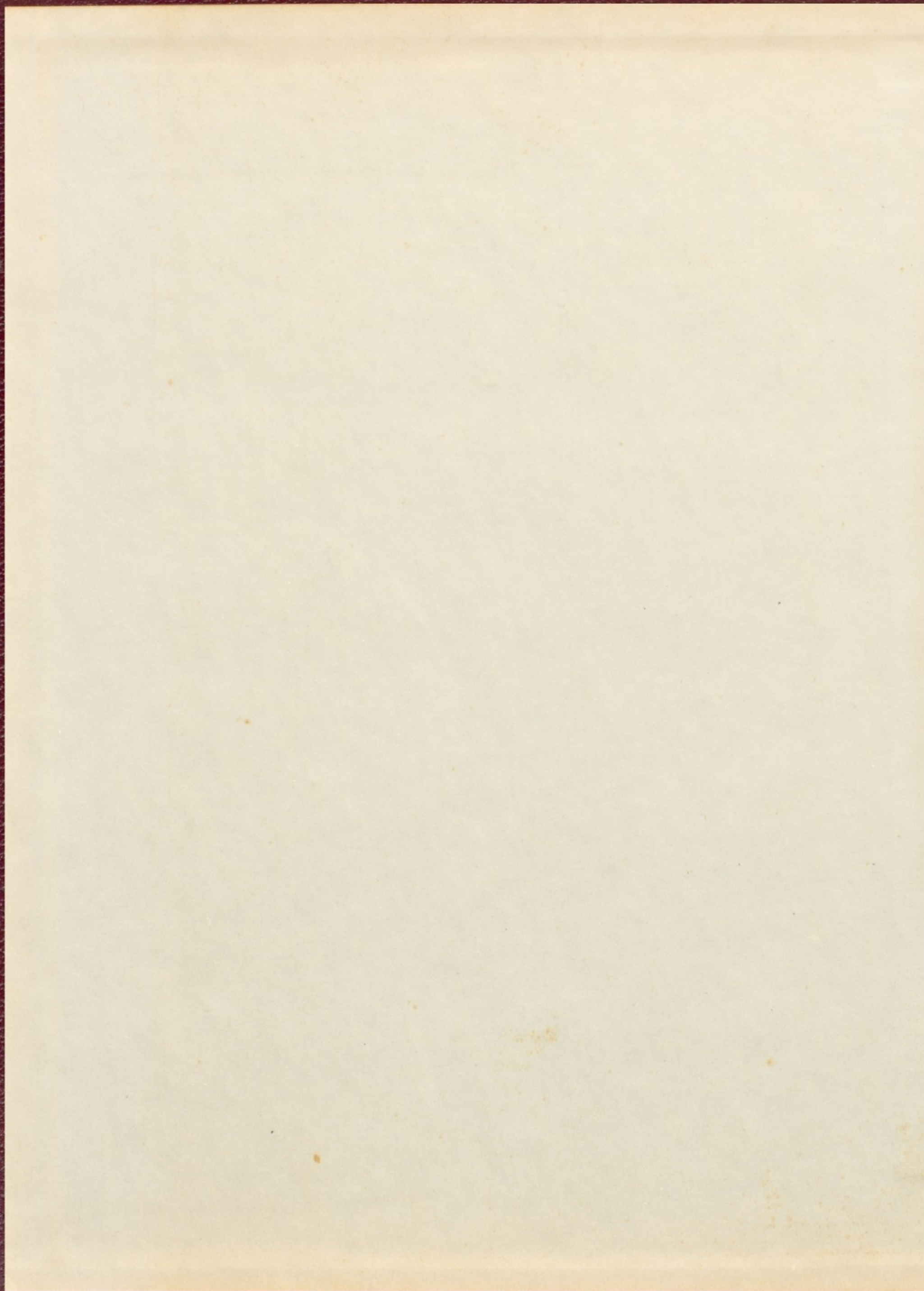
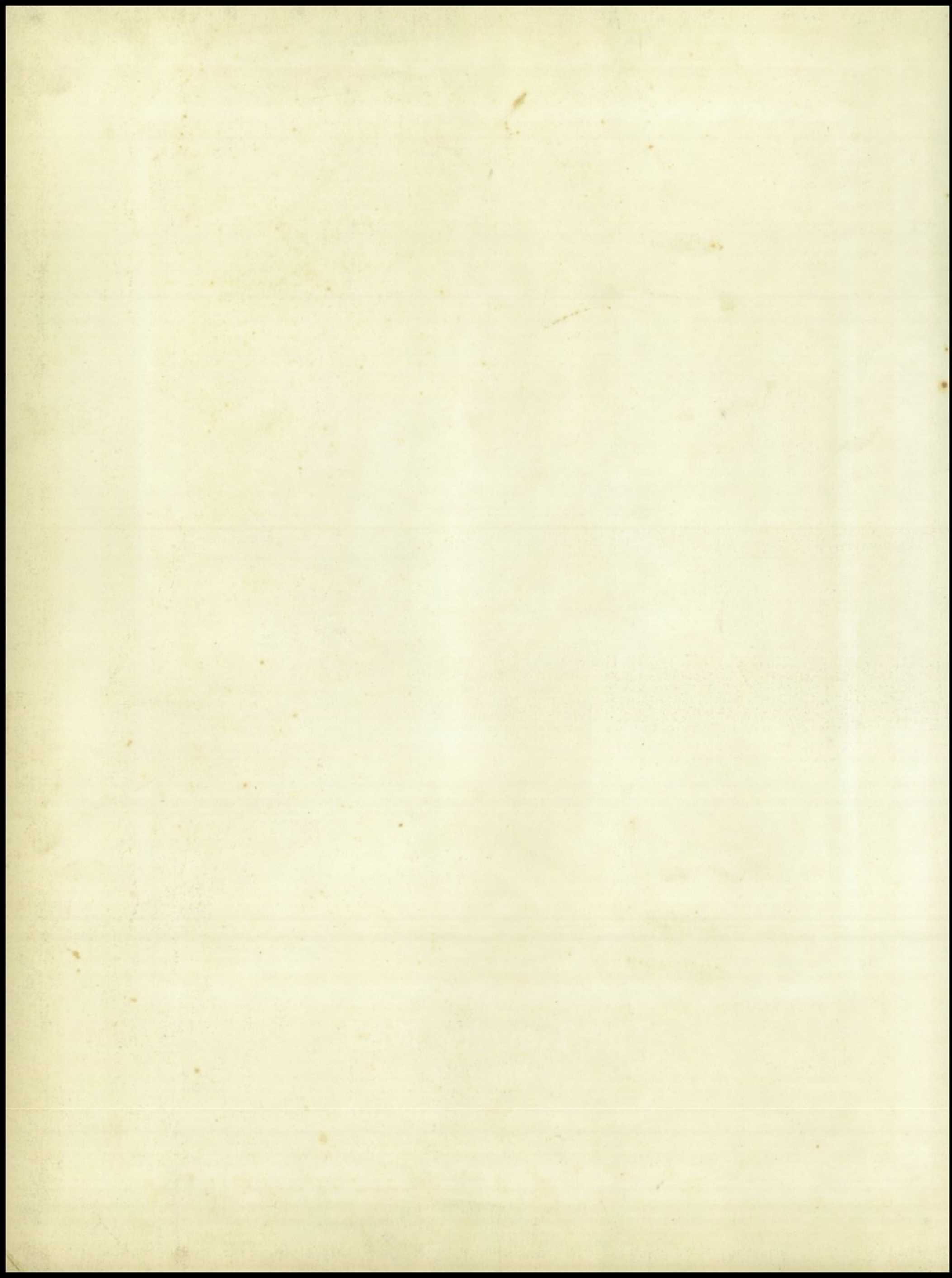

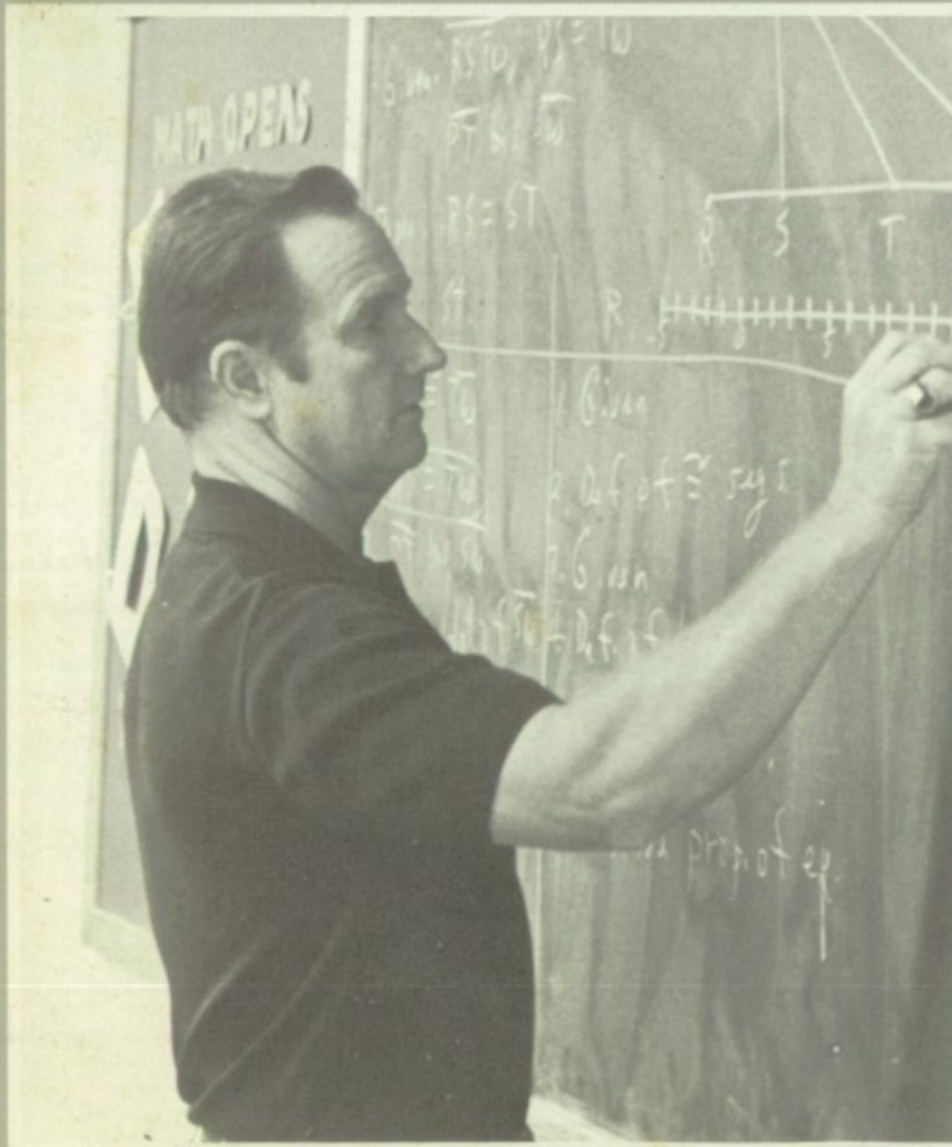
For these reasons and many more, the Traveler staff wishes to dedicate this year's annual to **Mr. John Hudson**, a truly dedicated teacher.



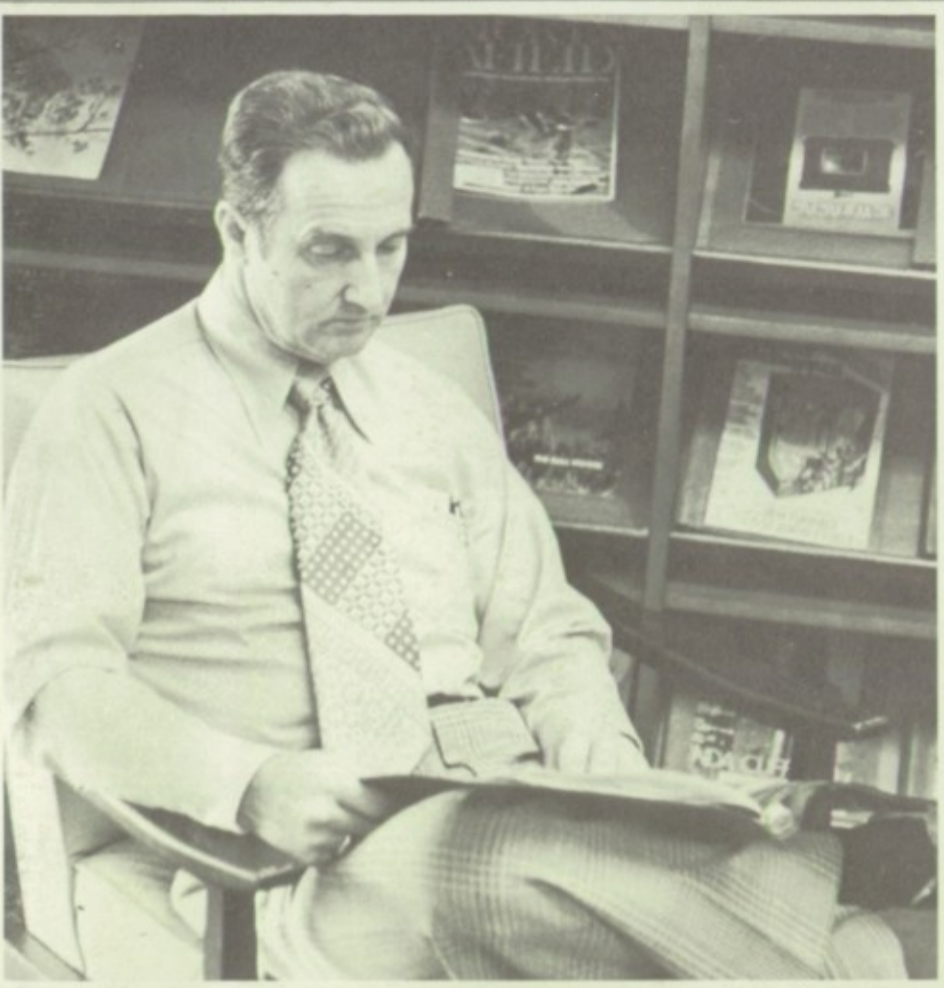

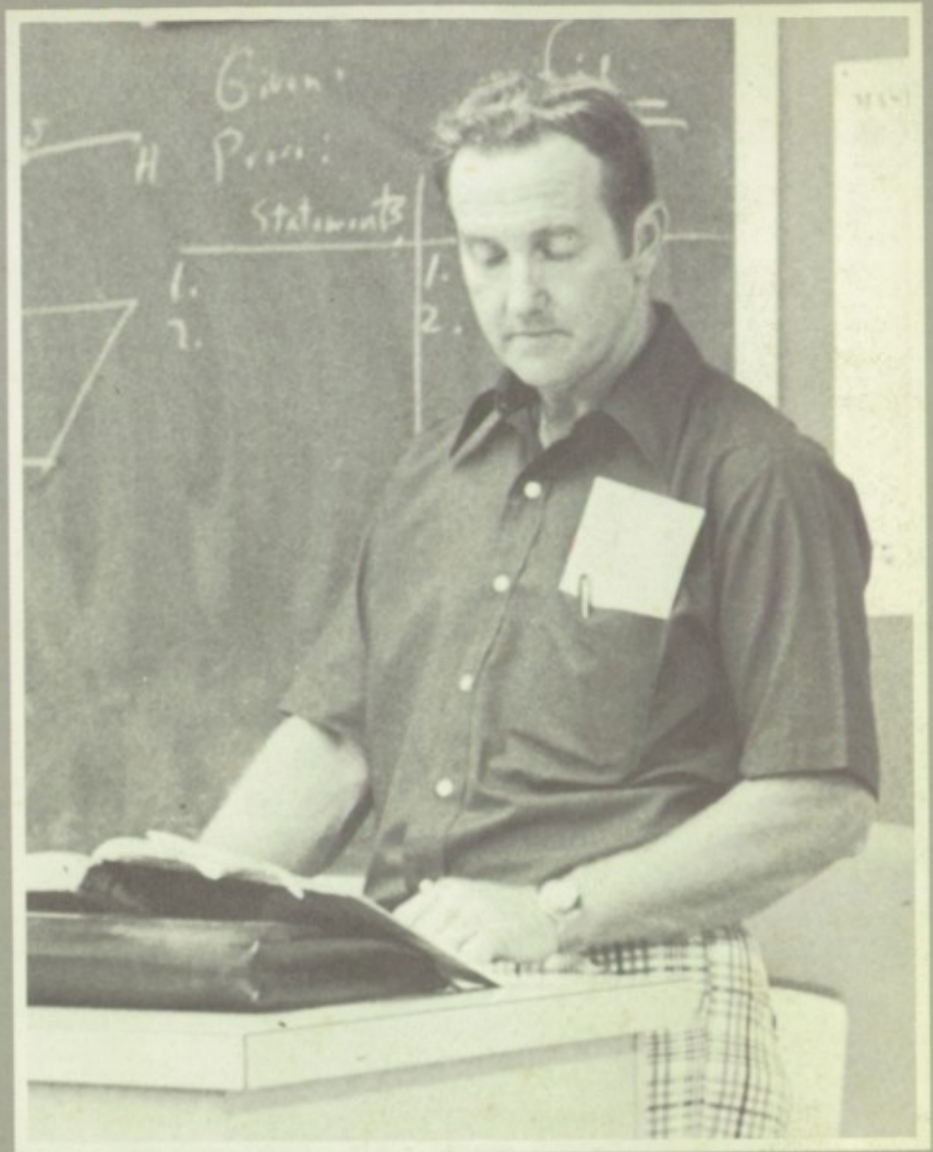

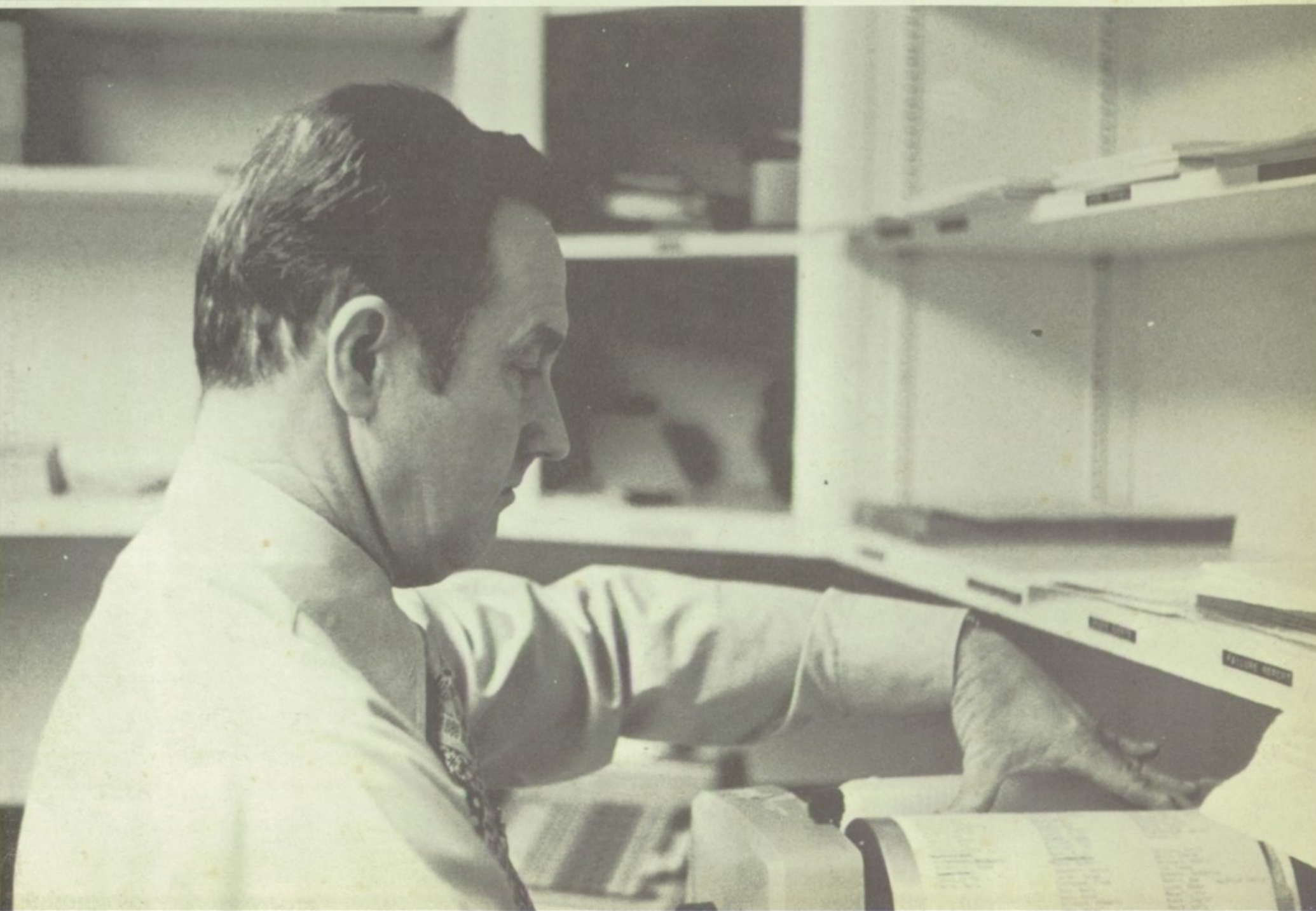

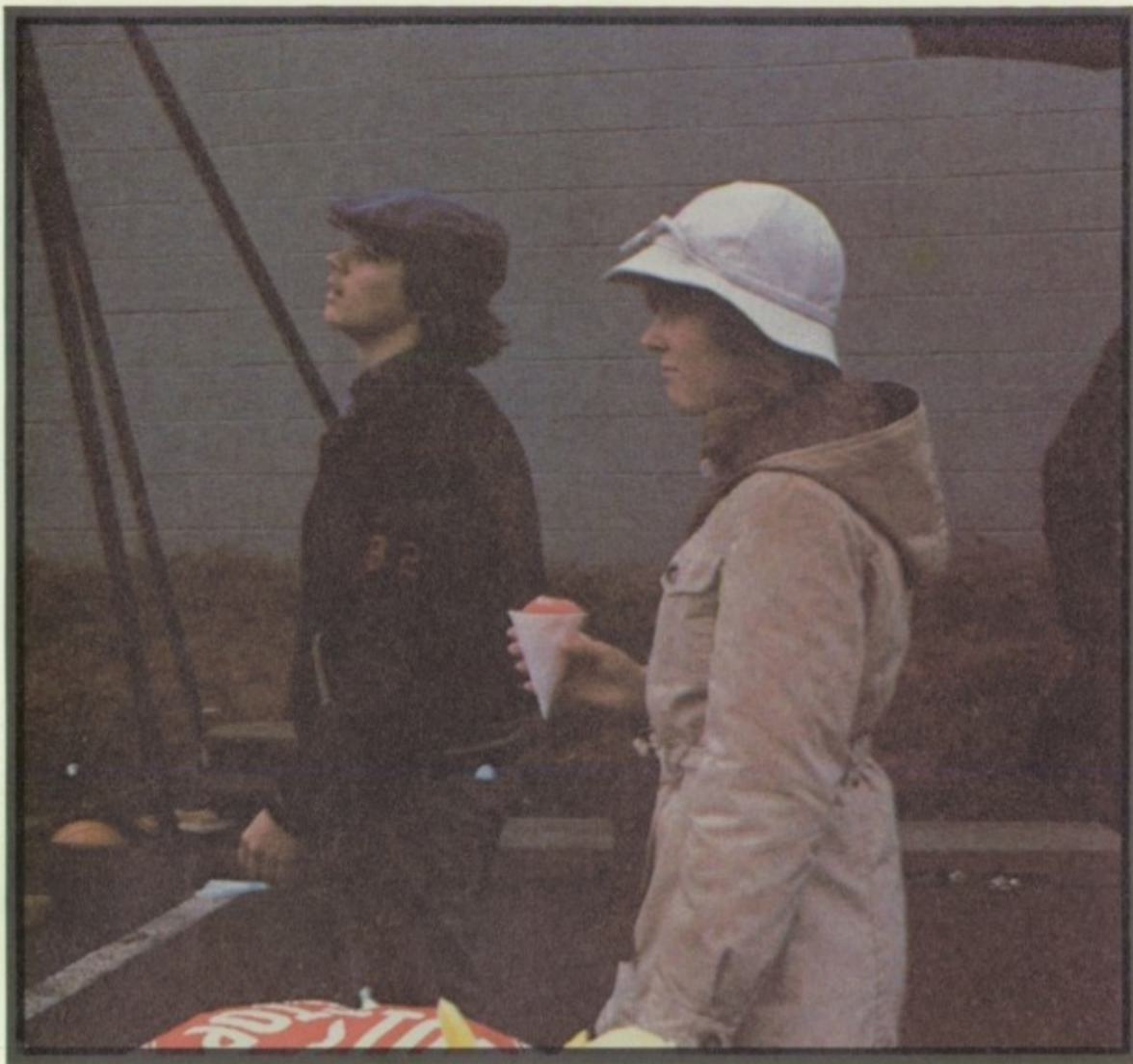

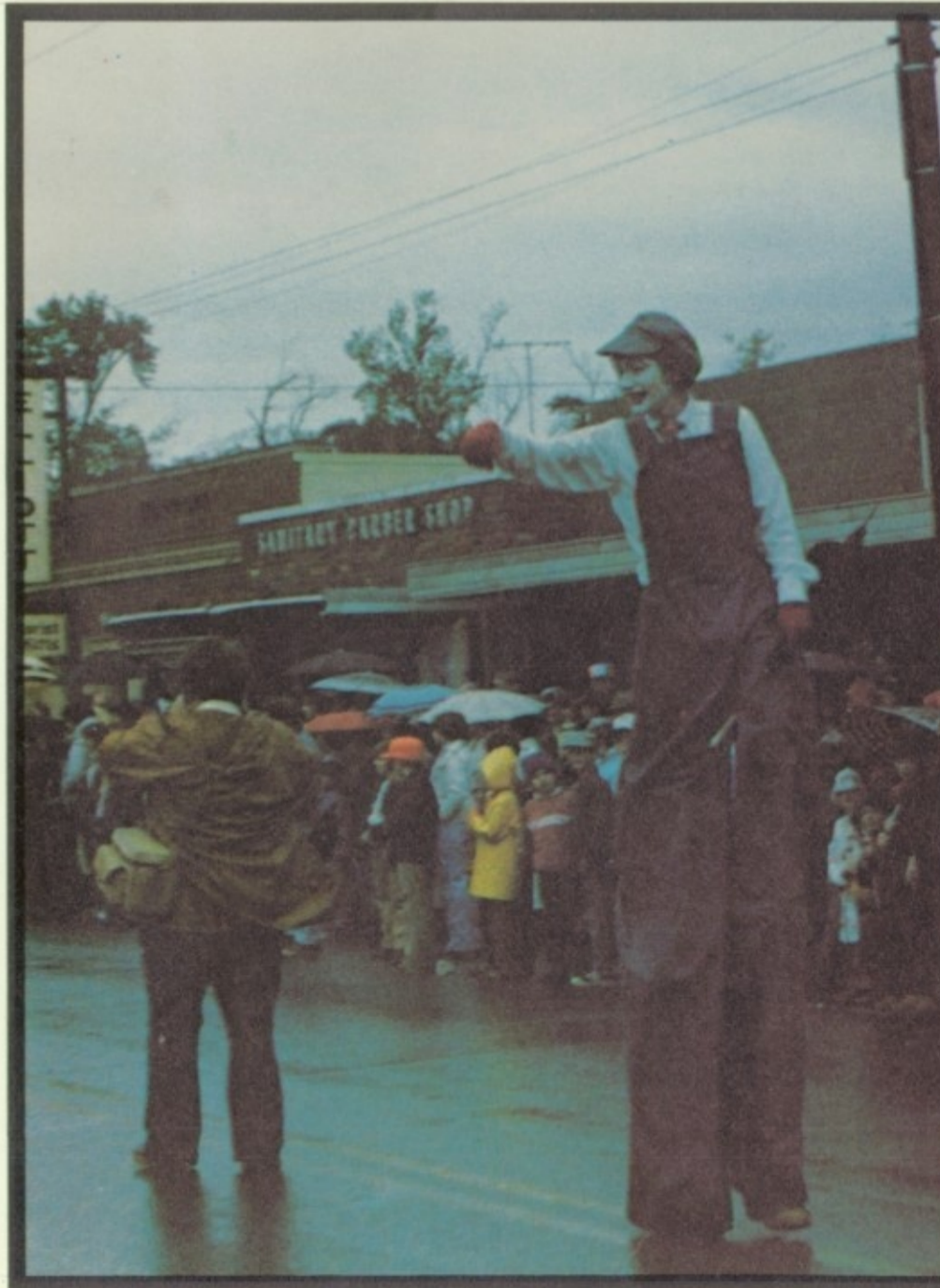
How's the weather down there?

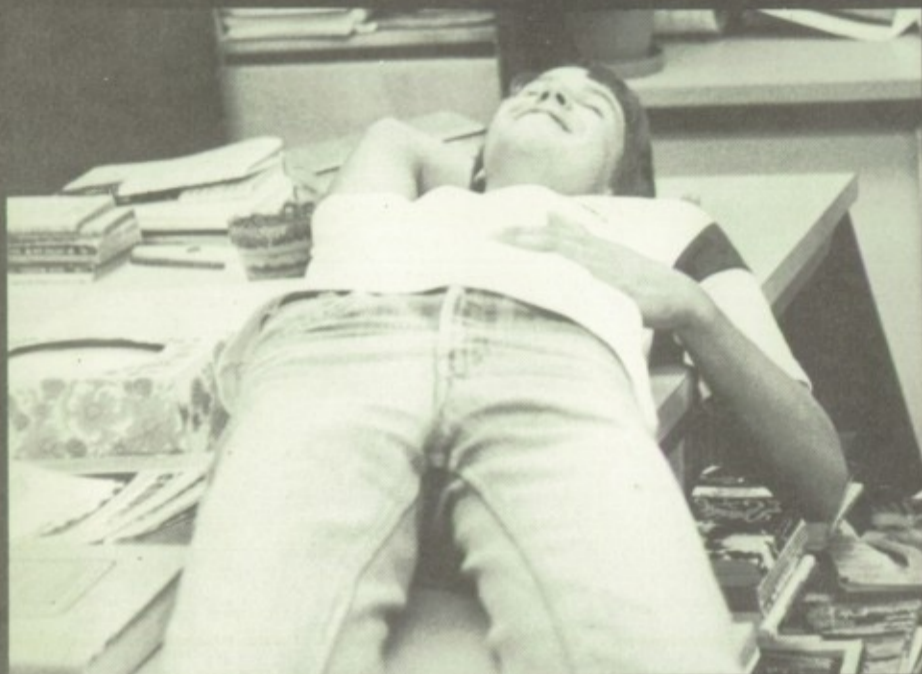

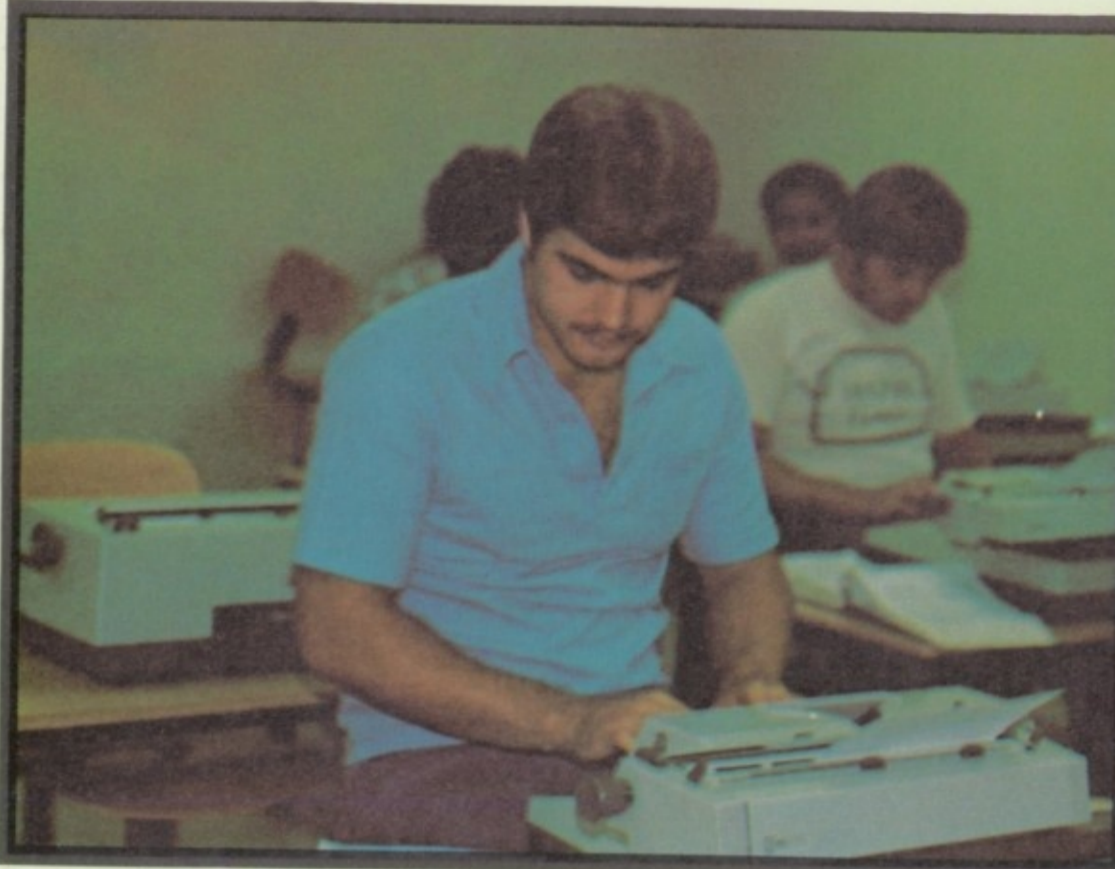

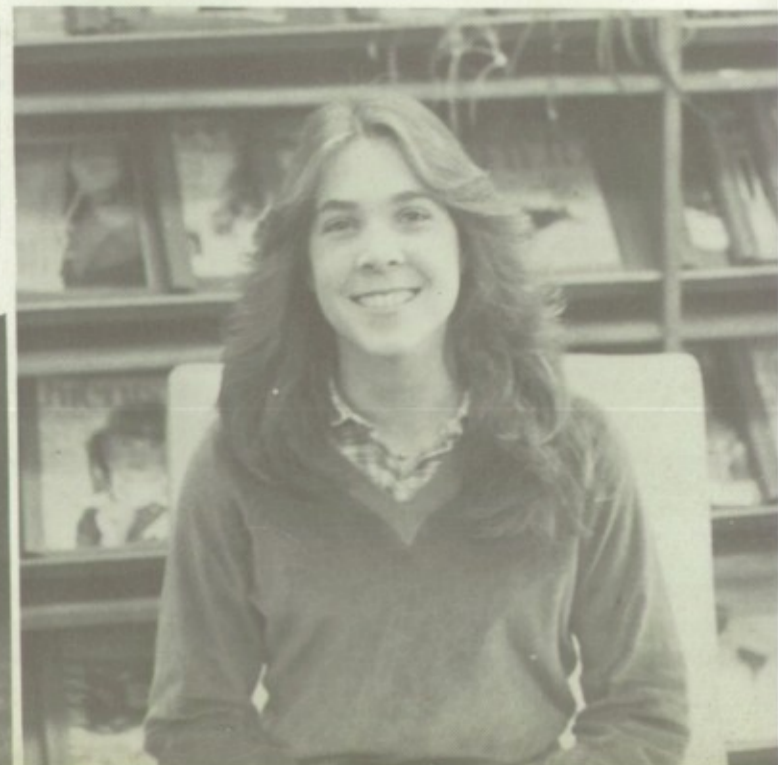

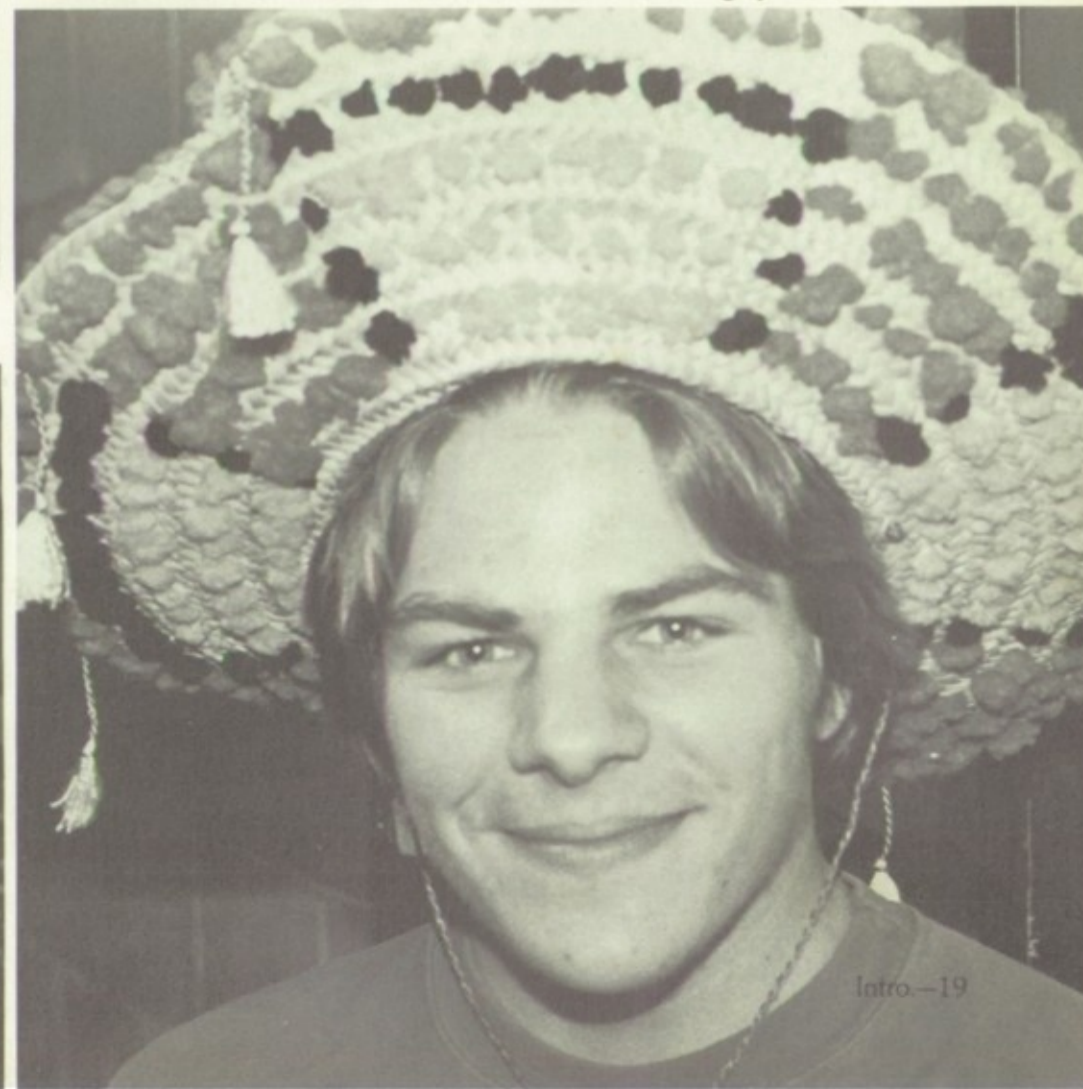

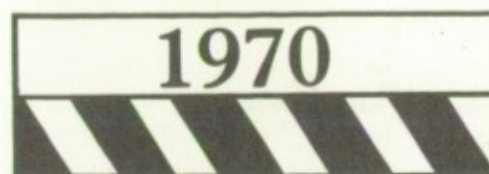

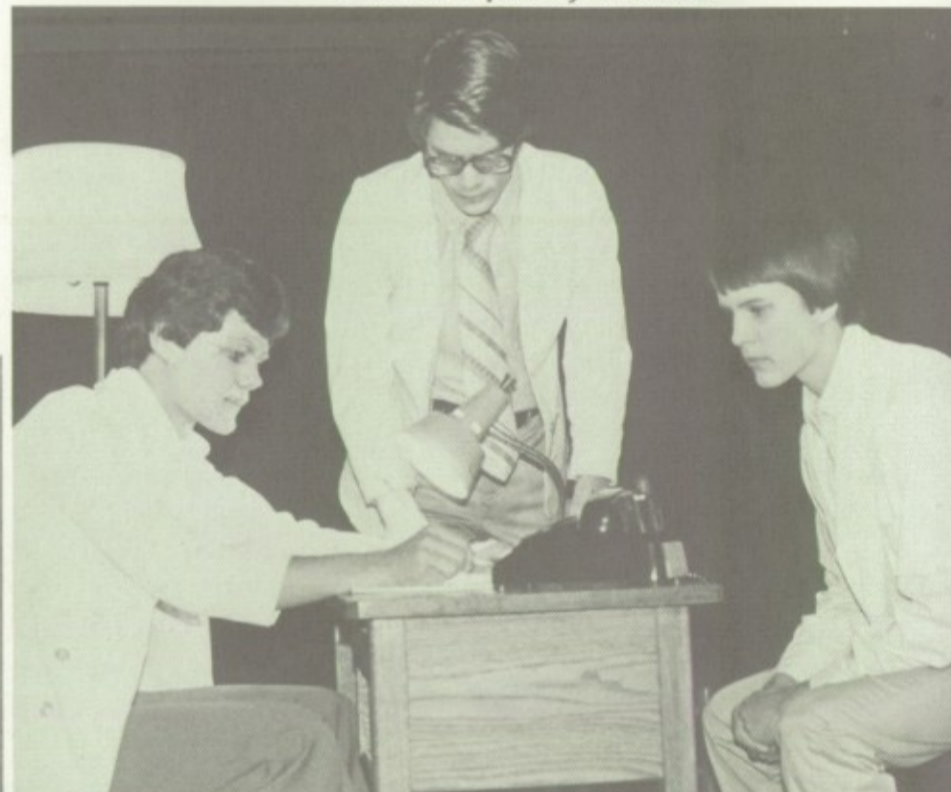

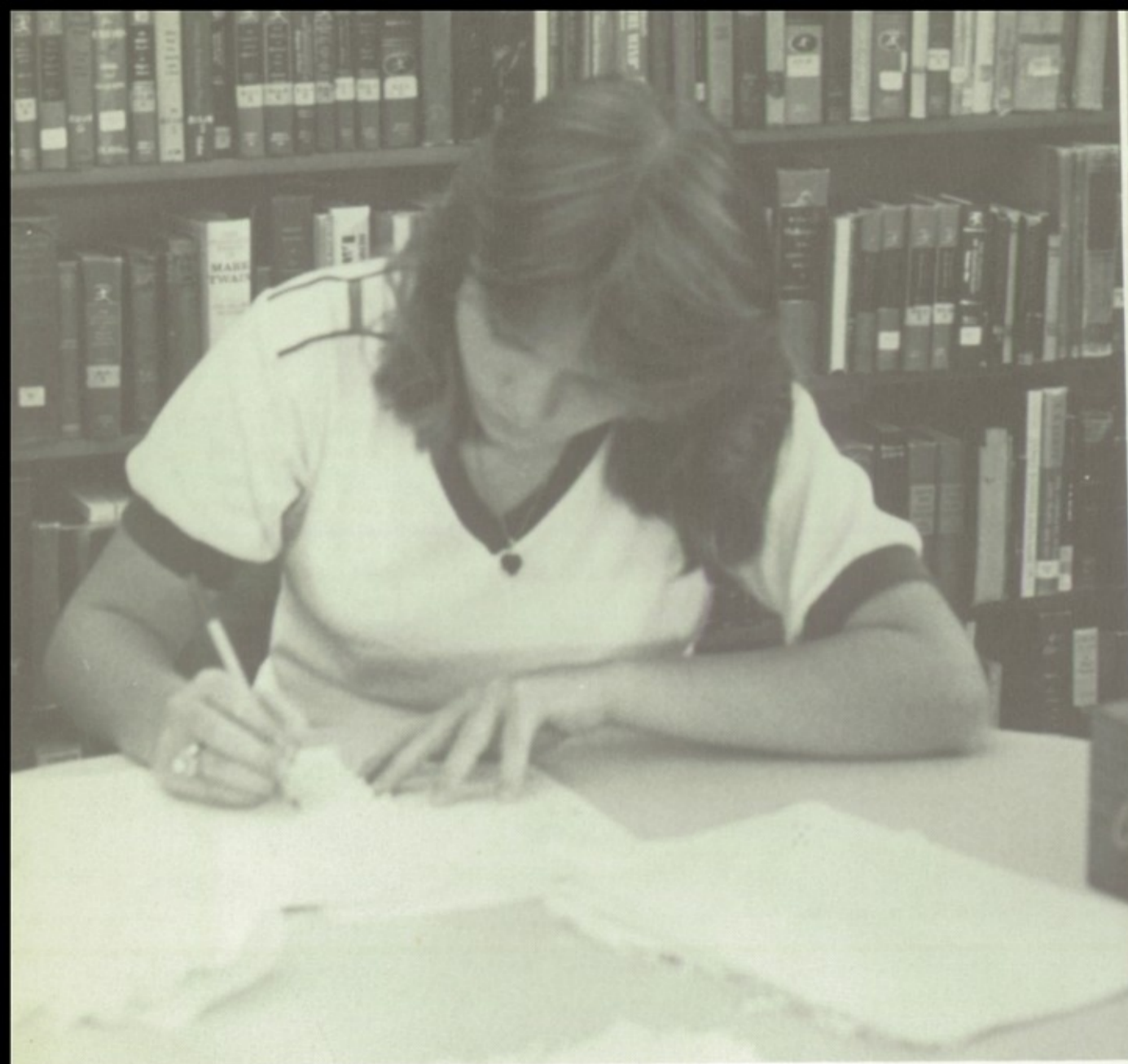

Tammy Womack, Tri-Hi-Y president, and FBLA Chaplain, was one of the majorettes.

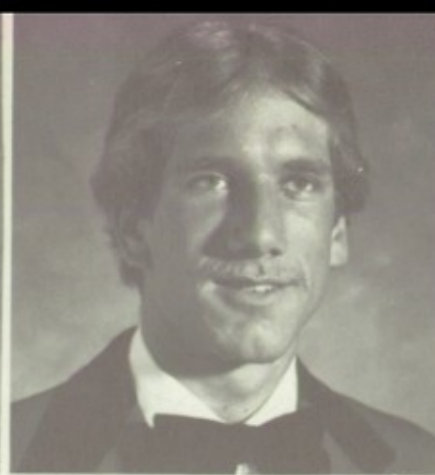

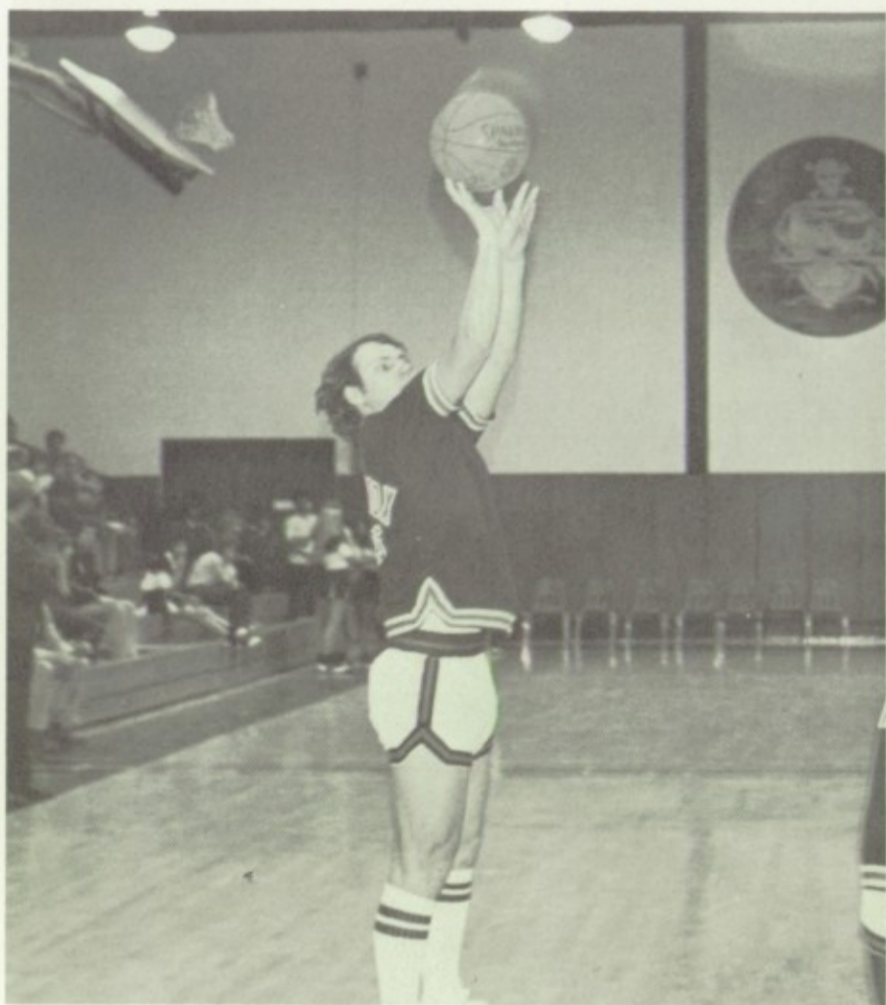

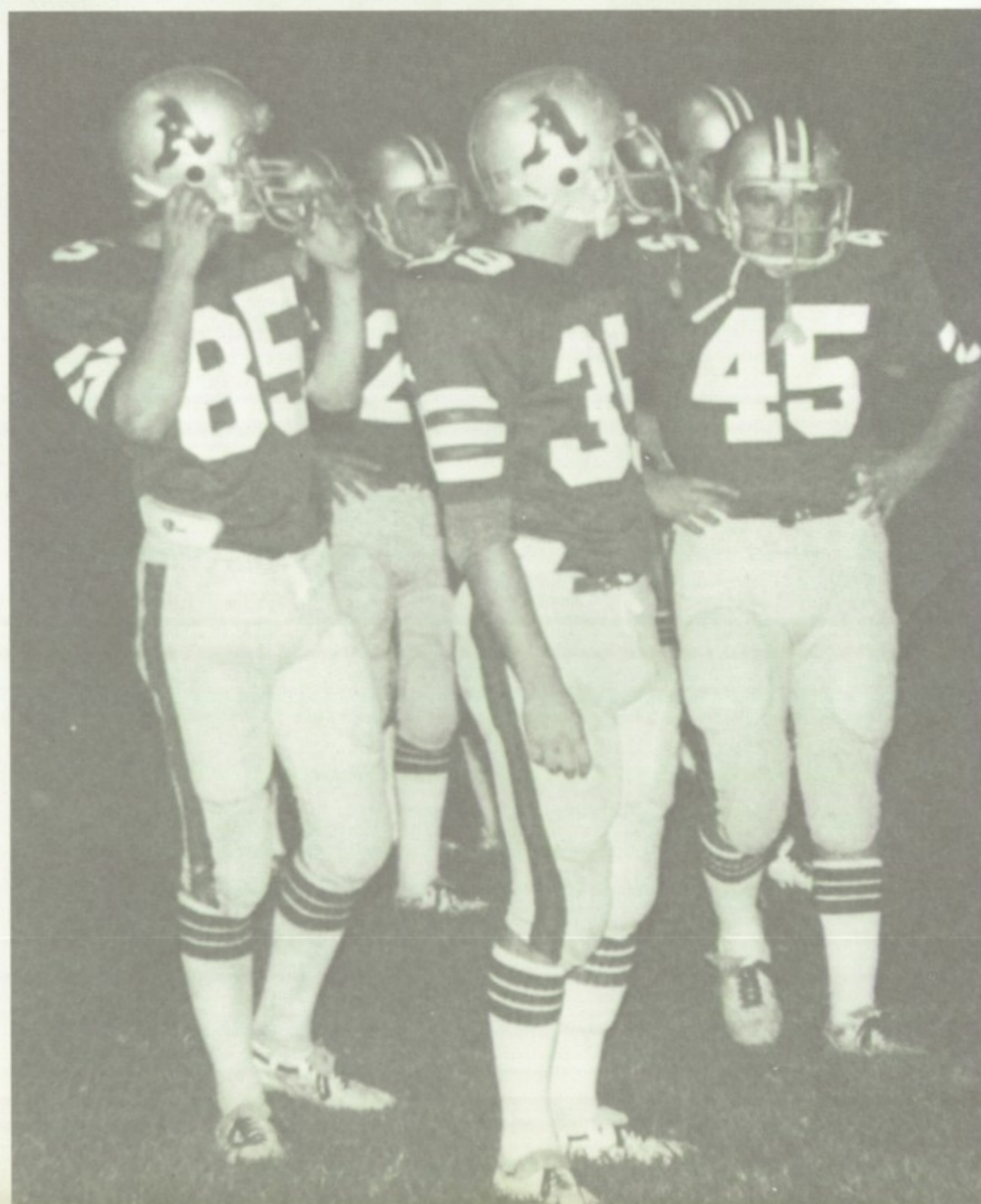
Varsity Goes Whole-Hog Over Pigskin

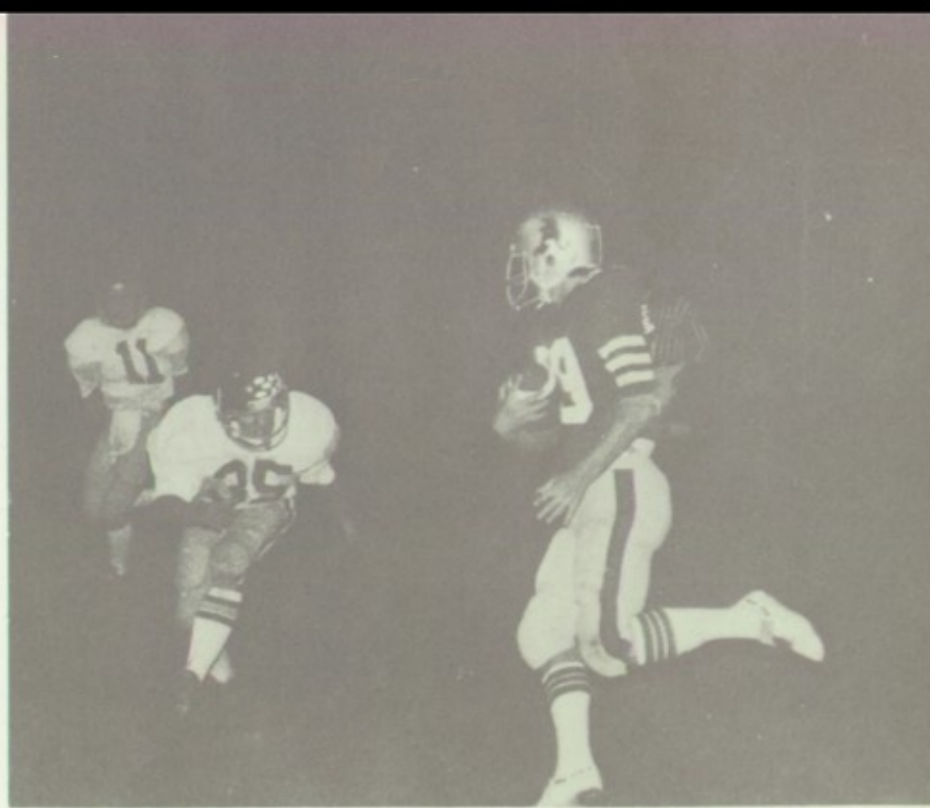

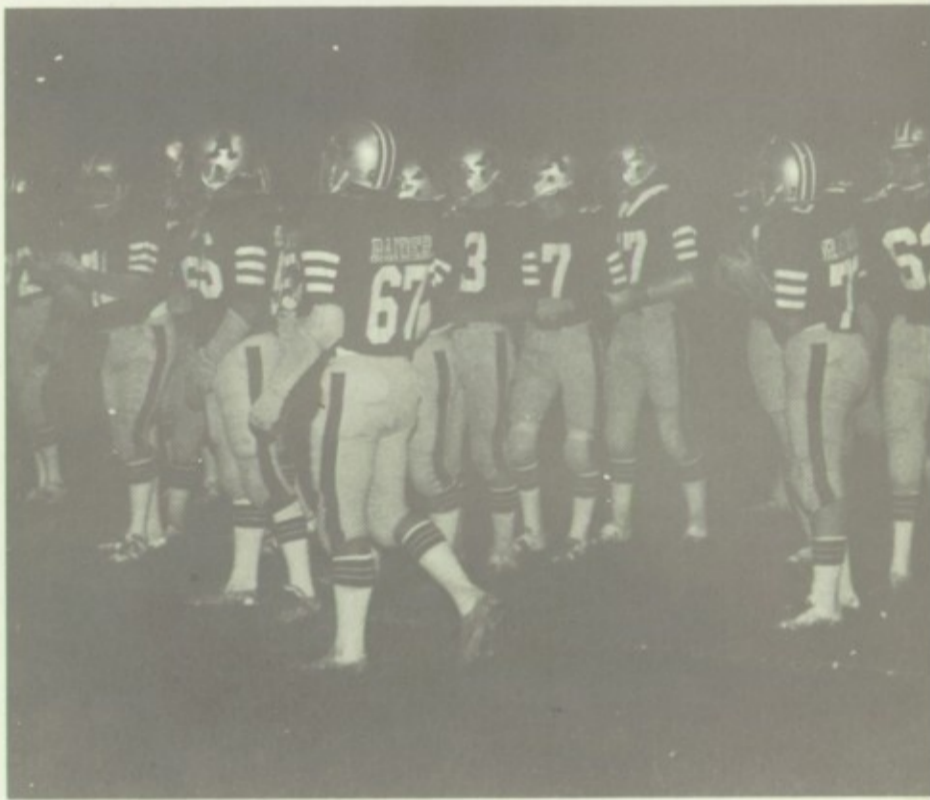

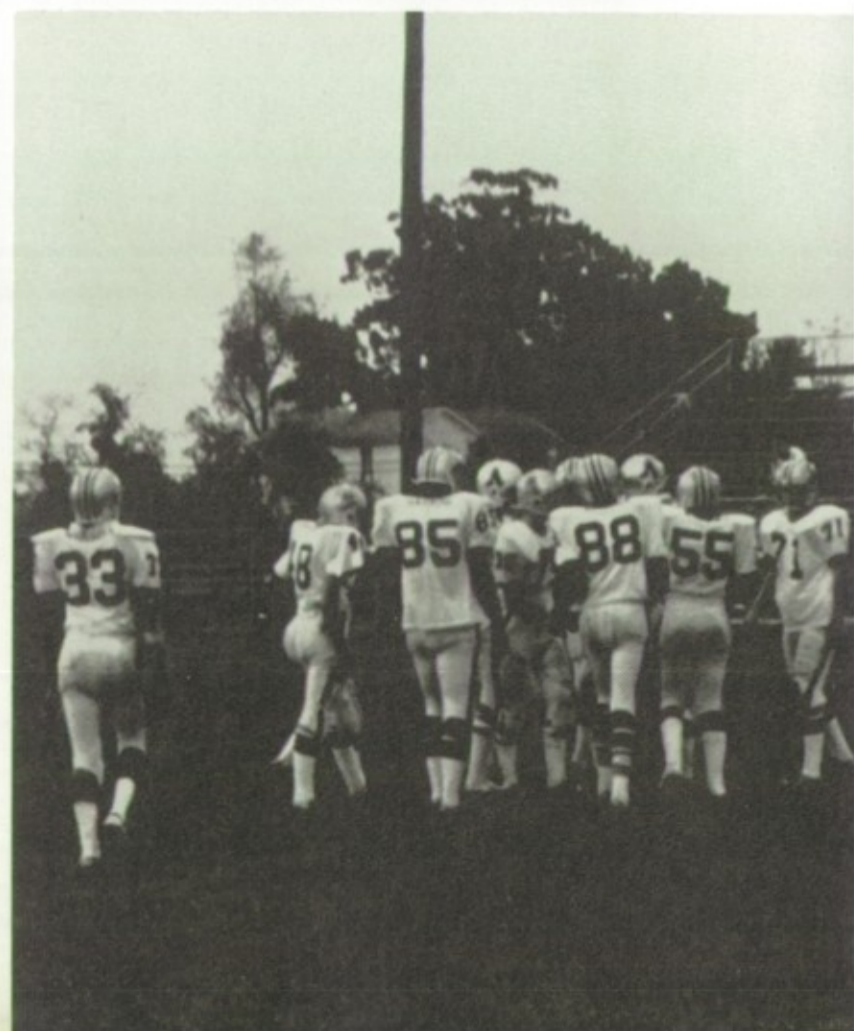
J. V. Football – Undefeated Season

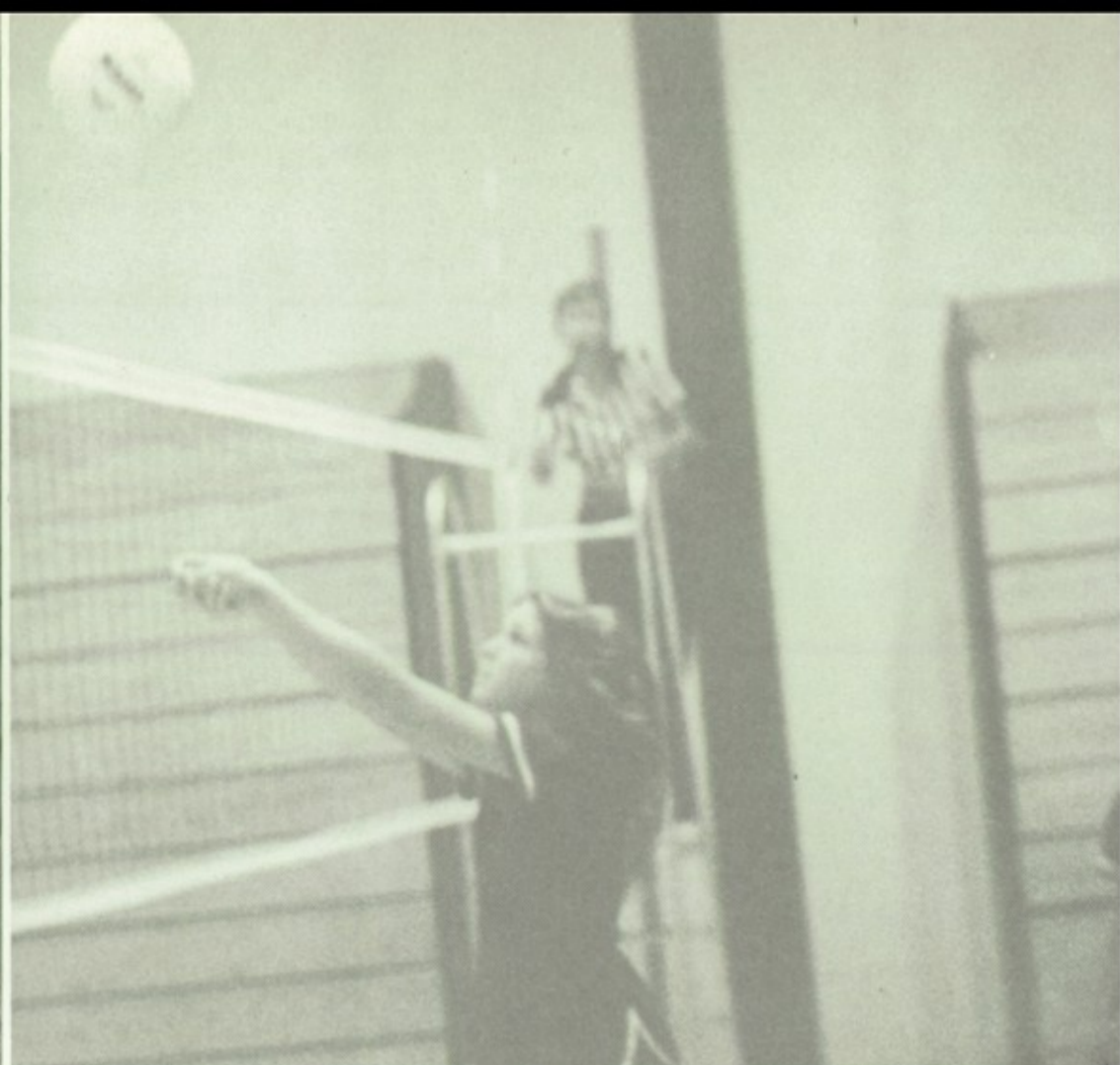

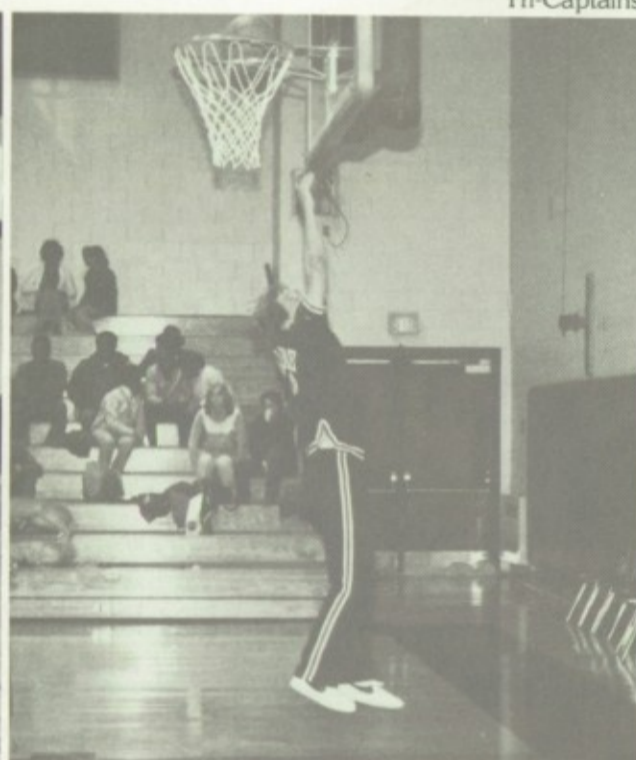

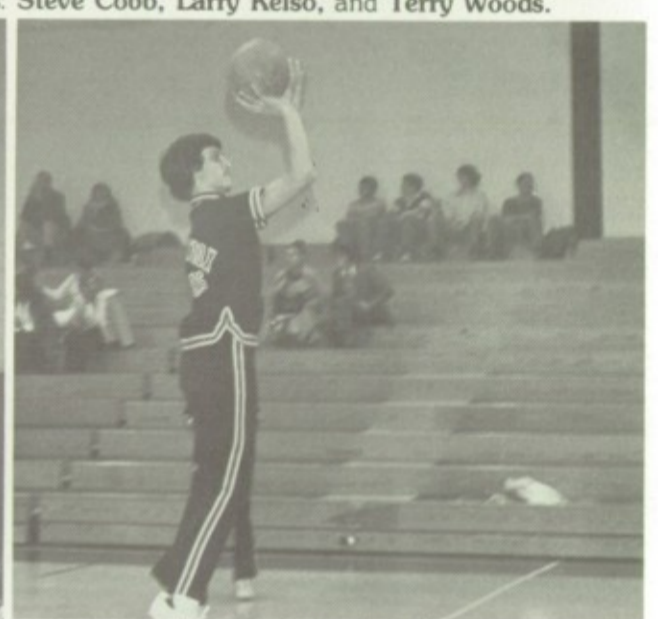

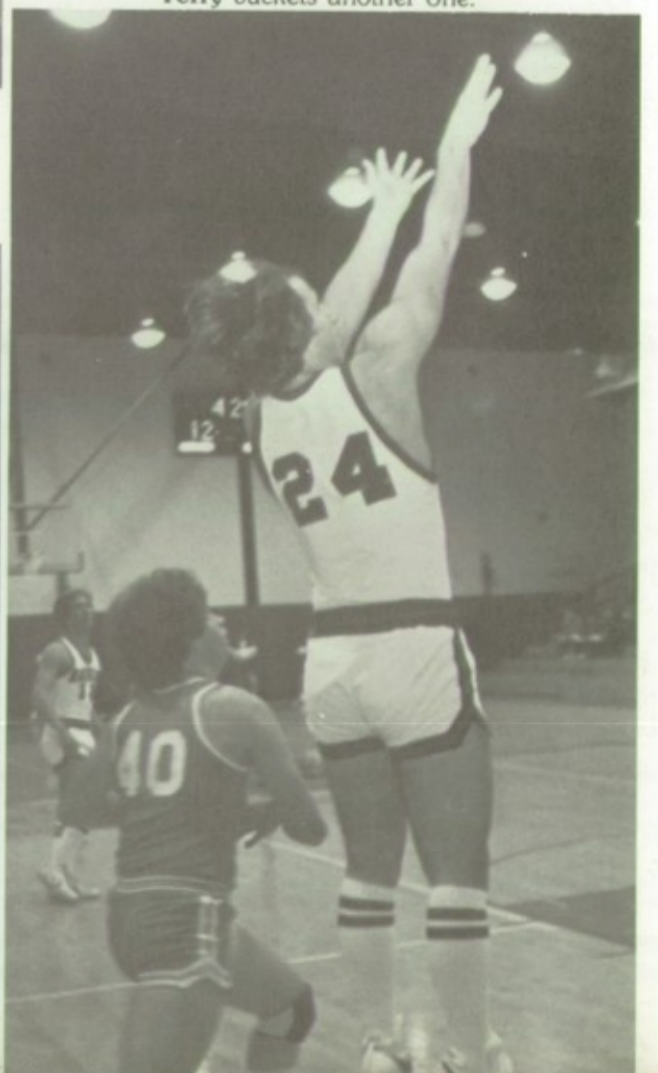

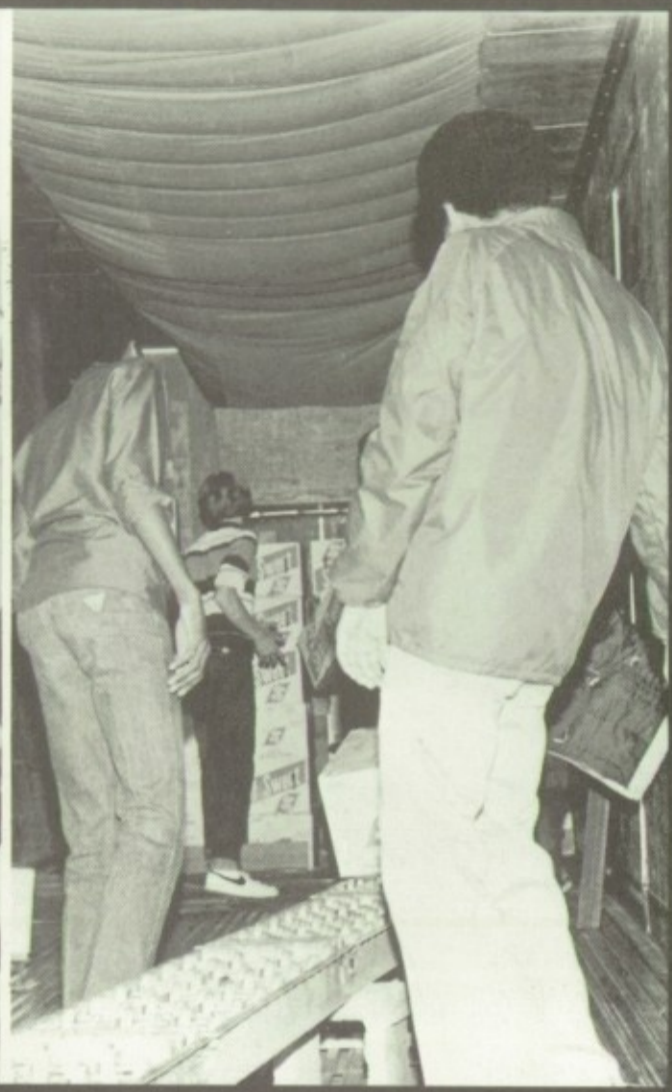

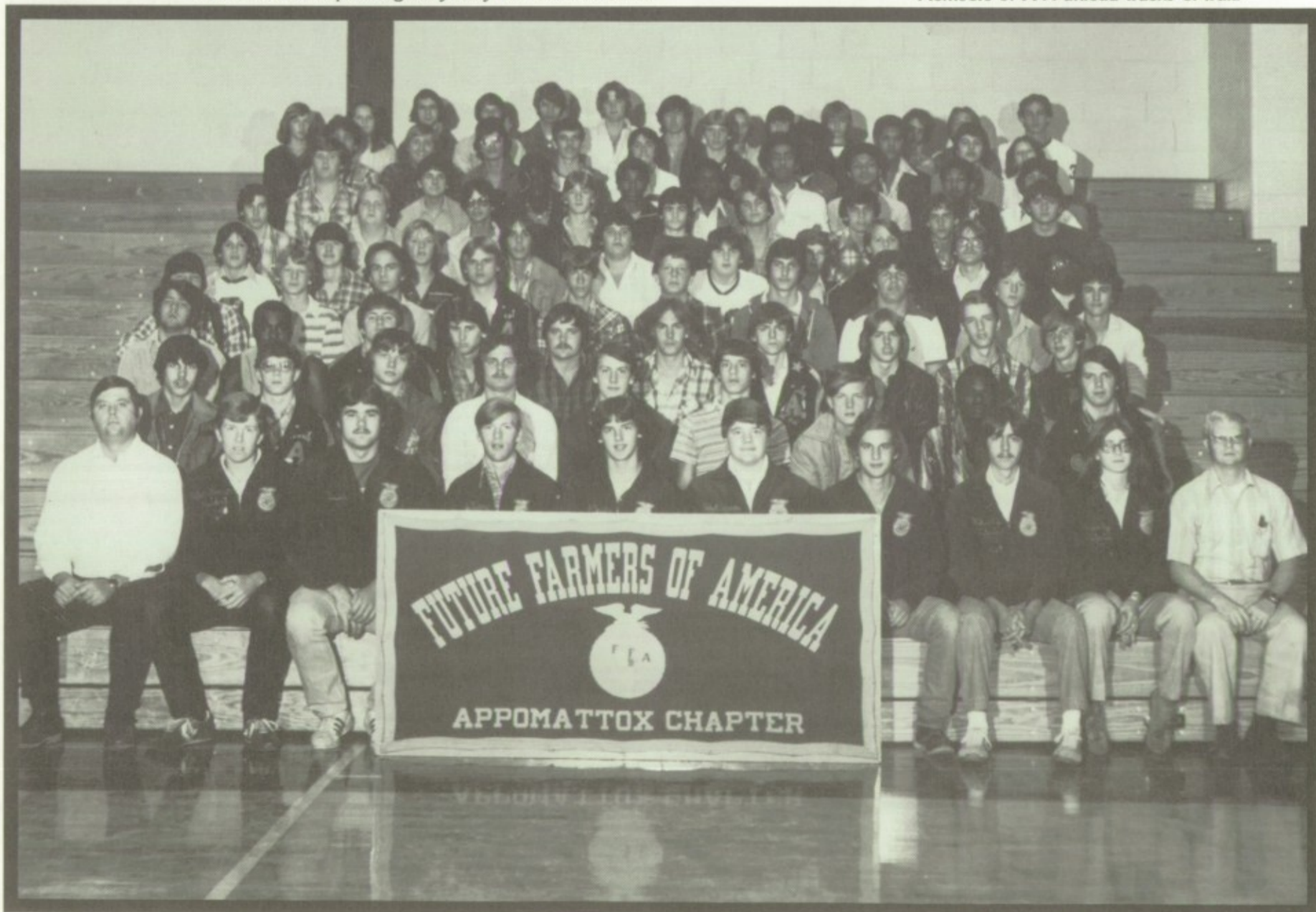

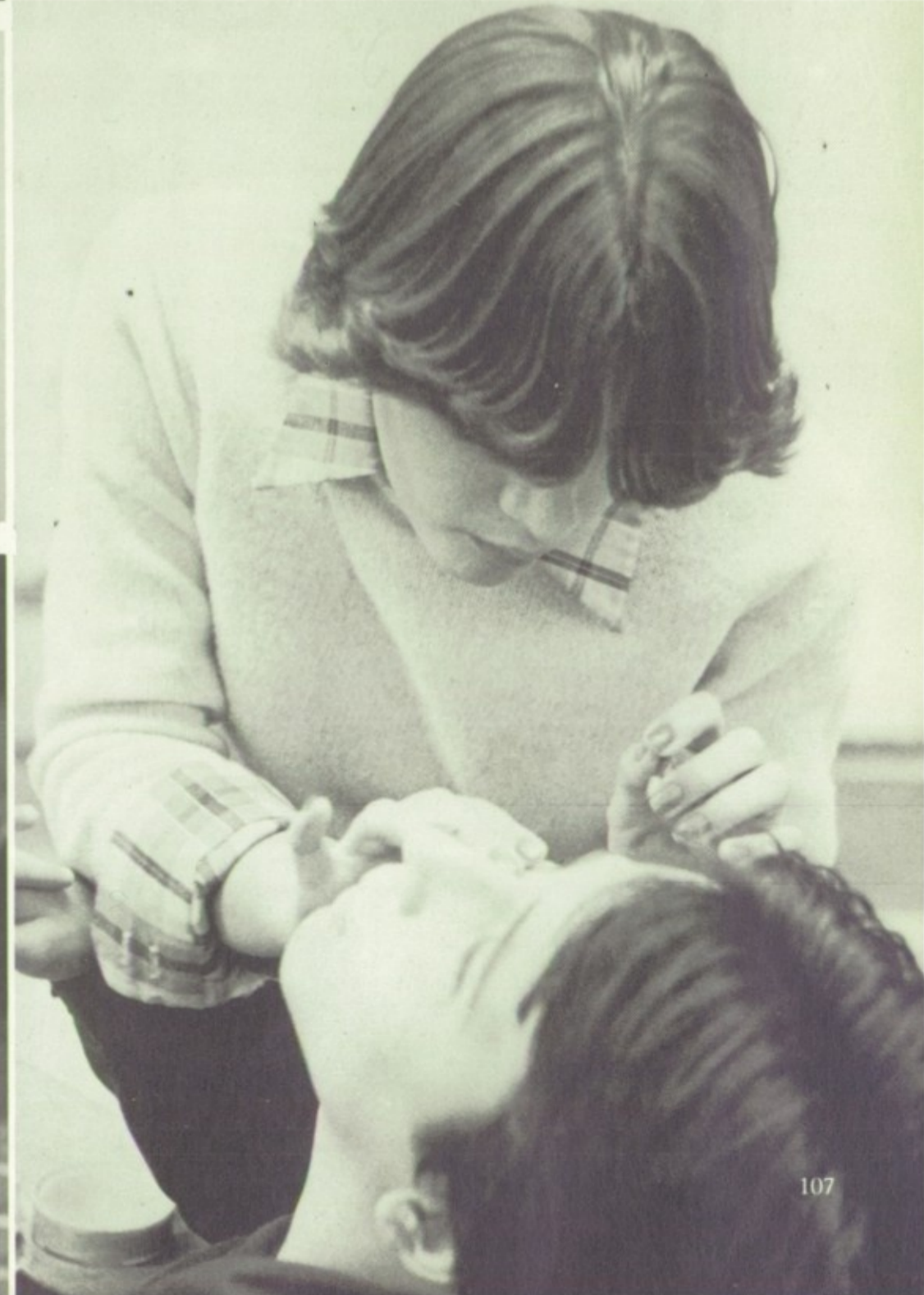

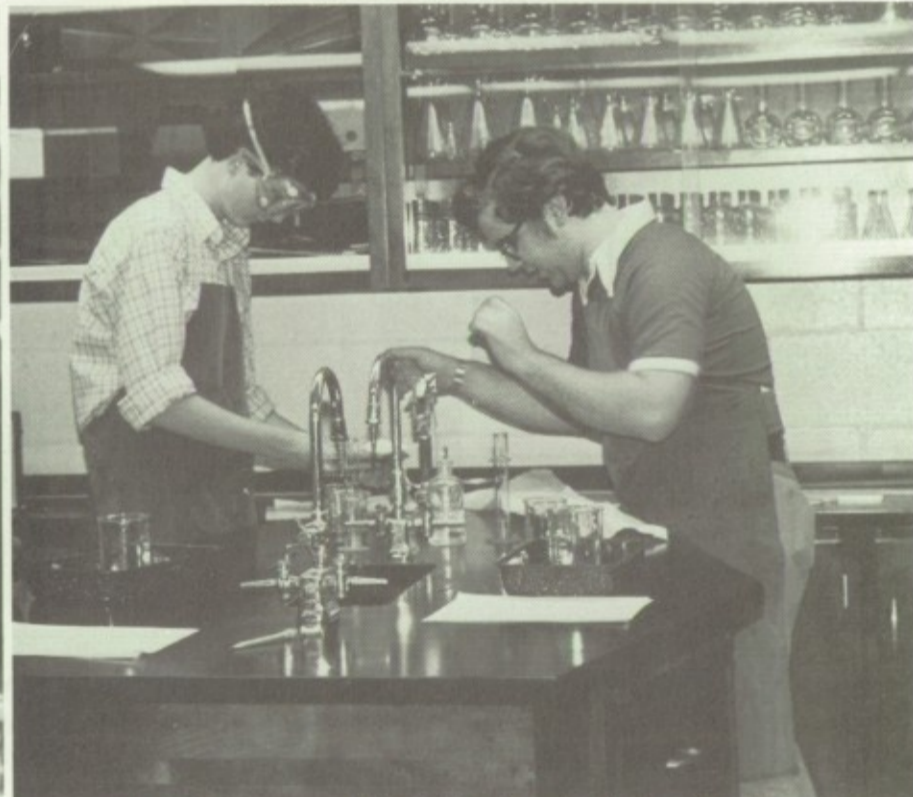

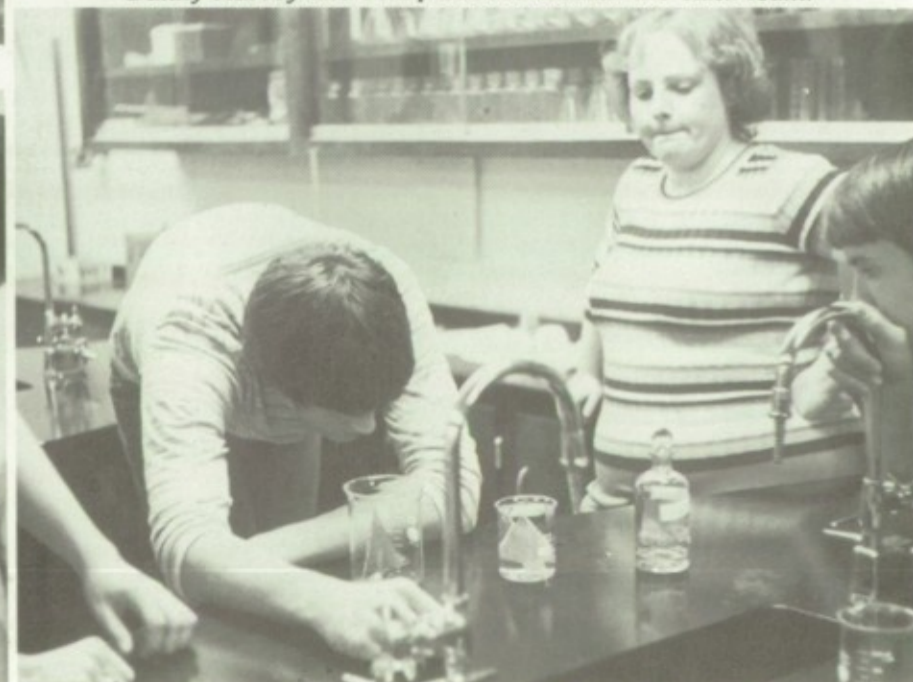

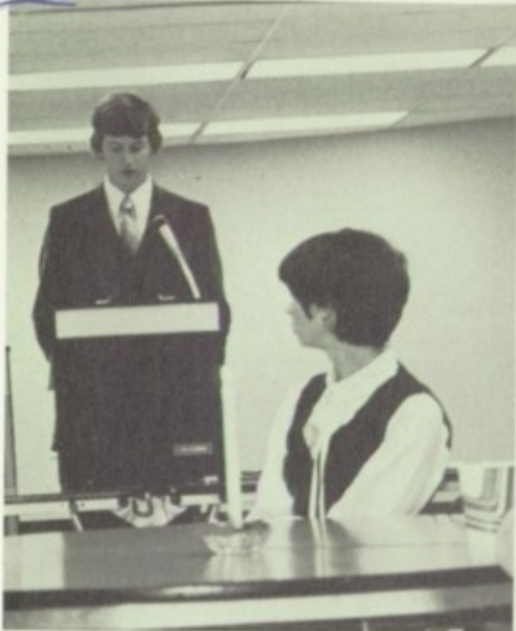
