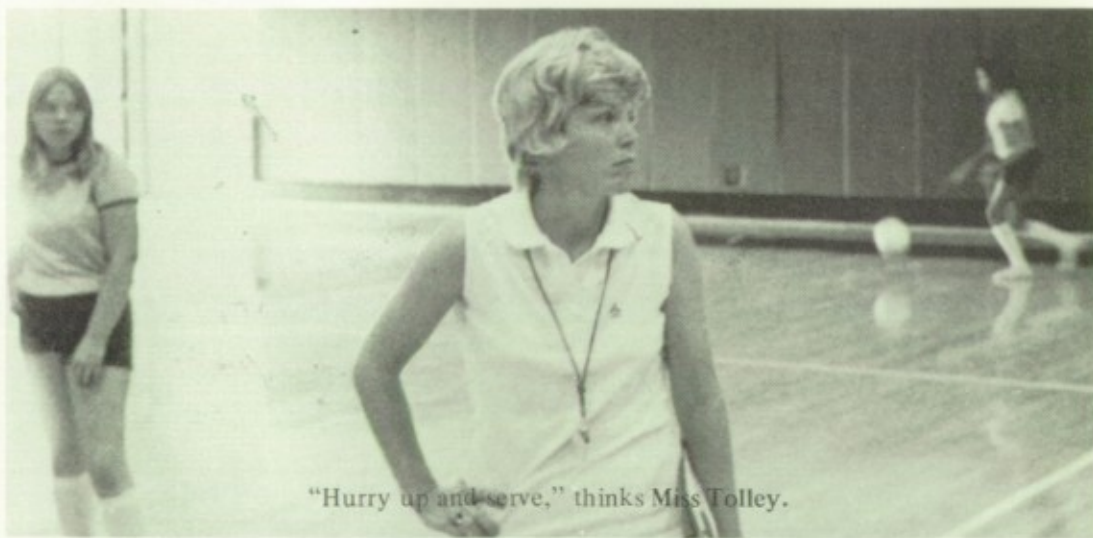
OUR FACULTY, WORKING HARD

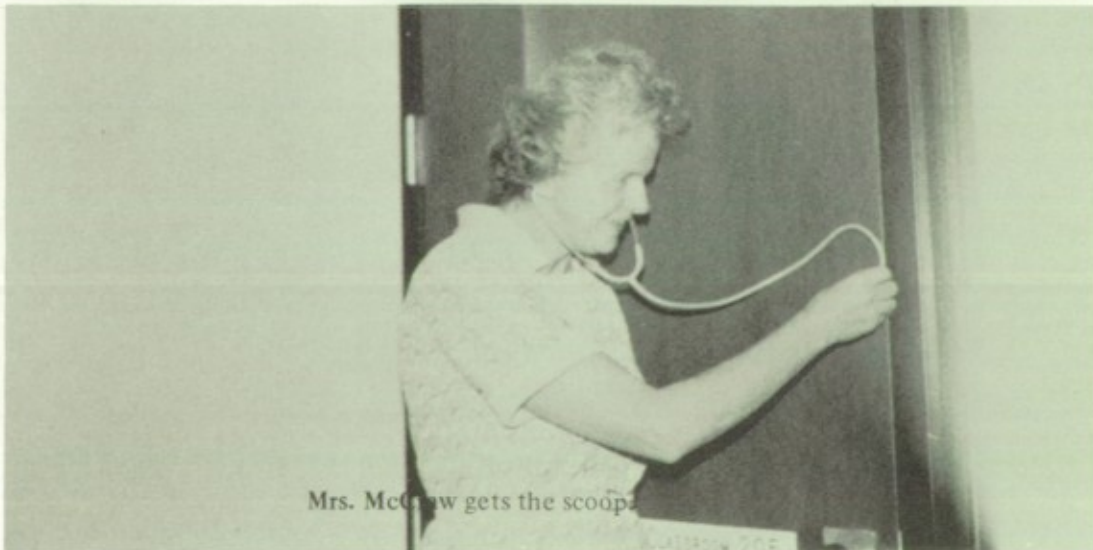

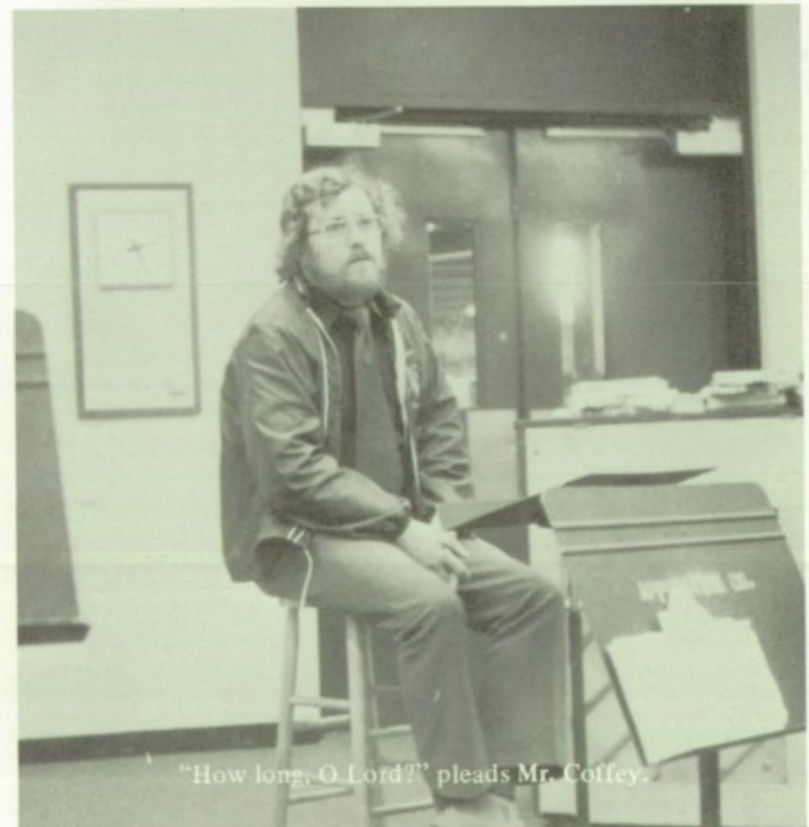

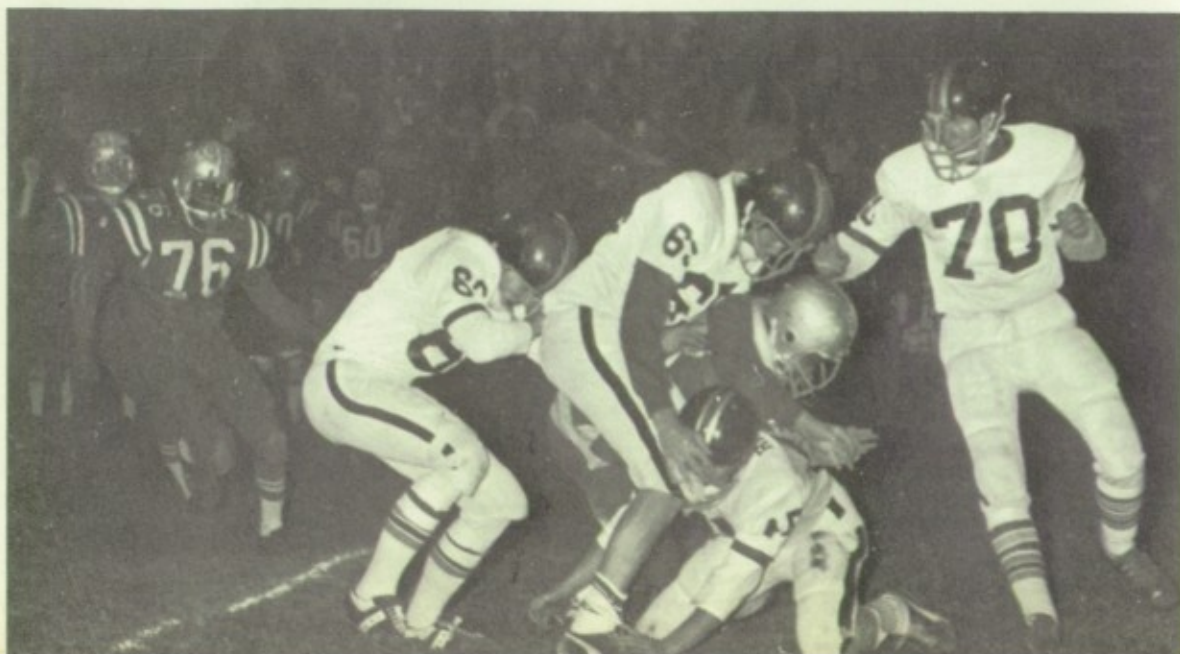

The Appomattox fans awaited a come back of the Raiders but saw the hope fade as Rustburg with 3:30 left in the fourth quarter scored from two yards out.

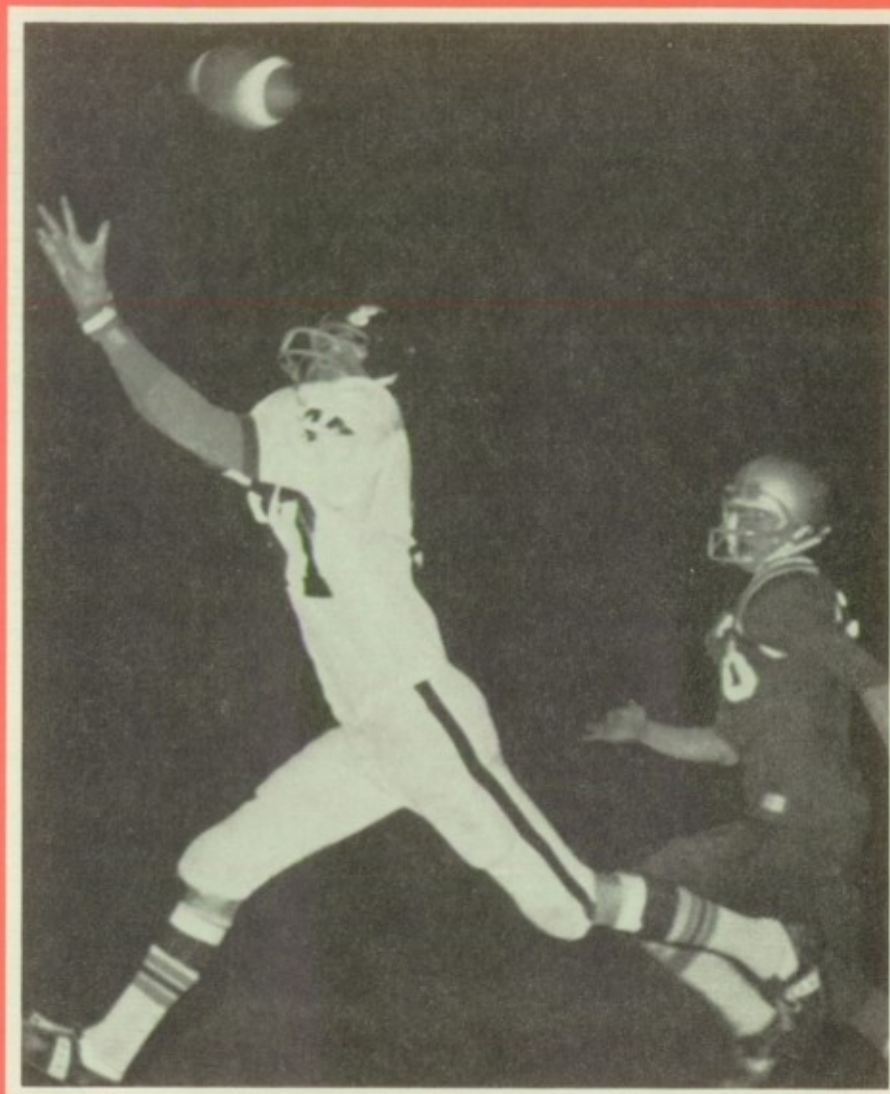
Appomattox with 34 seconds showing on the clock lost all hope of winning the game when the Devils scored their 3rd score on a 30 yard pass.

The girls received many superior ratings at a camp they attended during the summer.



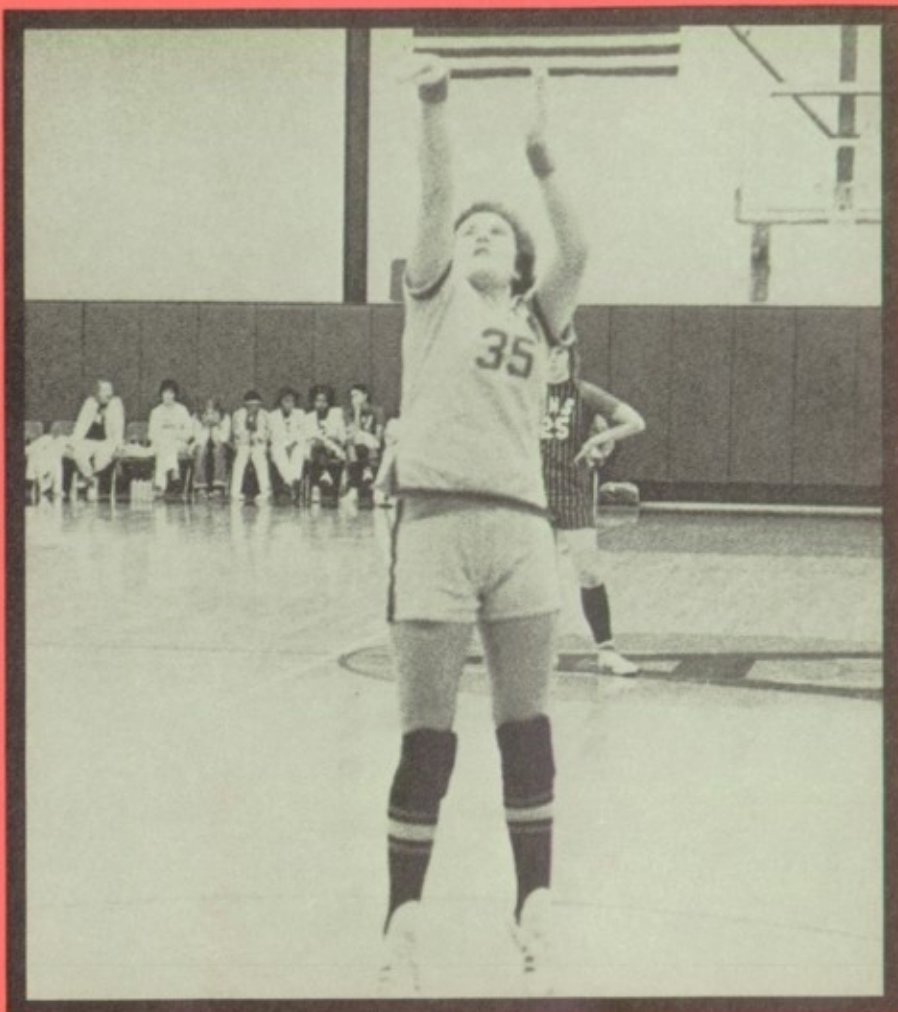

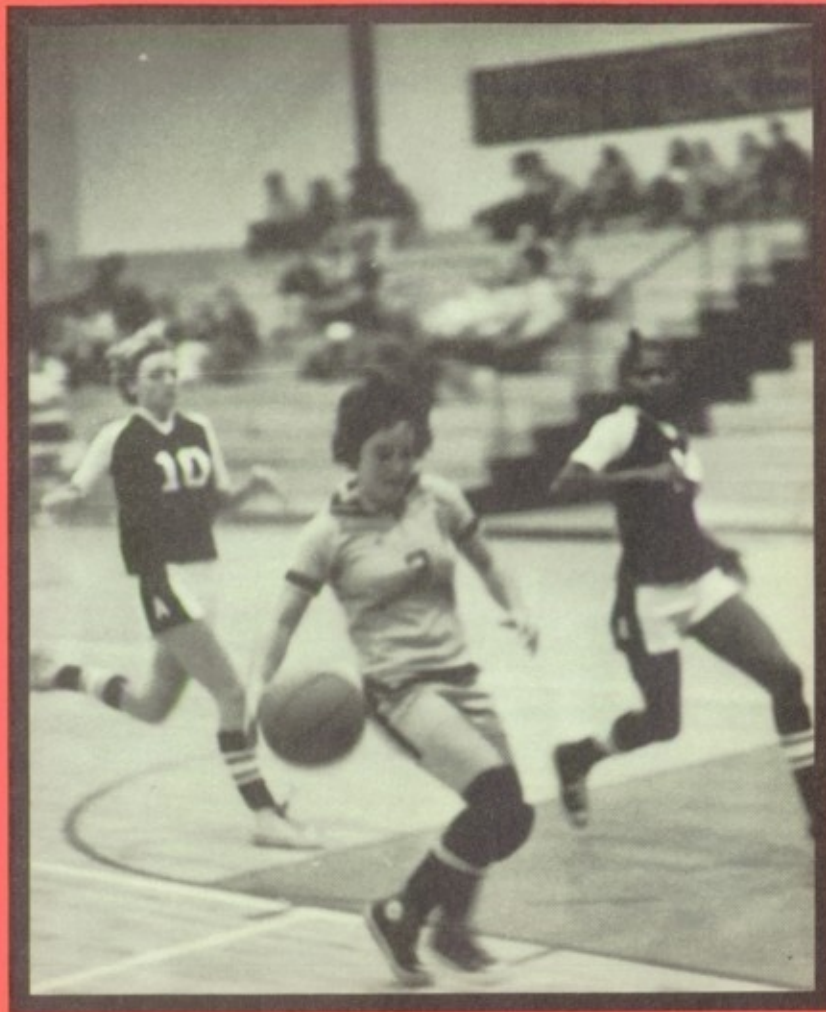

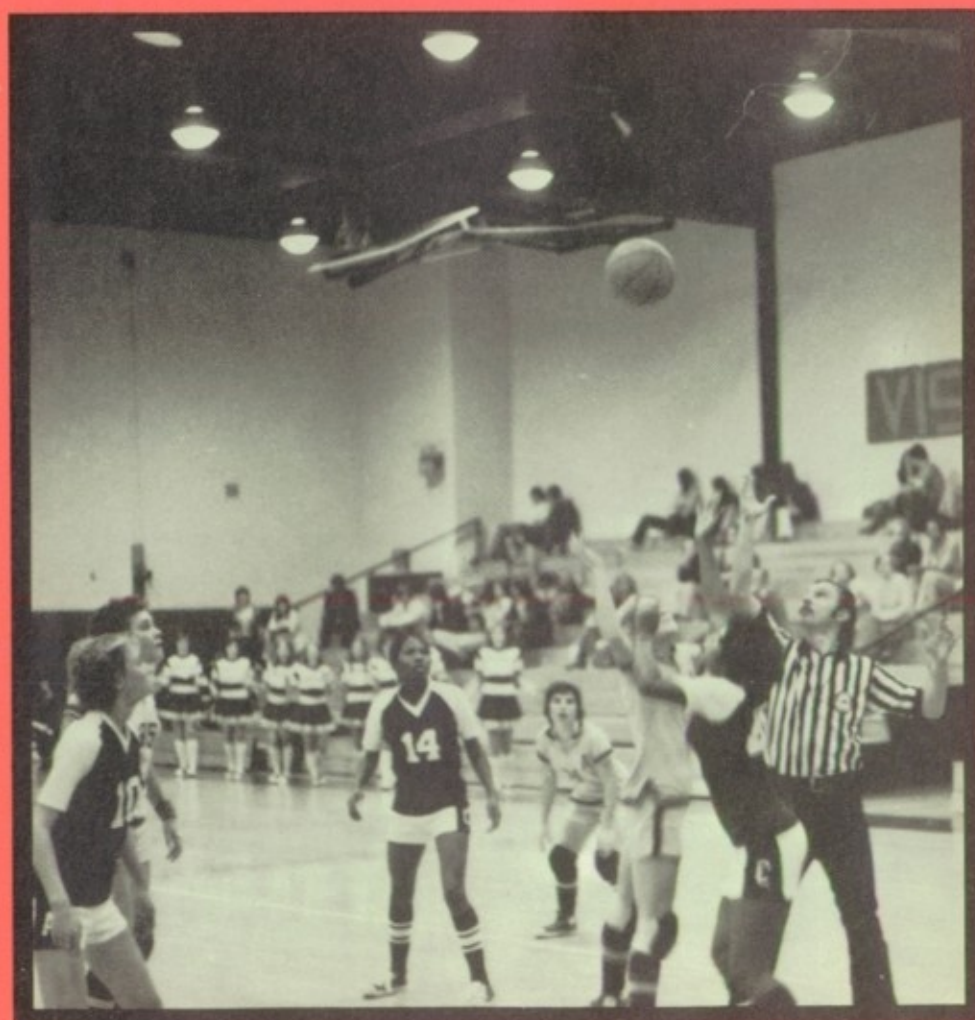


Maryjane Smith sinks a foul shot, breaking Leonda Hudson's district record with 1,129 points.

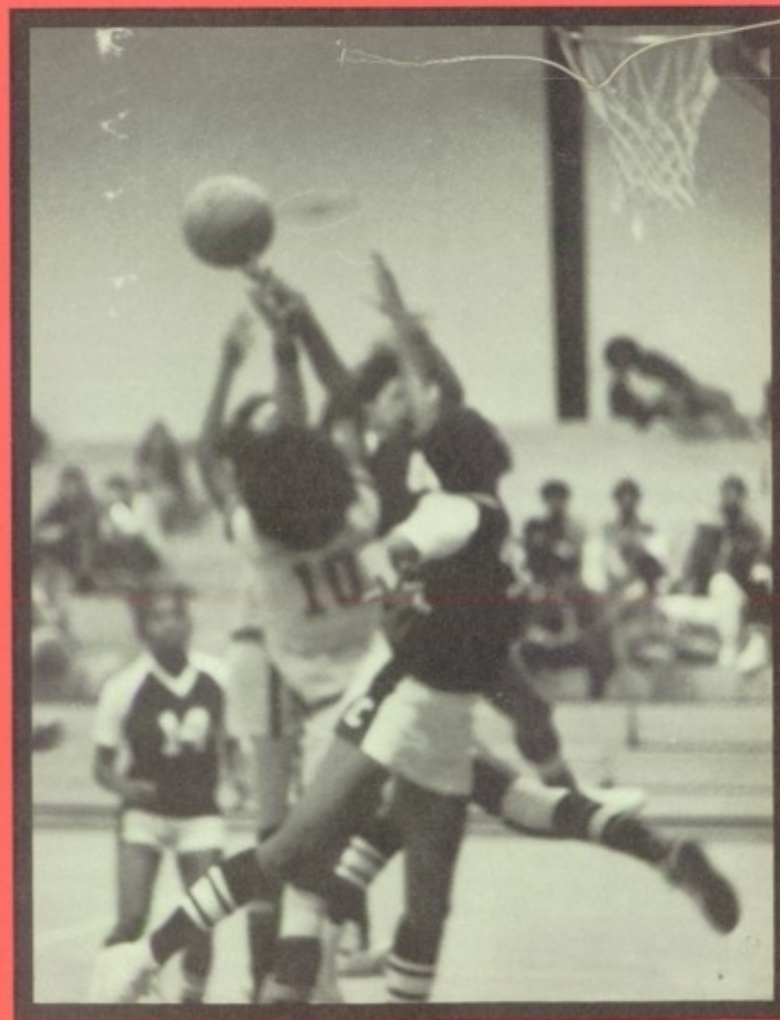


On a fast break, Cindy beats two Amherst girls down the court.

... were the keys for the Raiders' past season.

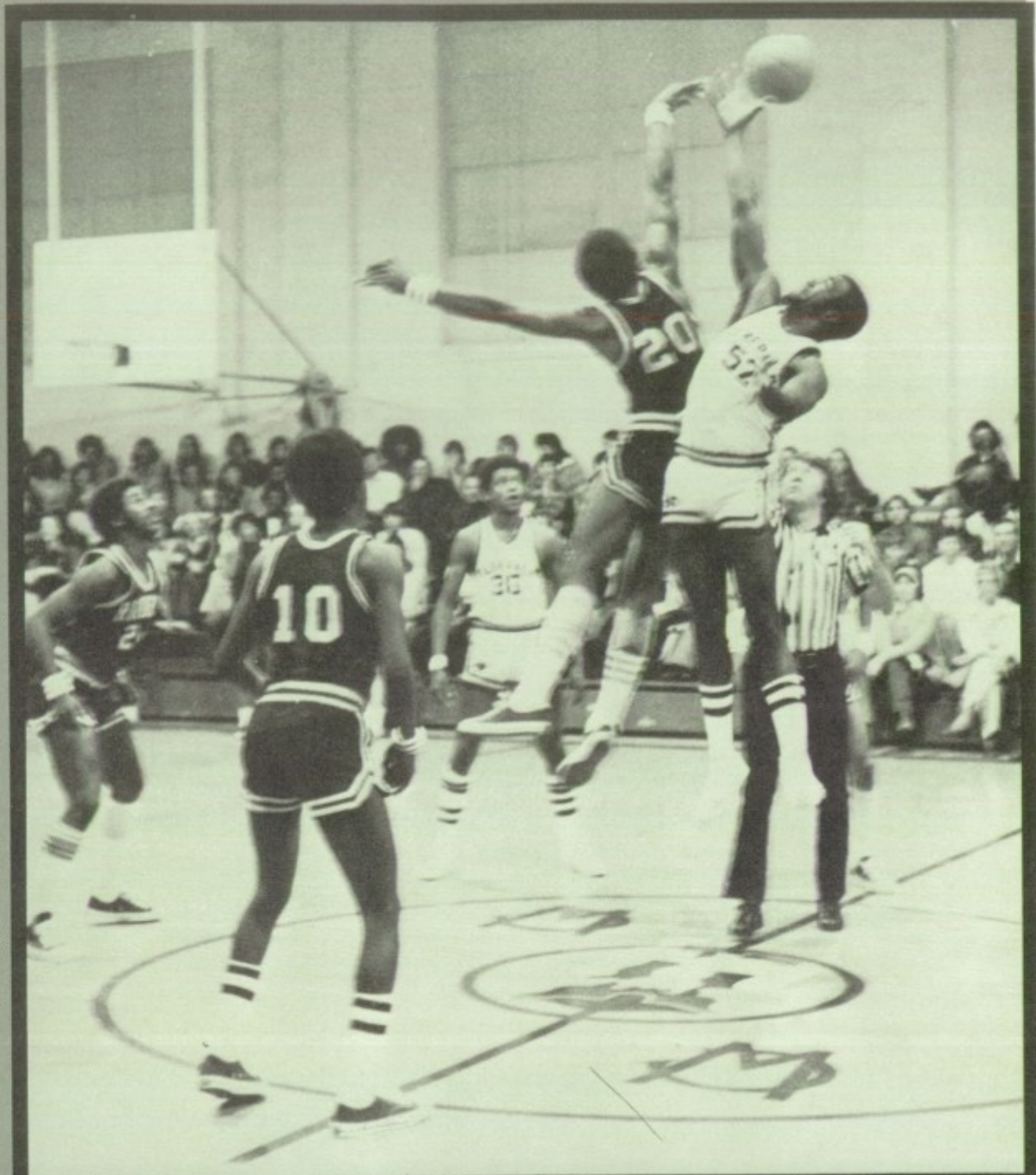

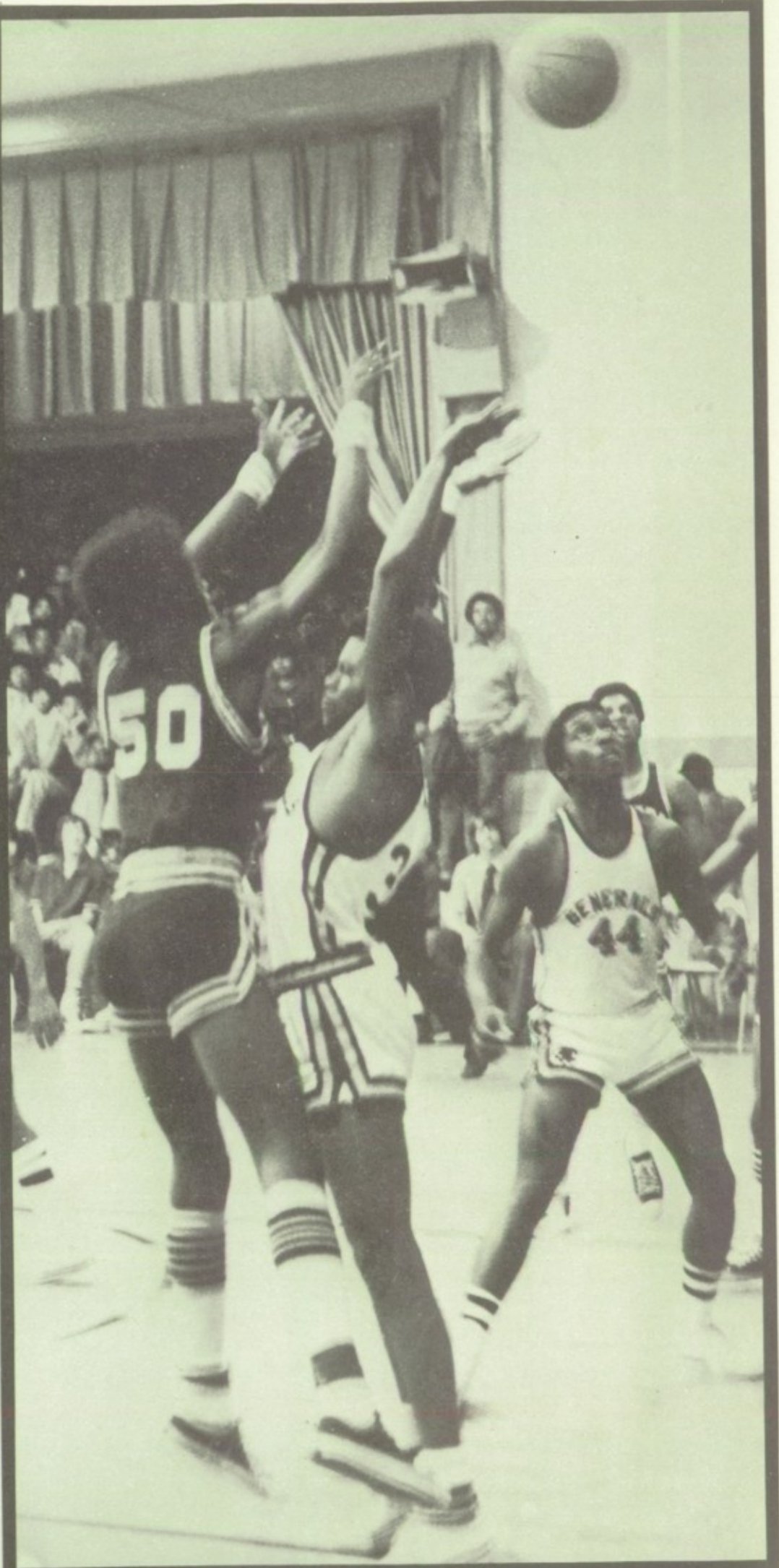
Homer Dillard, a newcomer to the varsity team, and Bill Shorter added depth to Raiders with talent and desire.

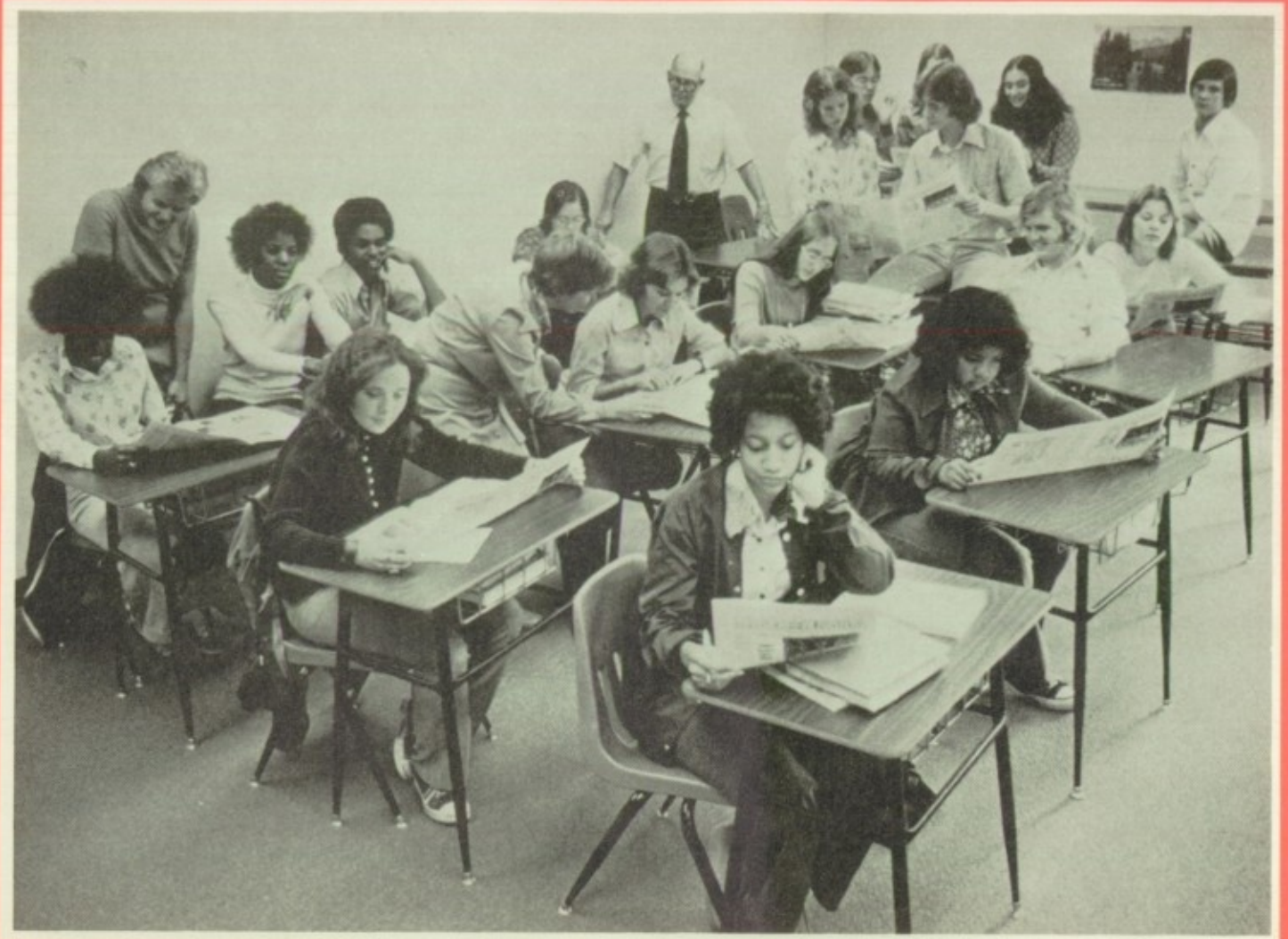
