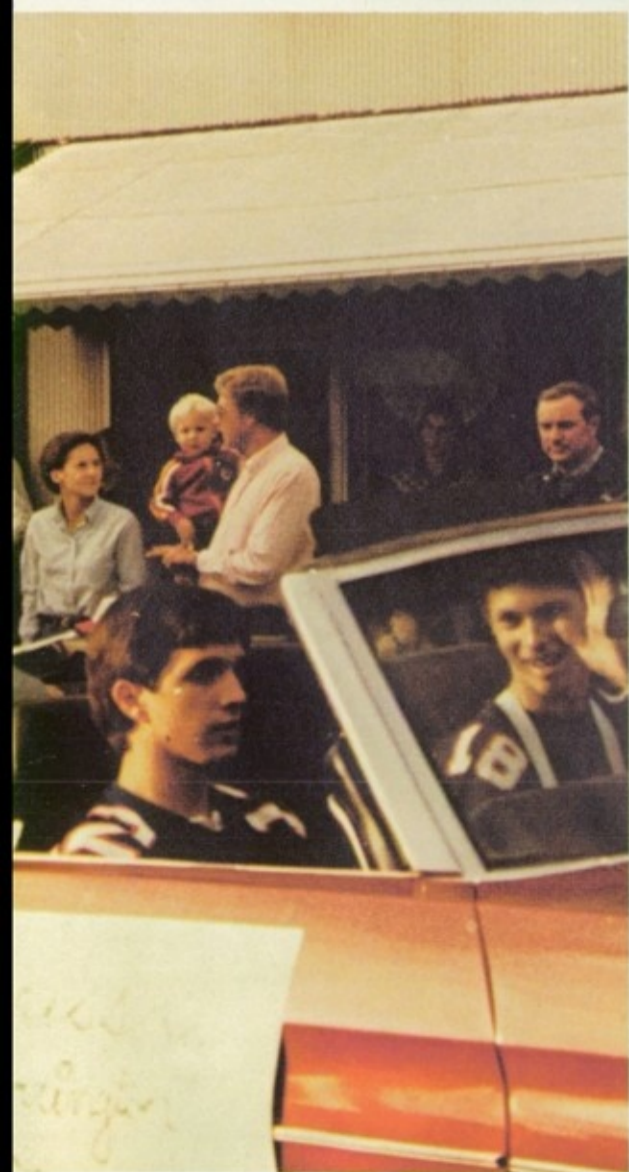
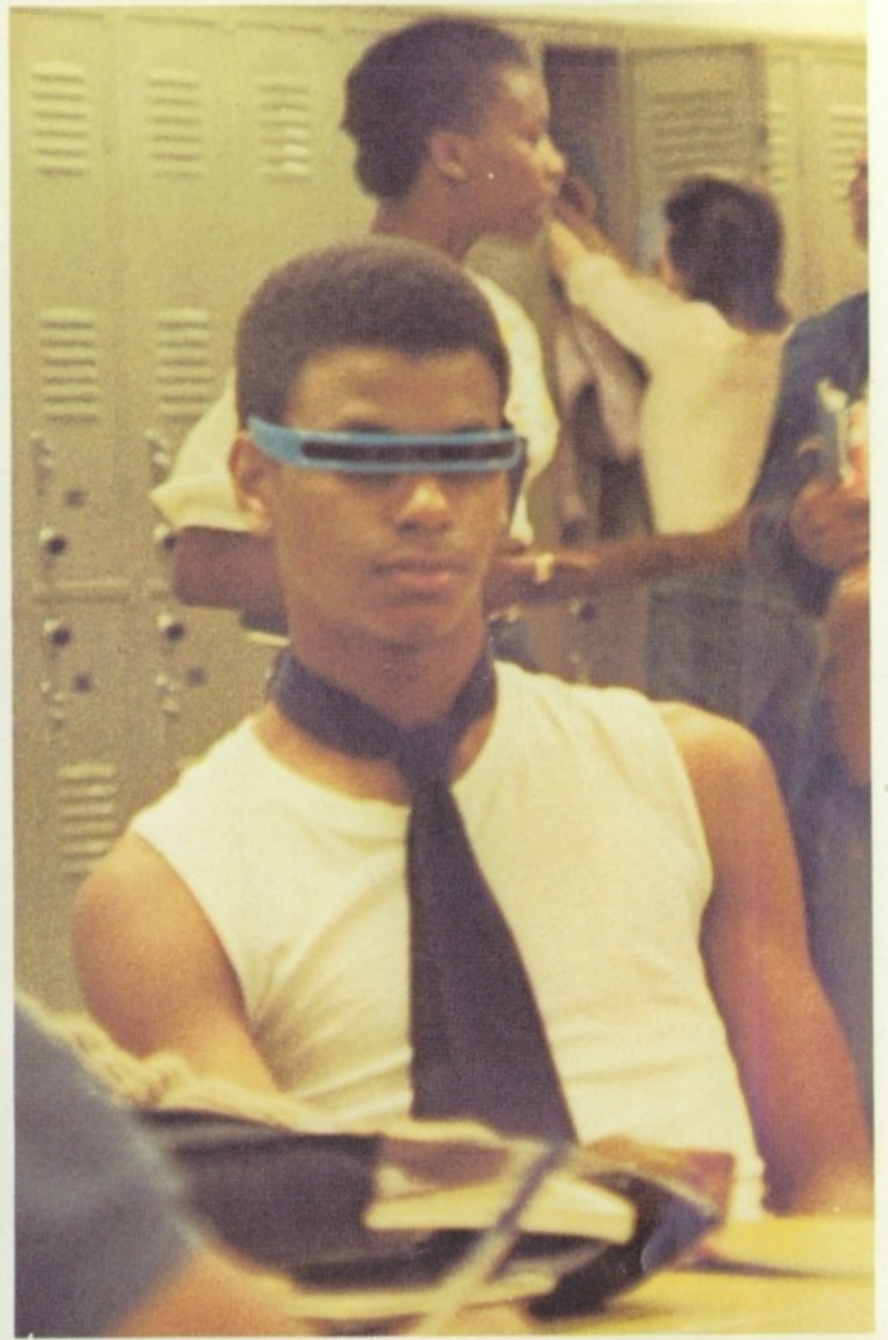

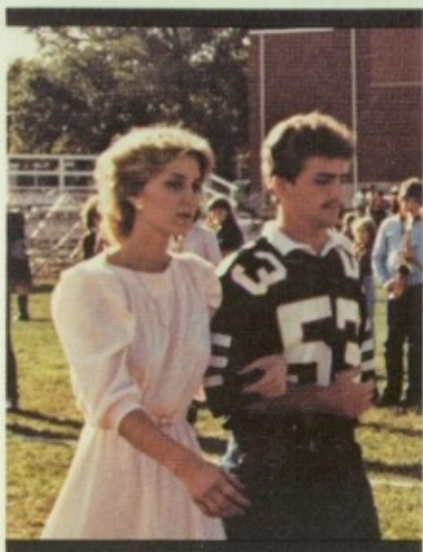

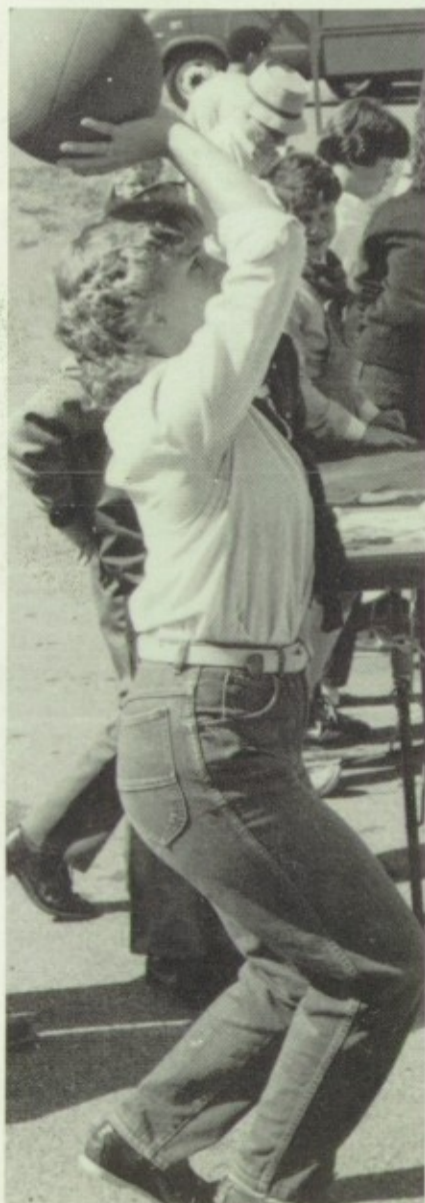

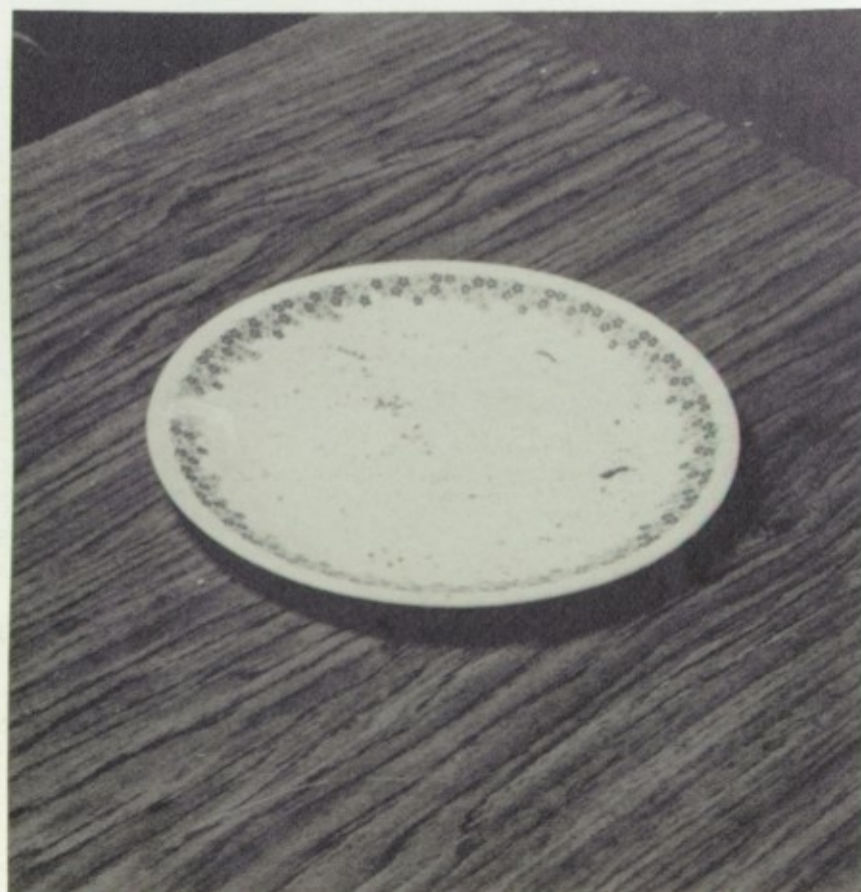

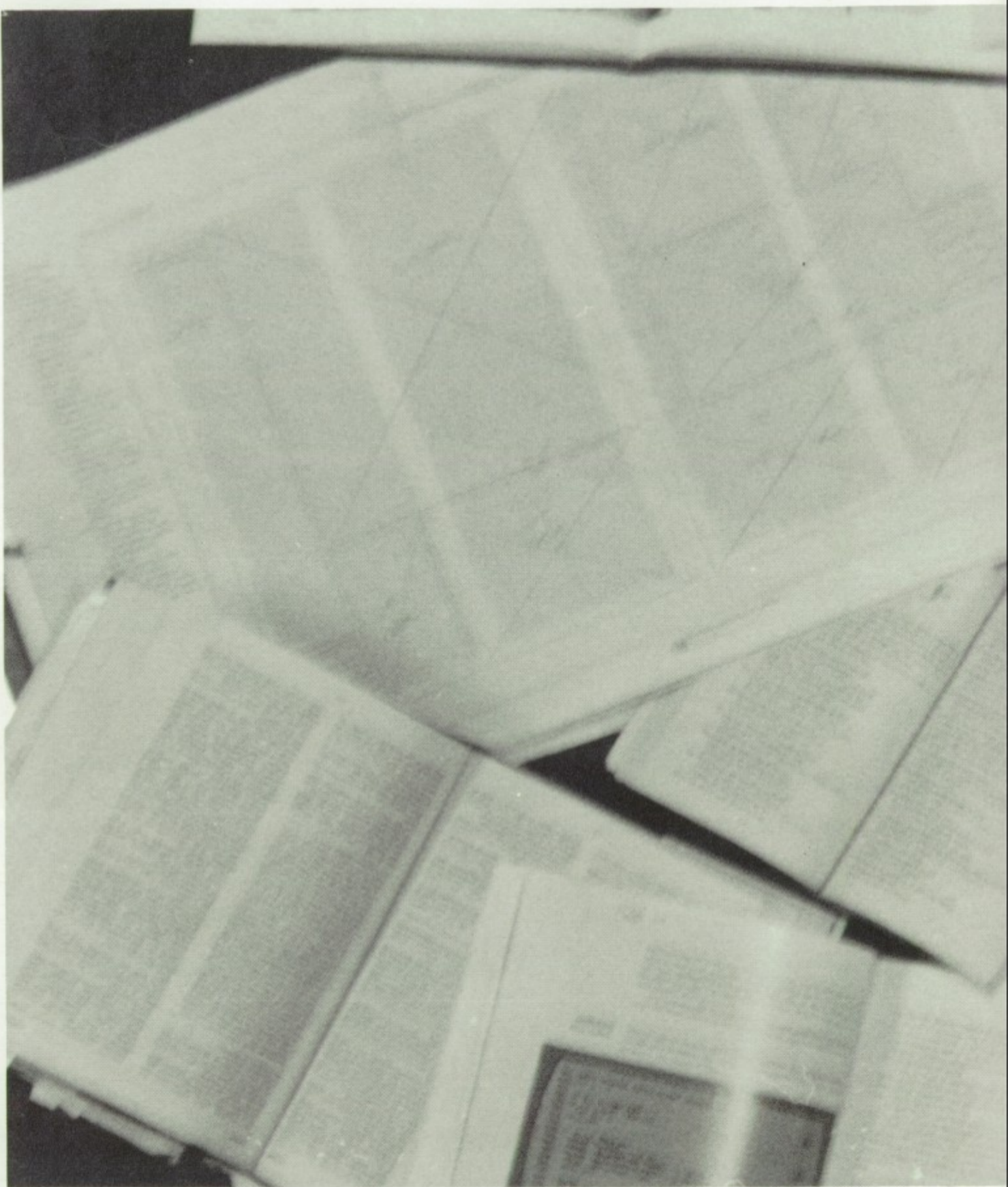

Jack Williams concentrates for the dreaded "Cuccio Newspaper Quiz".

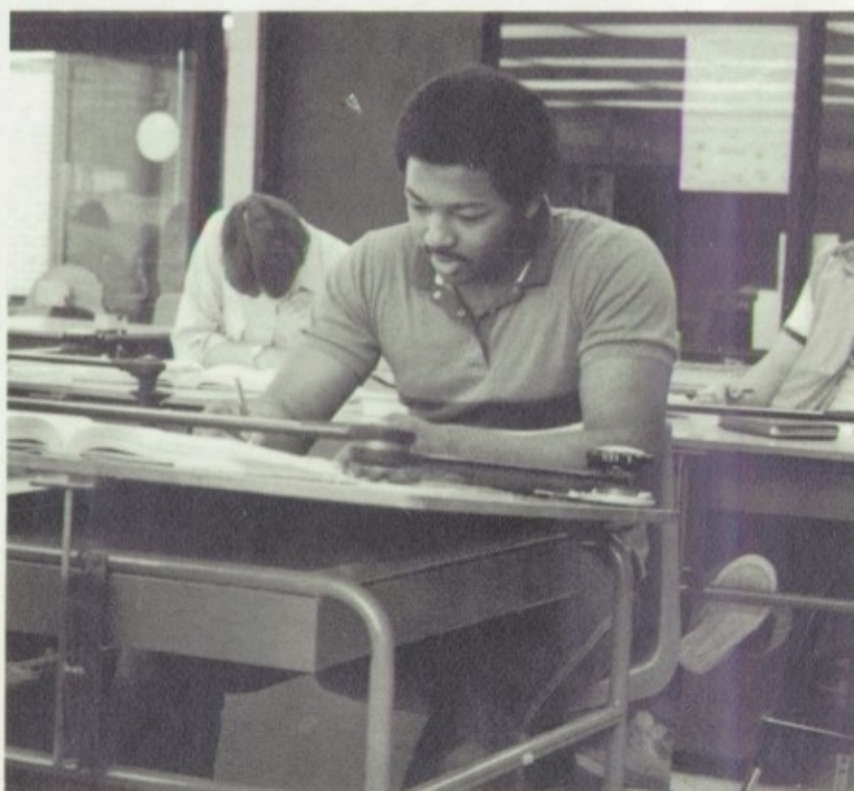
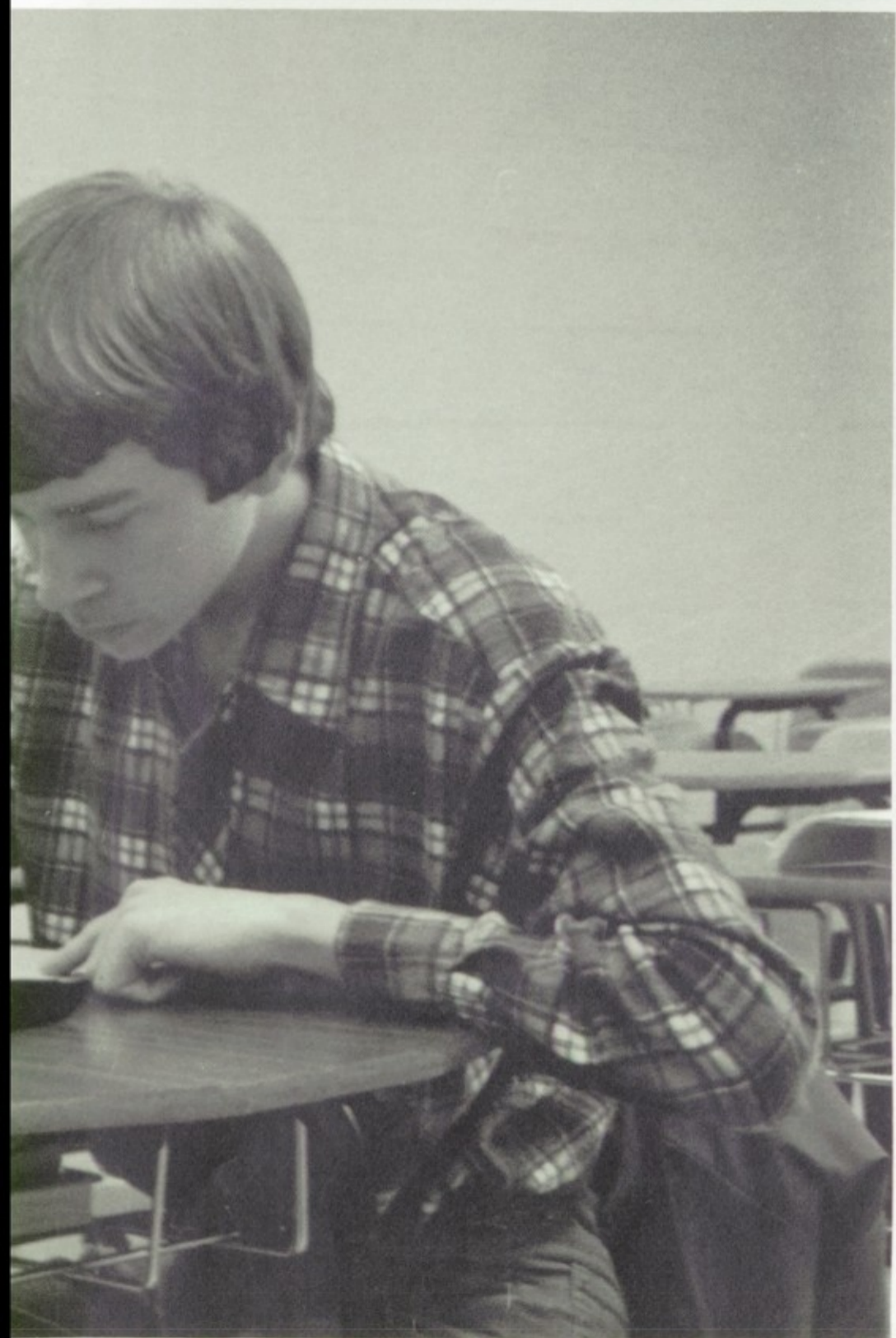

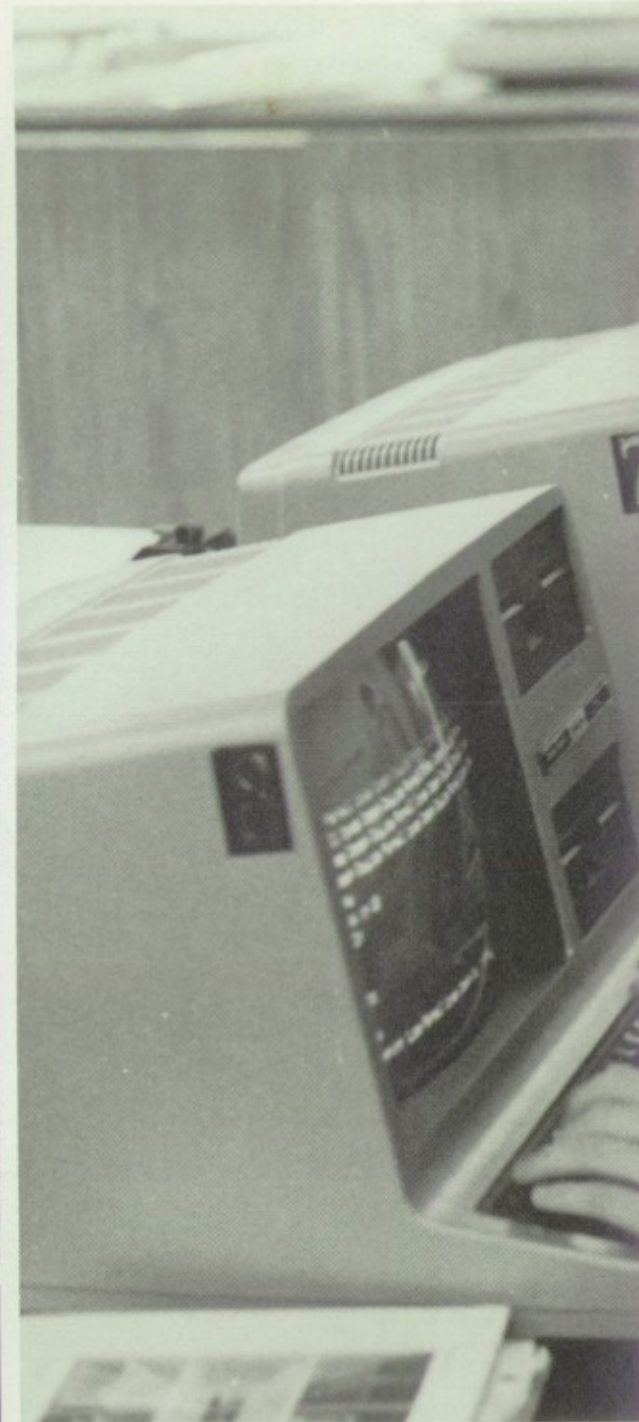
Speech and drama class has had a very successful year and will continue to be a big part of ACHS.

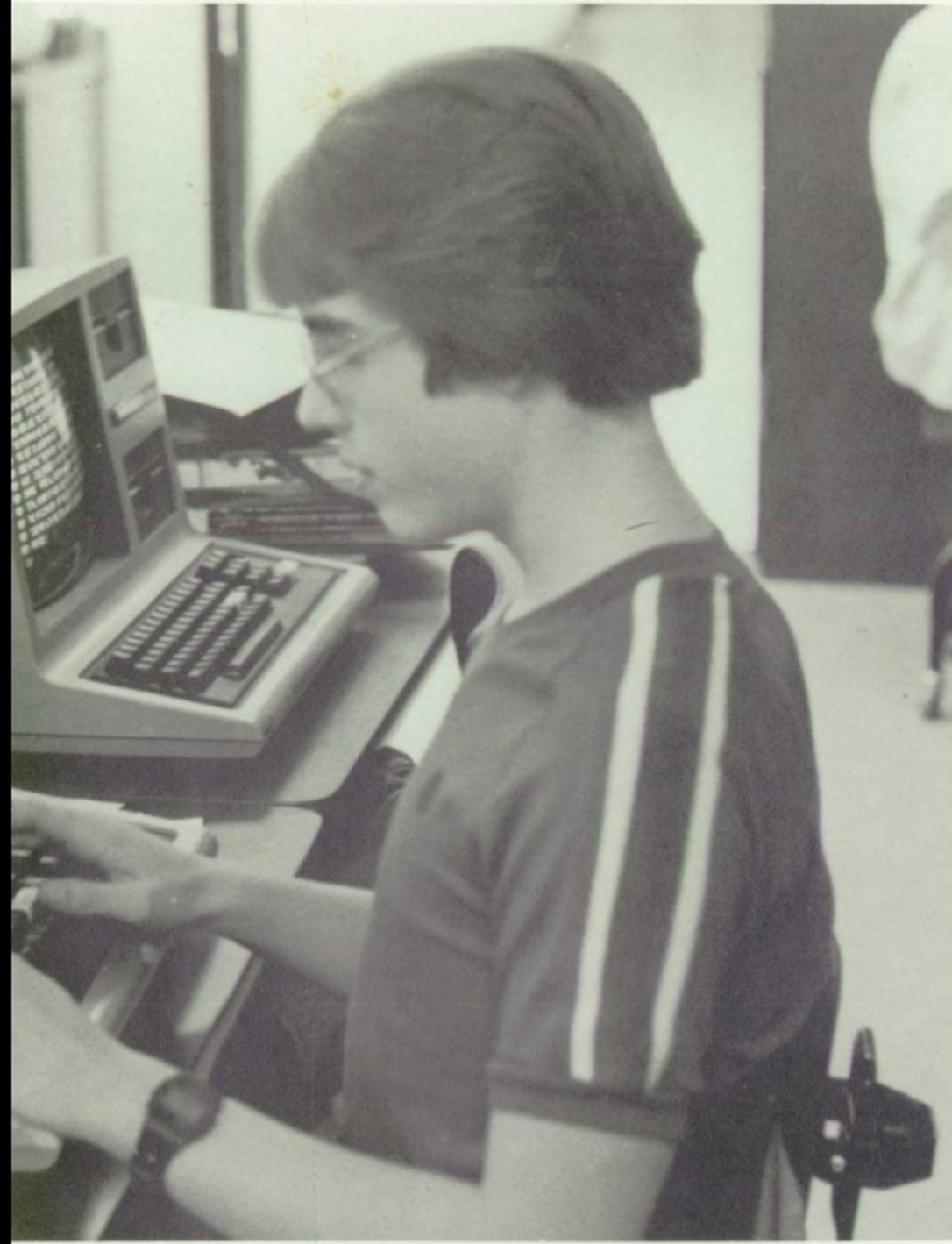
The students learned some of the fundamentals of good photography and film development. At the end of January a **Computer Class** was conducted by **Mr.**

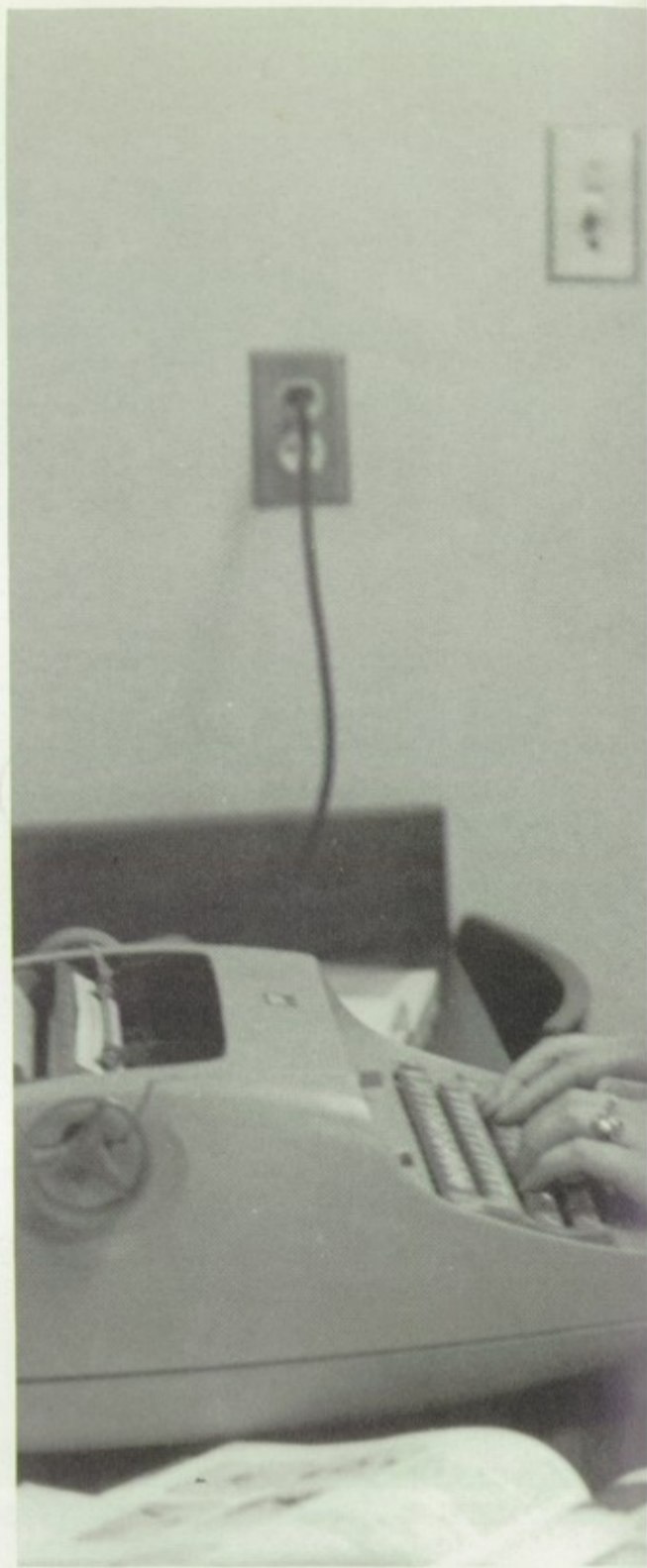
manager to the Varsity Football Team. Besides being a member of the Chorale, she made all regional chorus. Along with this, she is an active church member.

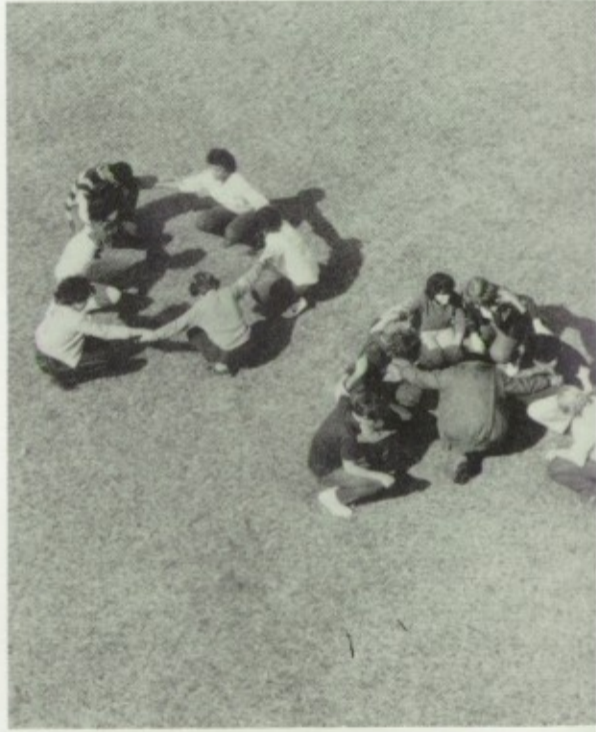
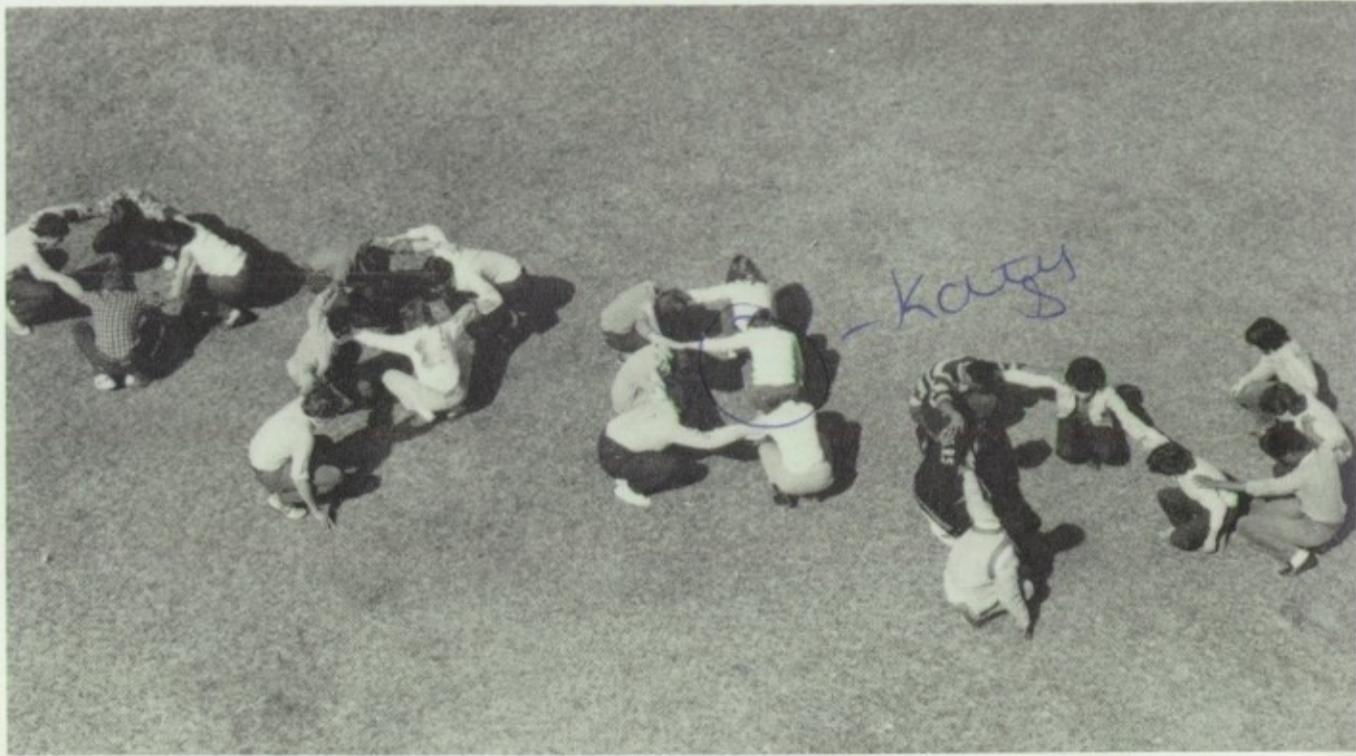
Bret Marston, a Sophomore, won the **American Legion Oratorical Contest** on the school level for his speech on the Constitution.

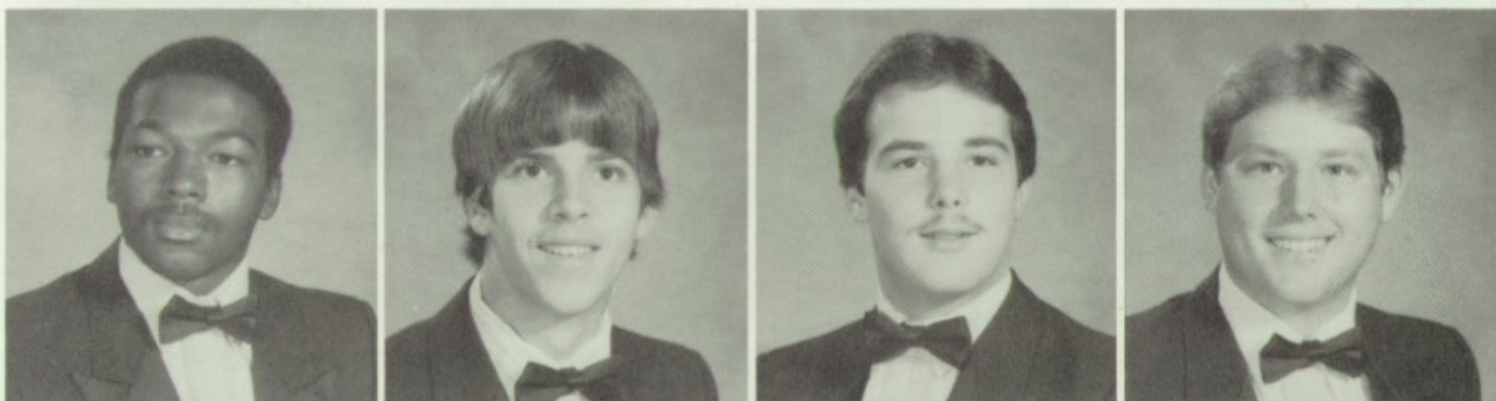

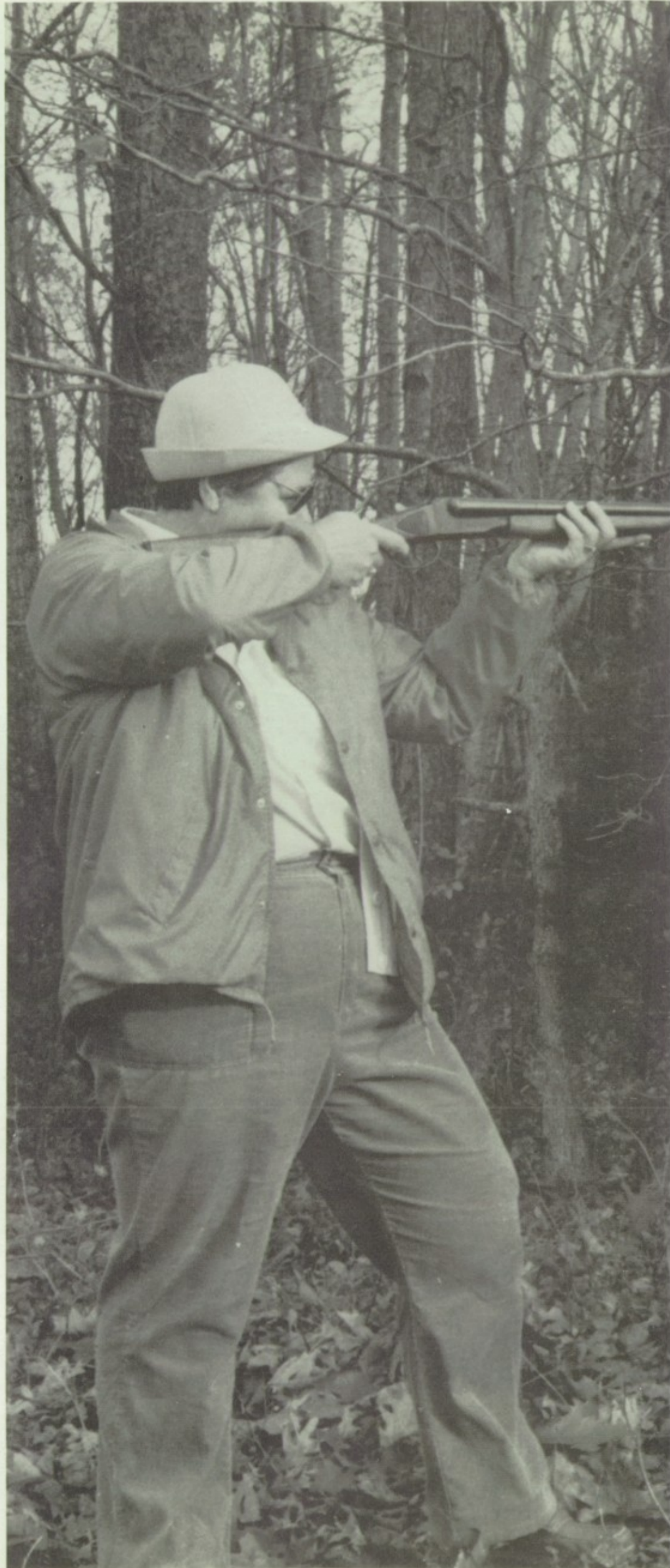
Most of the faculty at ACHS come from rural backgrounds; however, relatively few are natives of Appomattox. 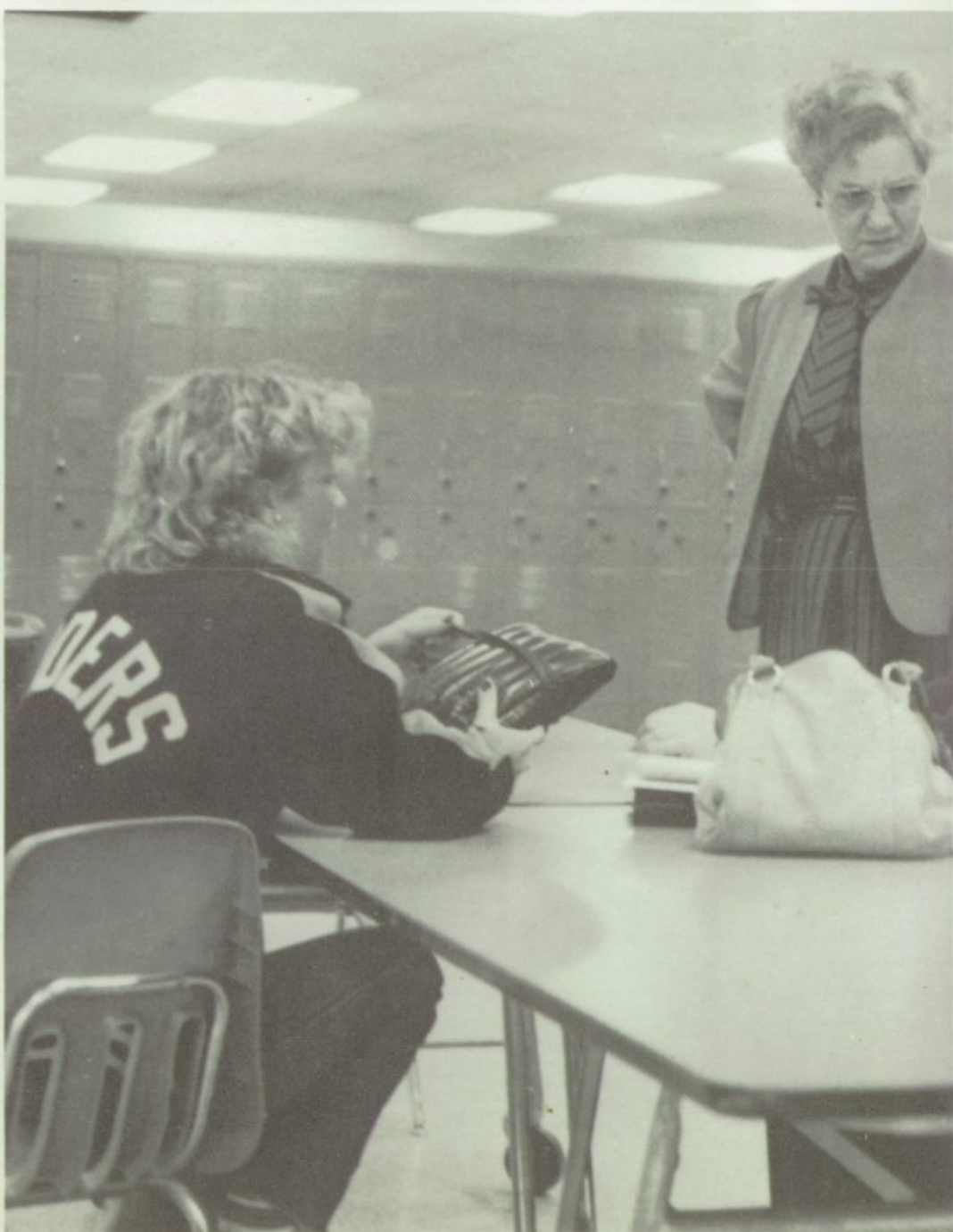

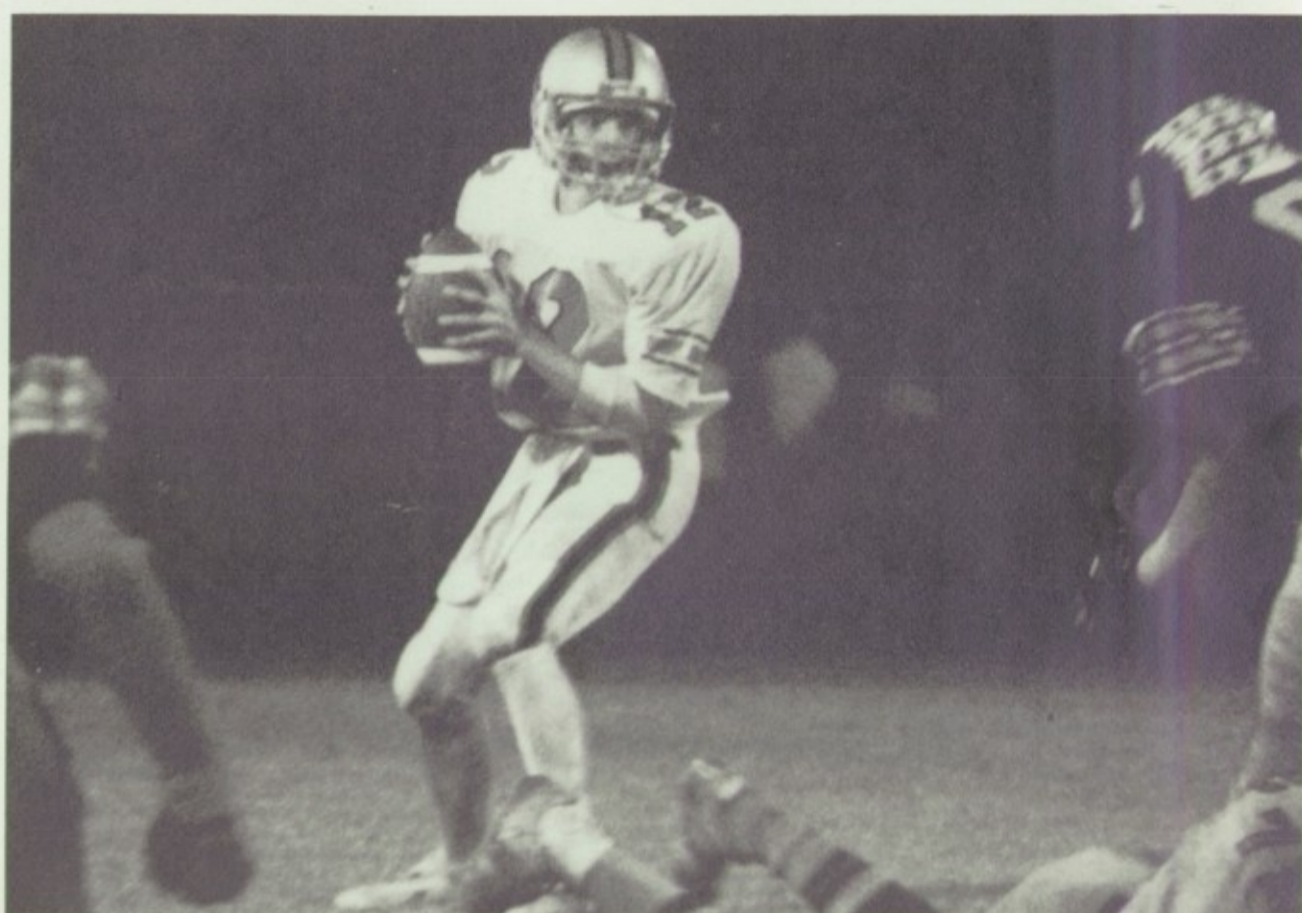

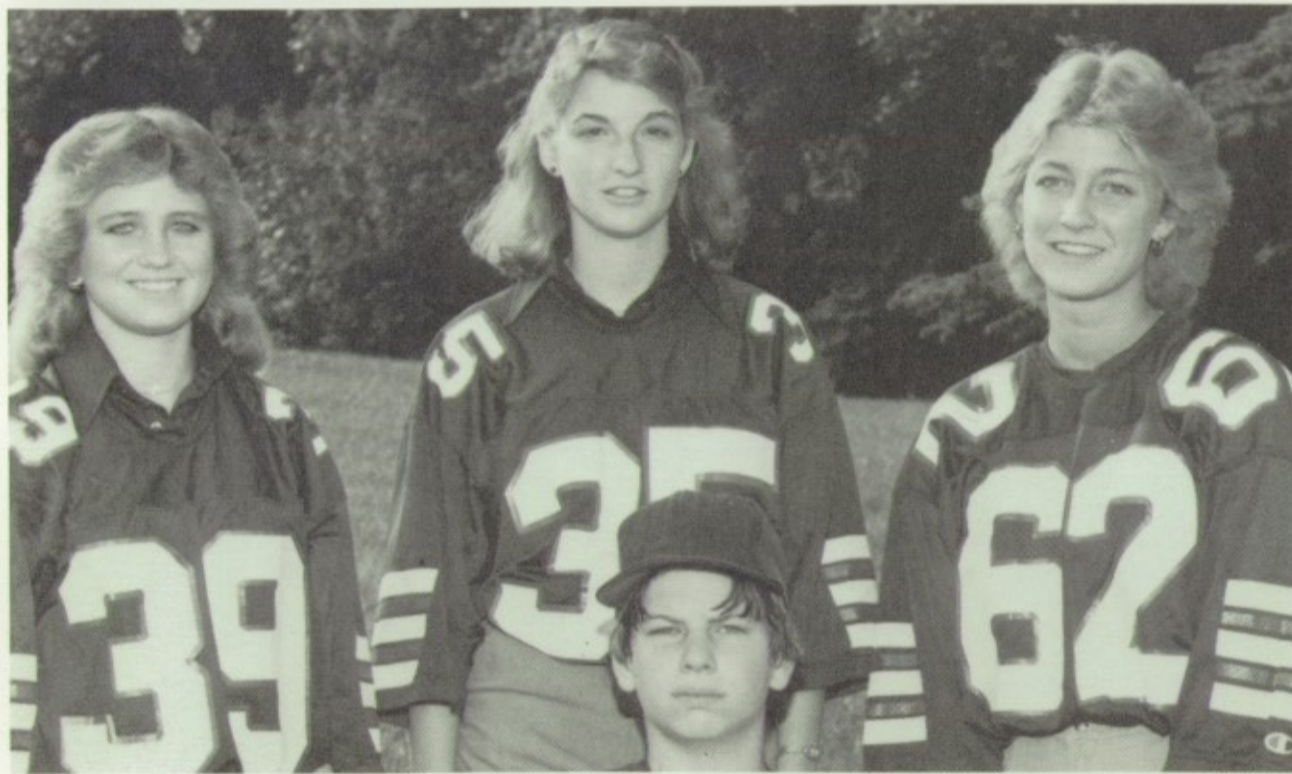

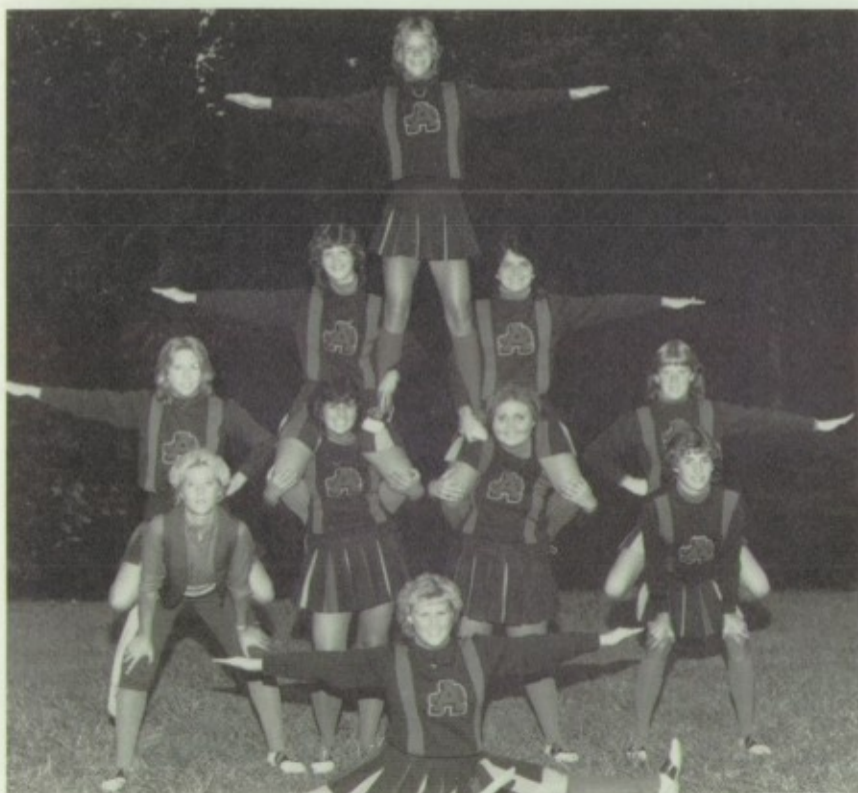

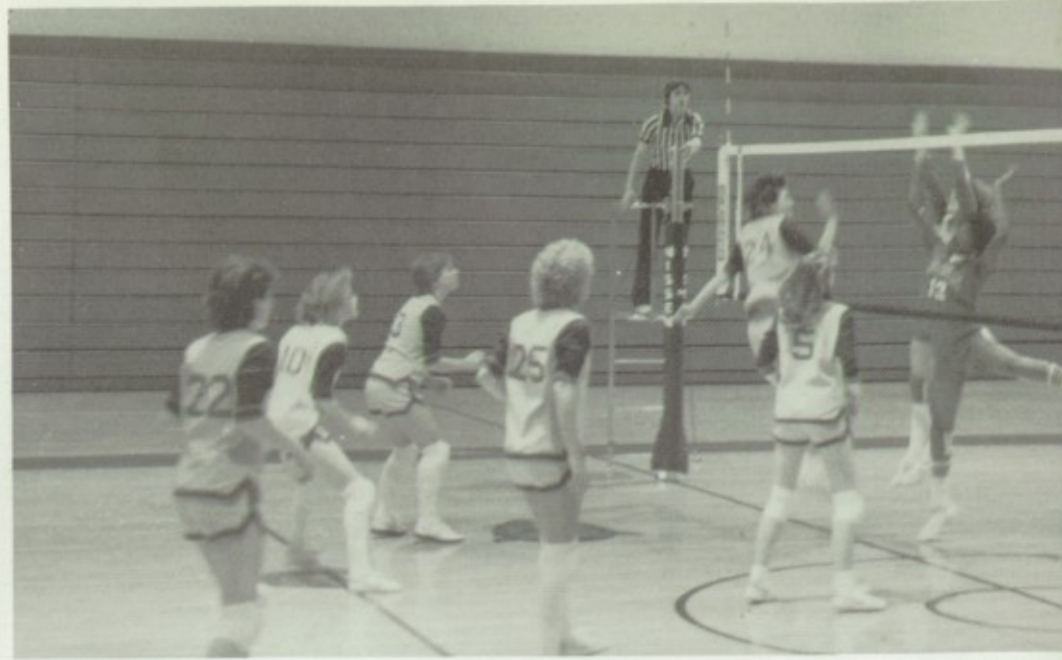

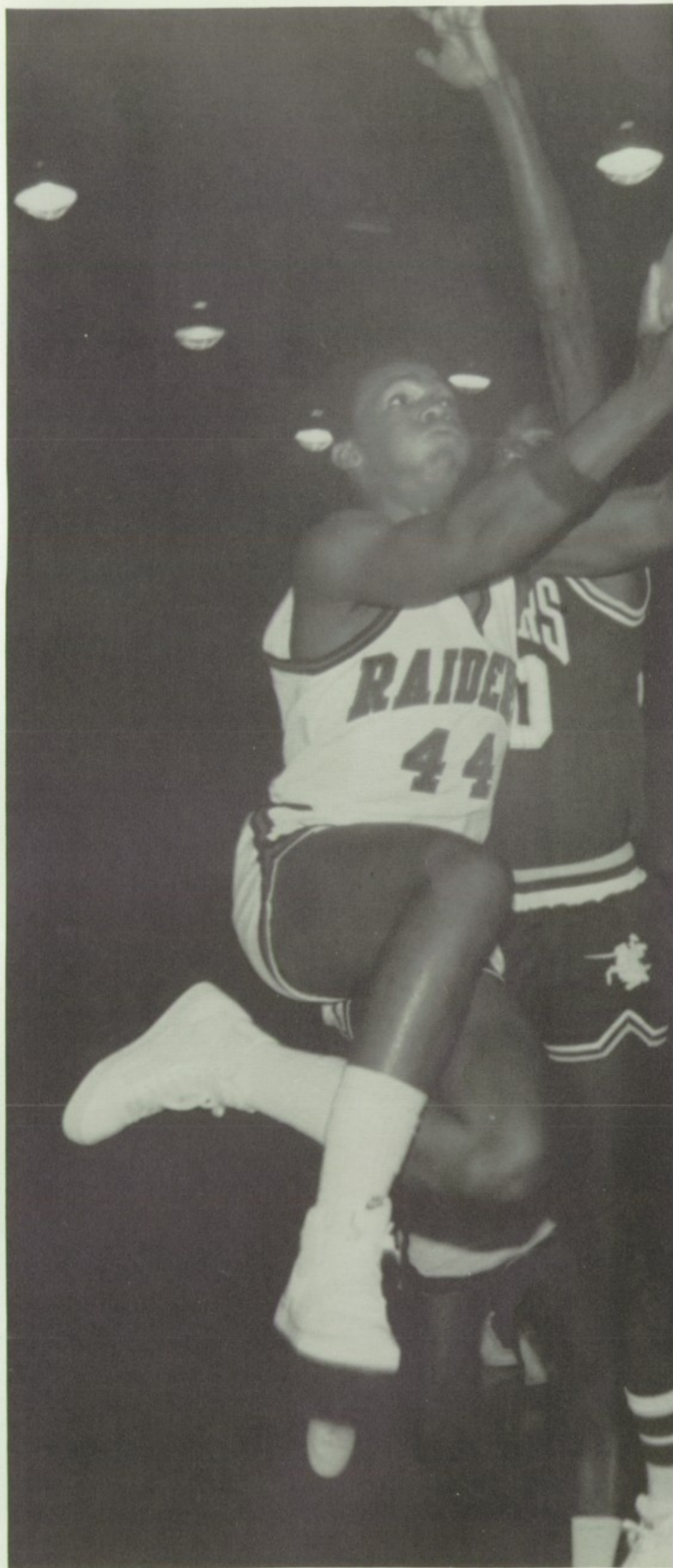

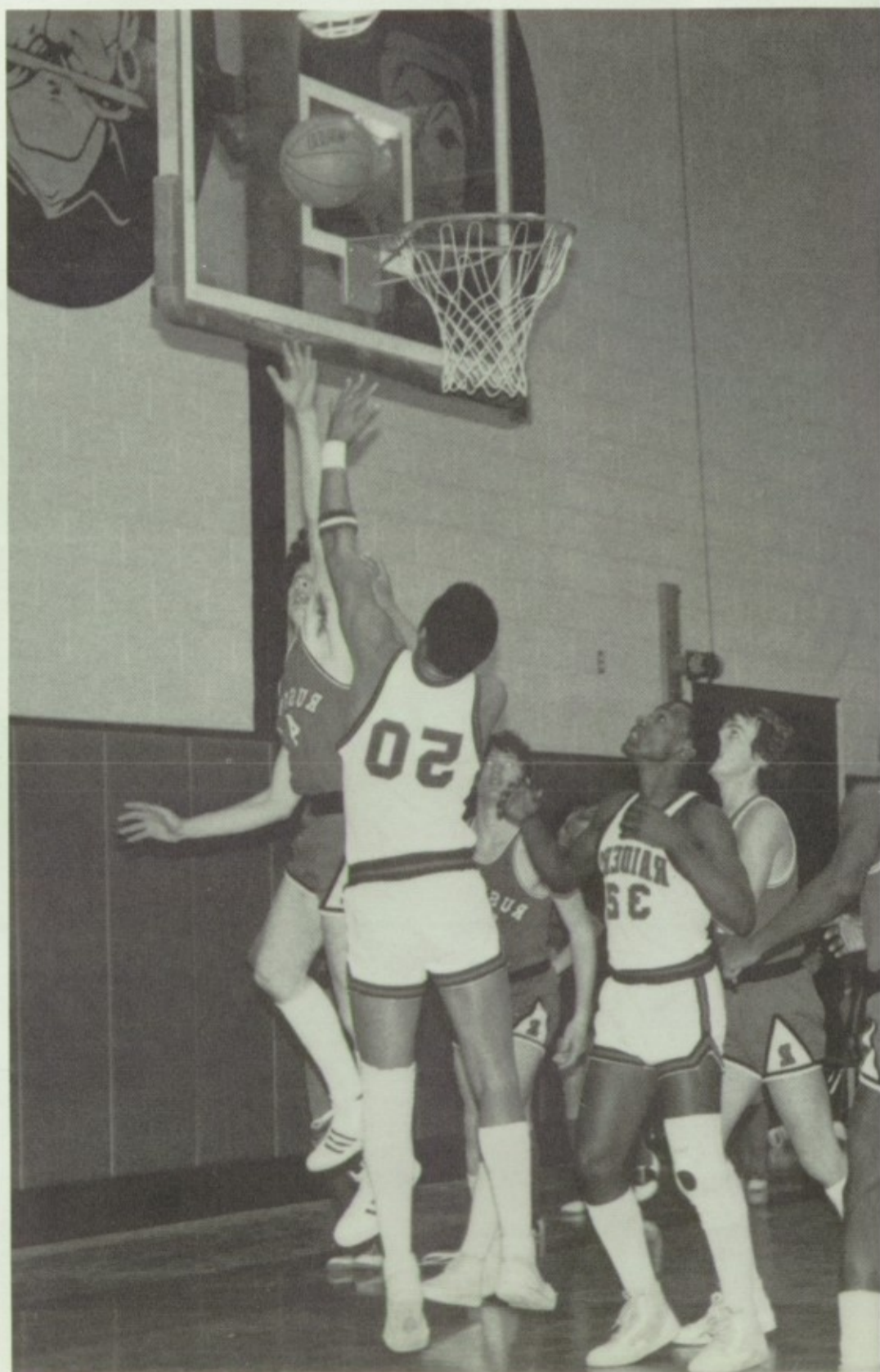

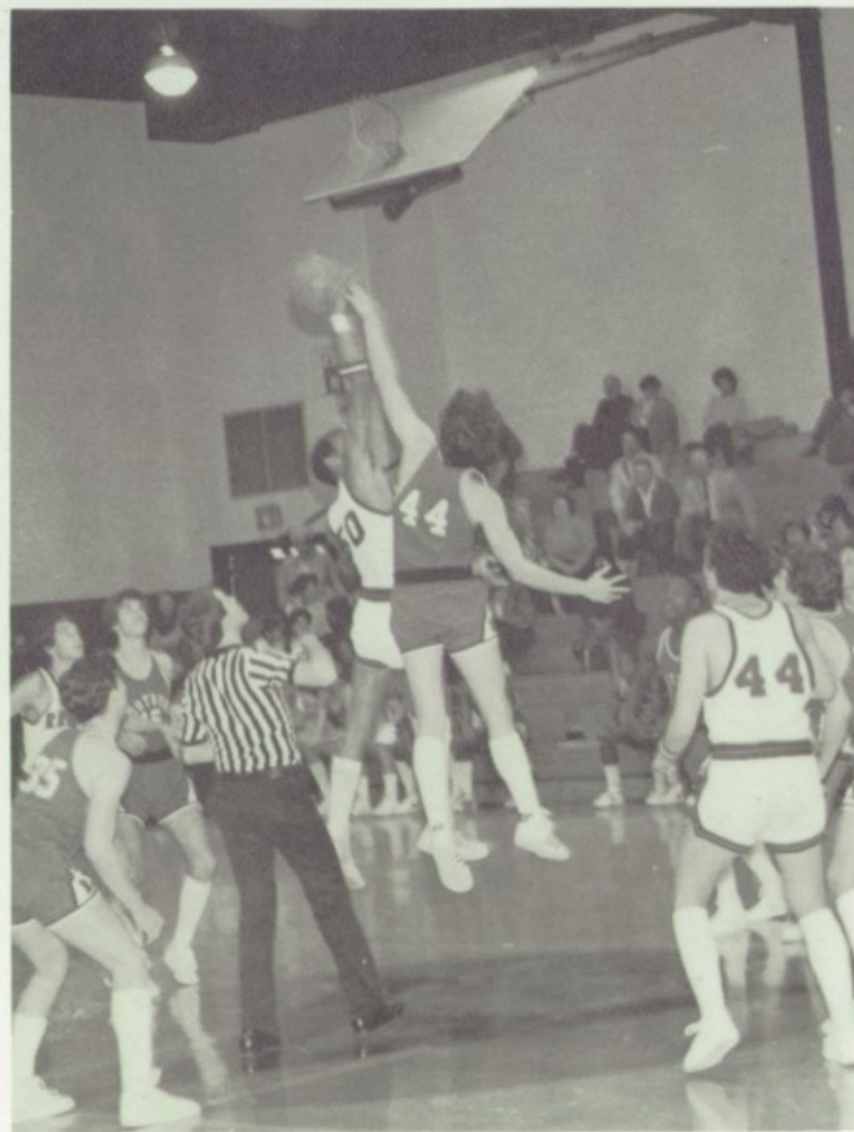


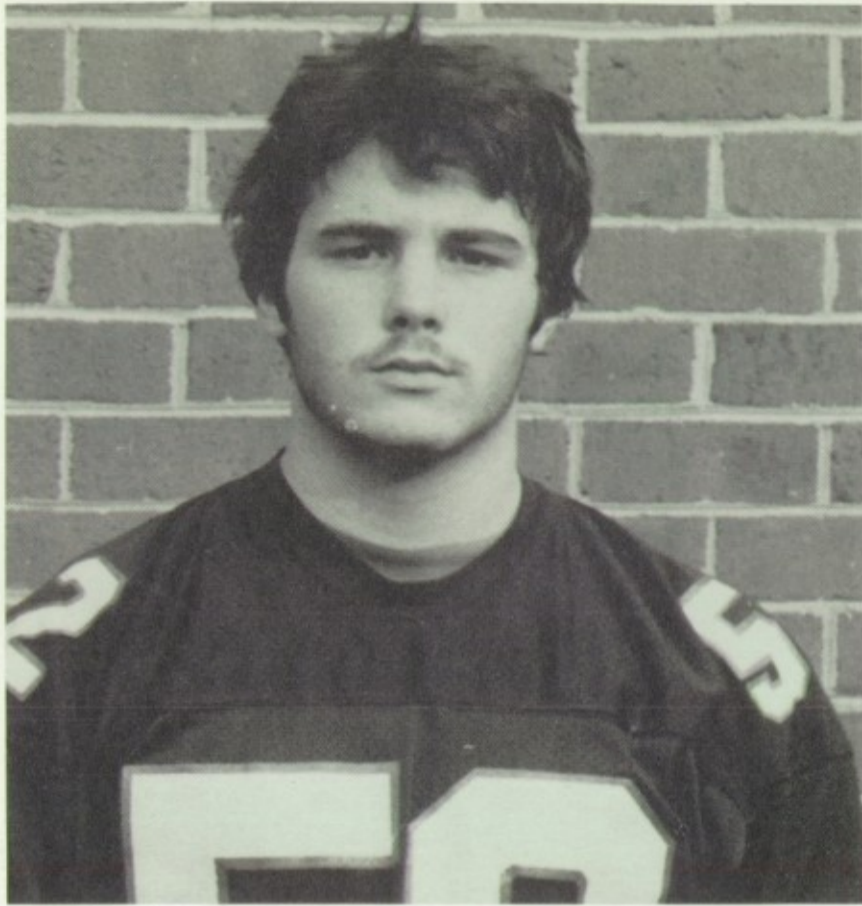

The Raider Boys' and Girls' Basketball teams both

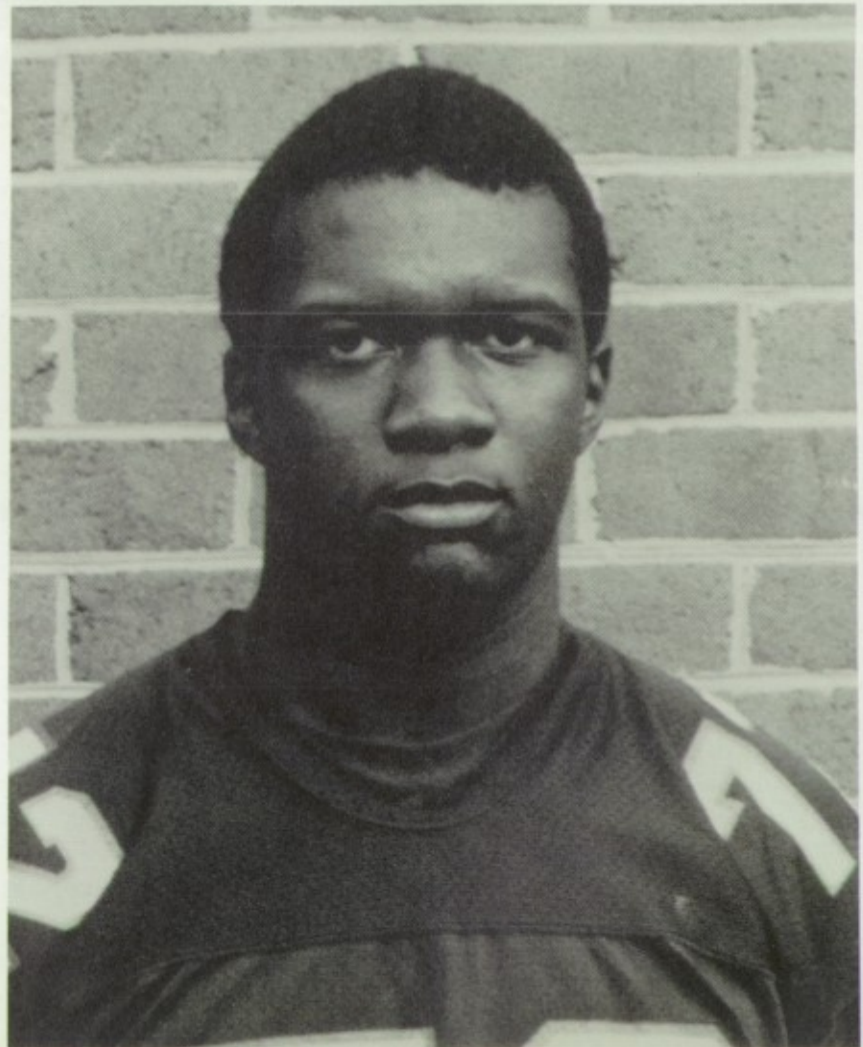
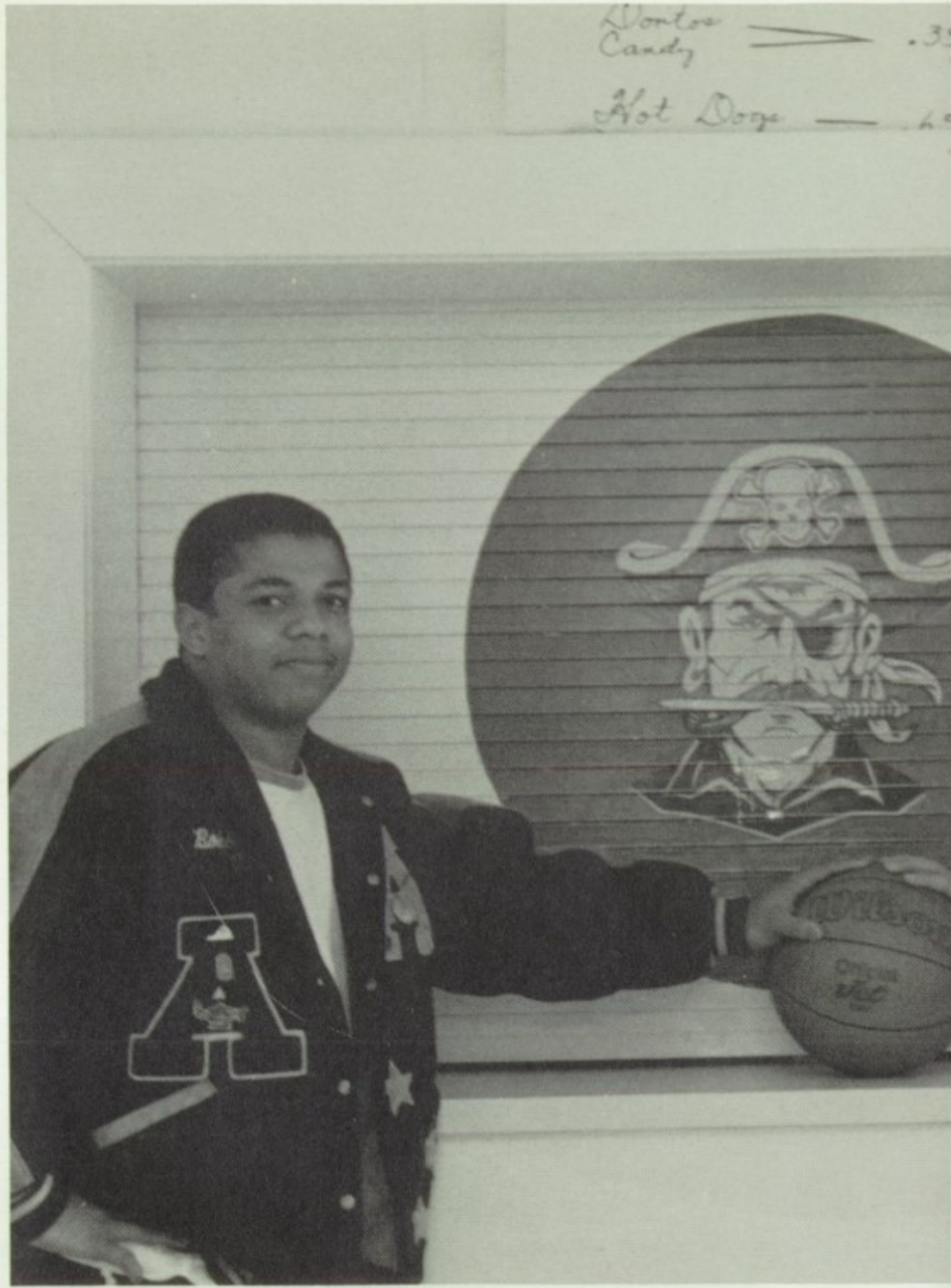

A moving moment came with their final appearance as the senior members performed for the last time at Baccalaureate.

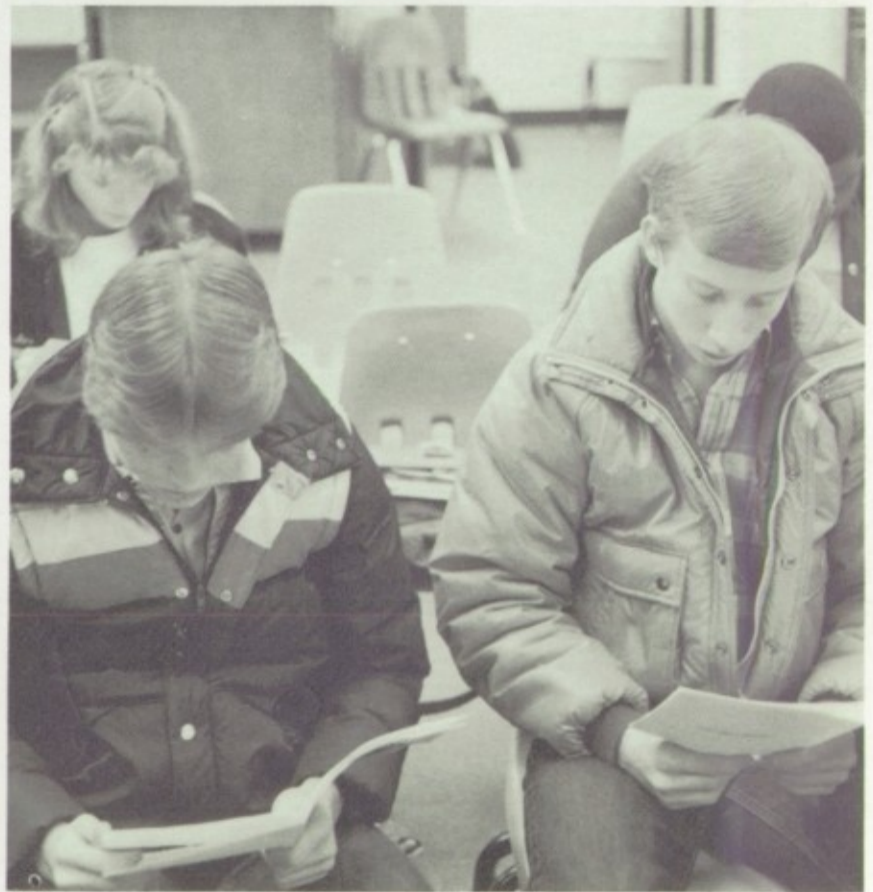

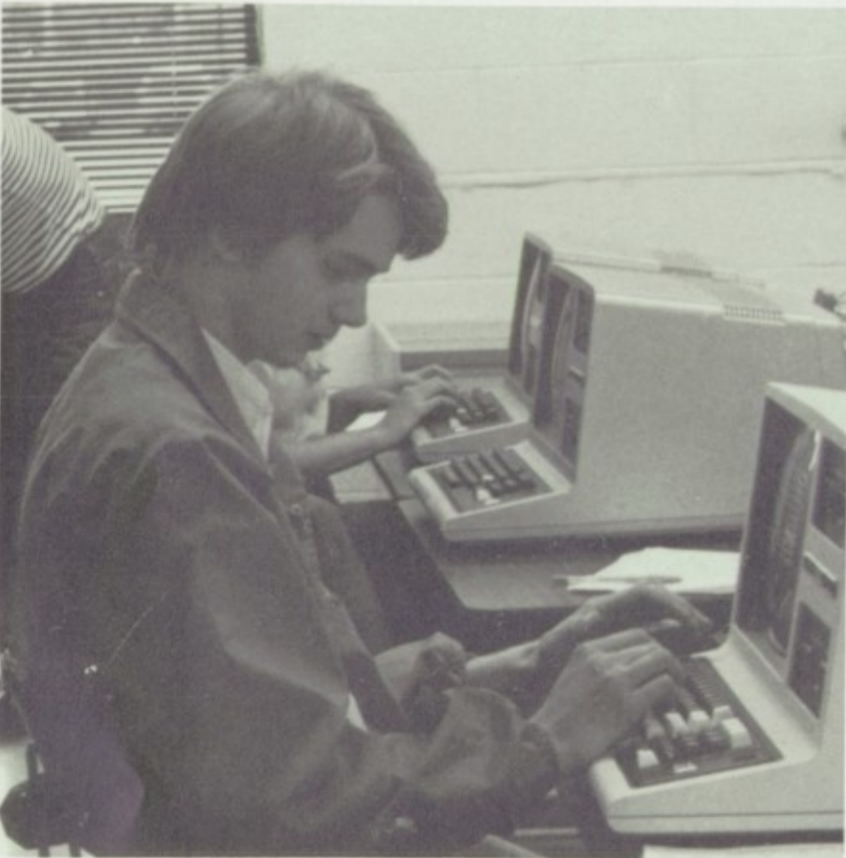

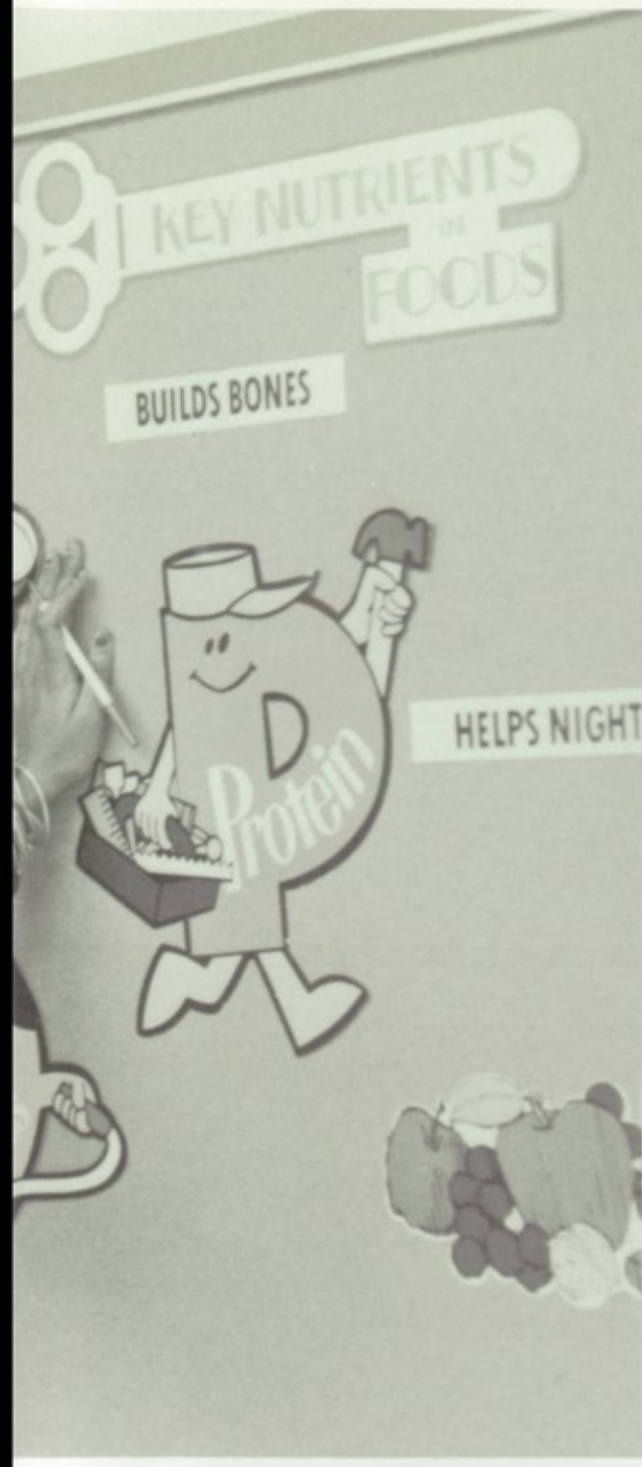

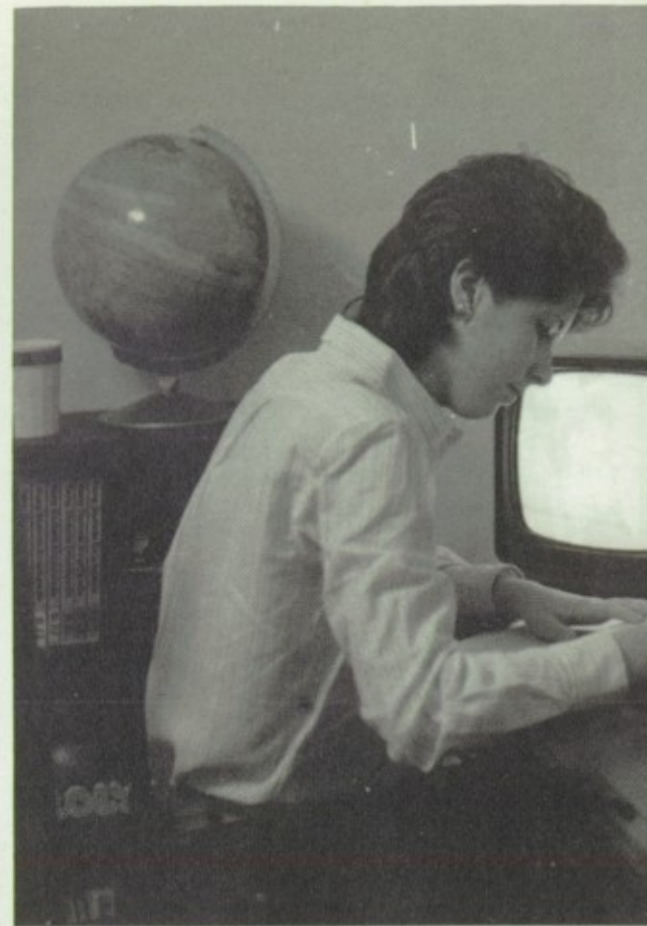

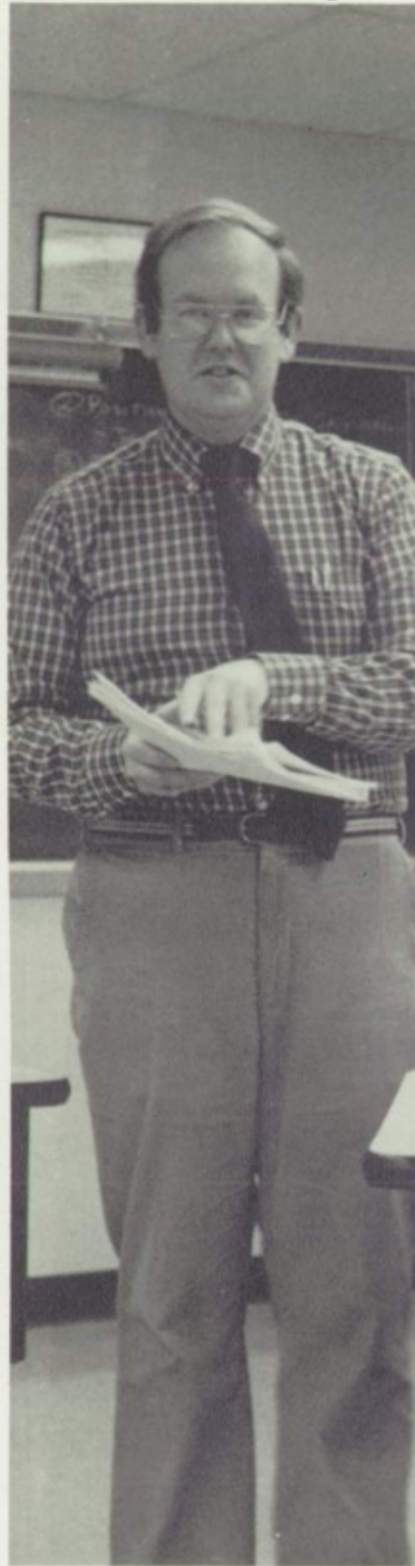
Carpe diem!

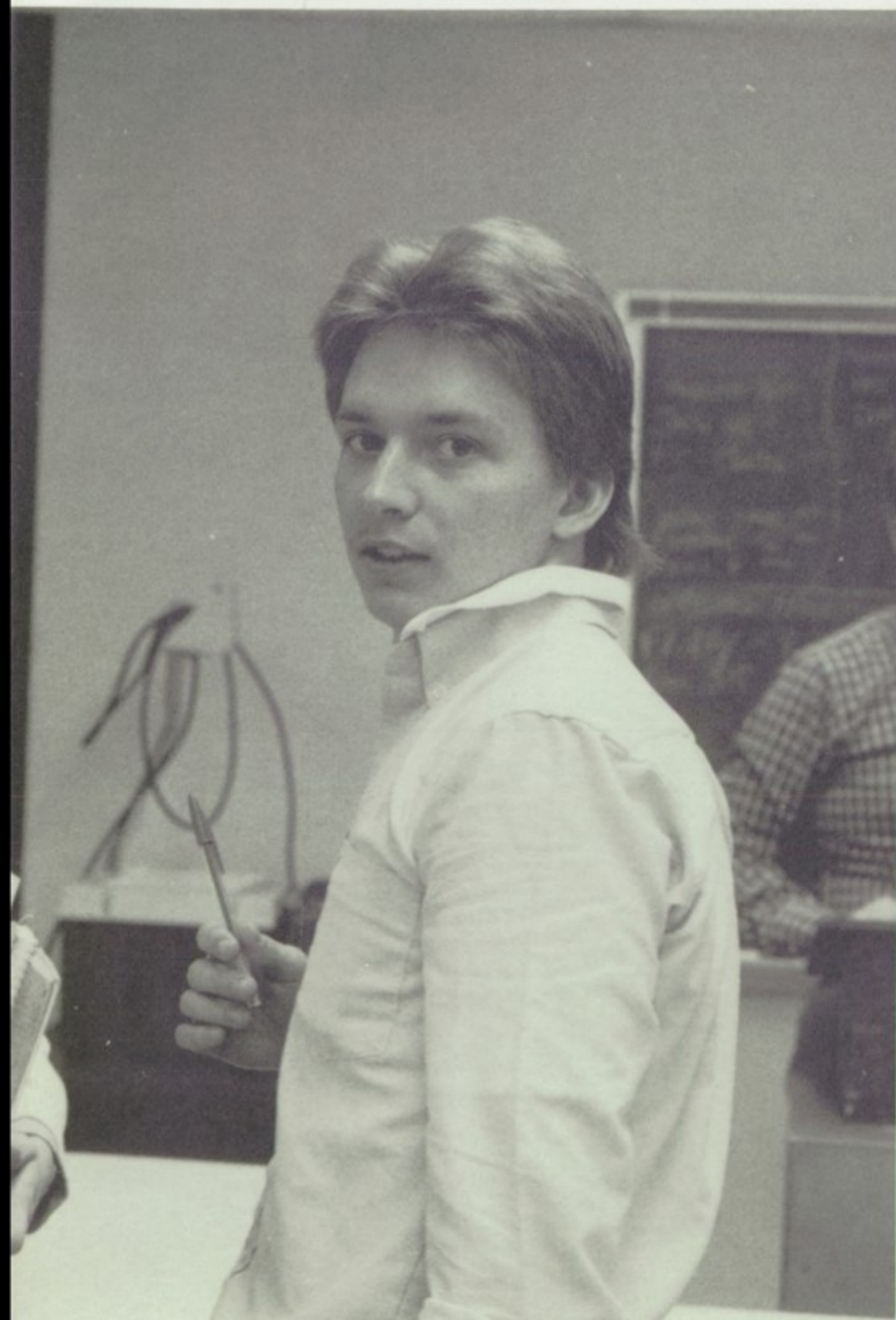

As a fund raiser the members of the club sold Christmas ornaments to earn money for the employee-employer banquet.

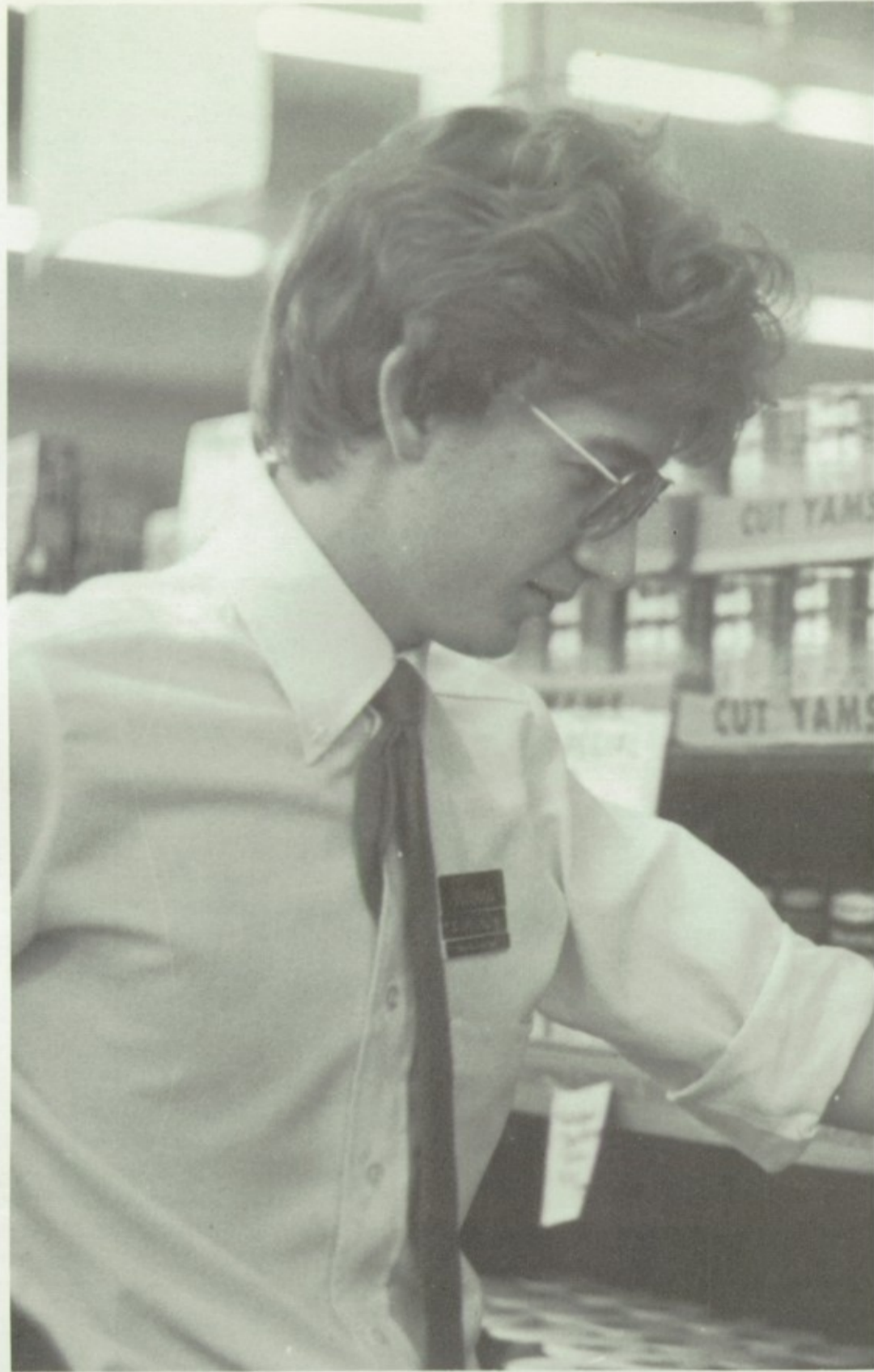

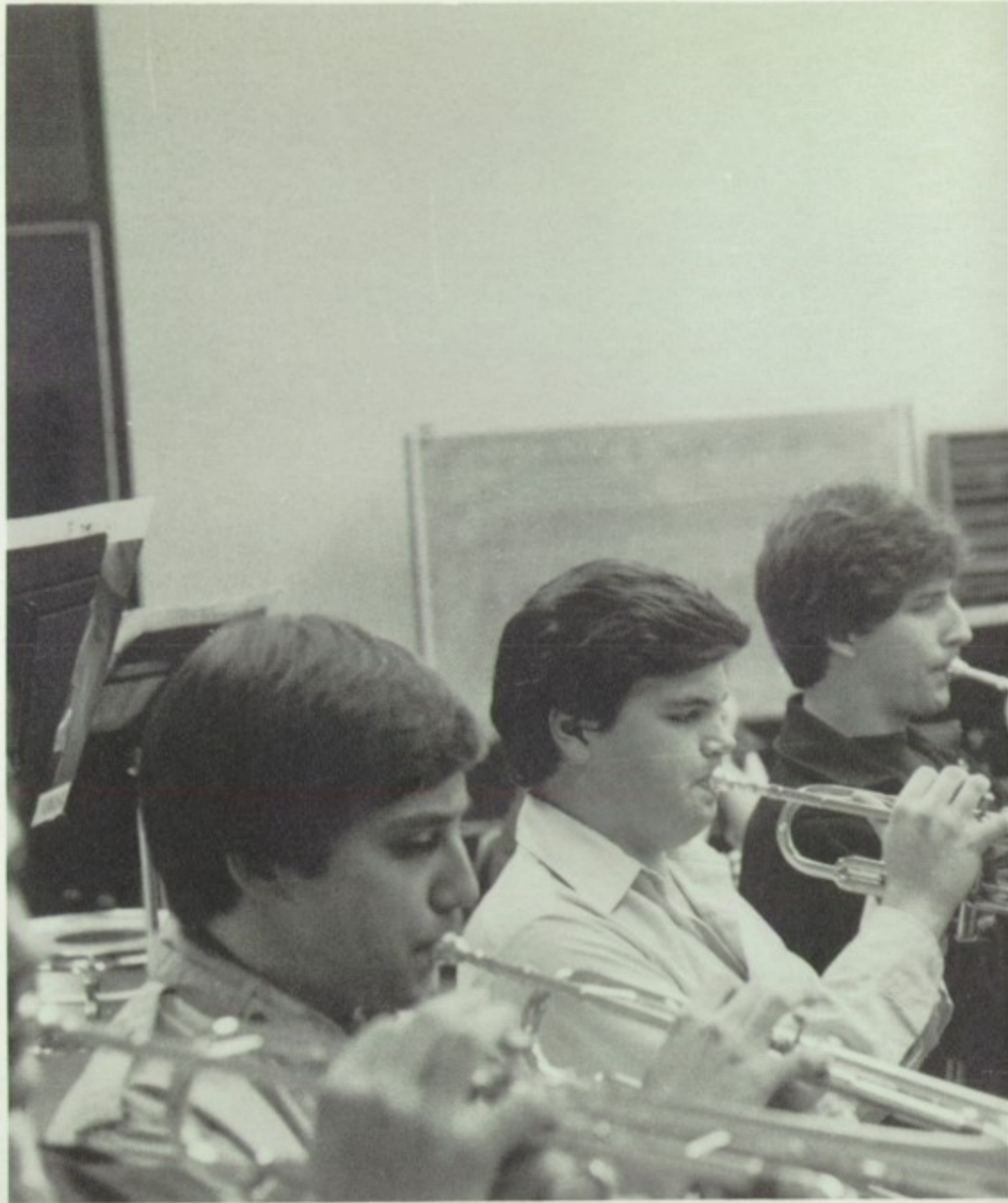
Regional Band tryouts brought results of who would be performing in either concert, band, or symphonic Band.

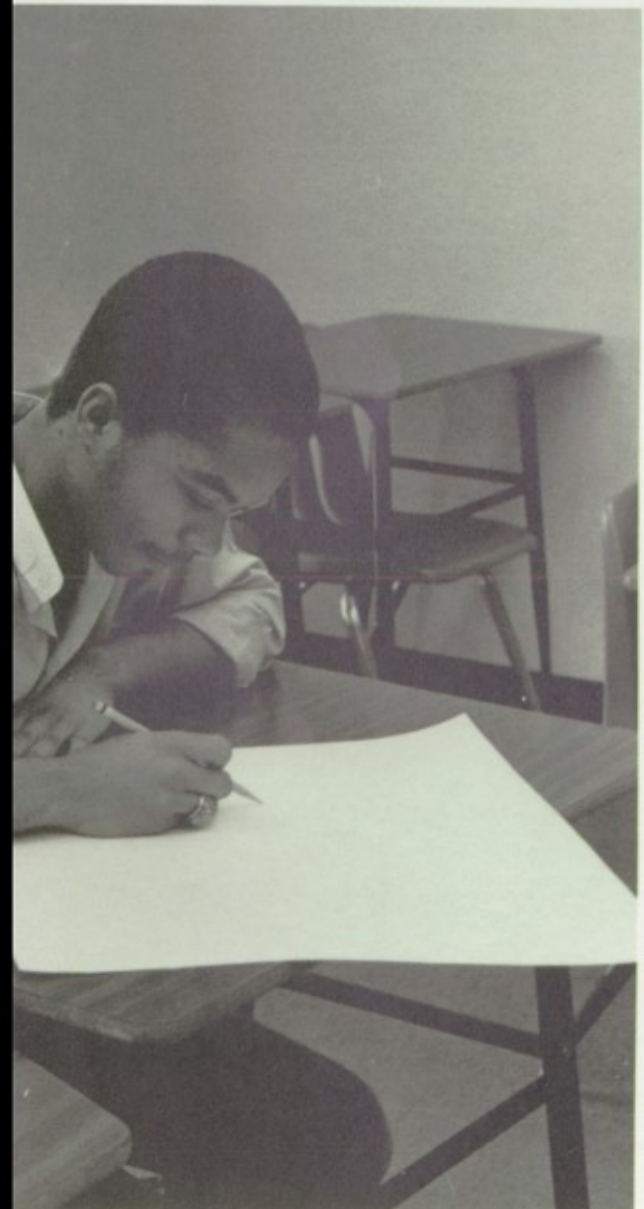

planned flowers for the concourse to beautify the school, as well as a trip to Washington, D.C.

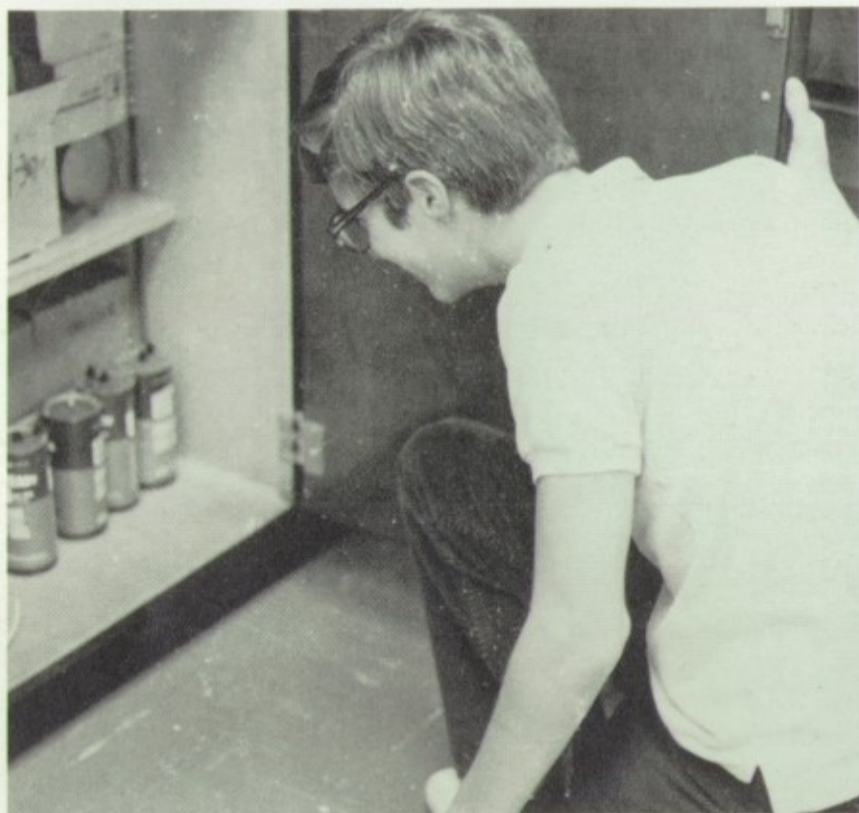

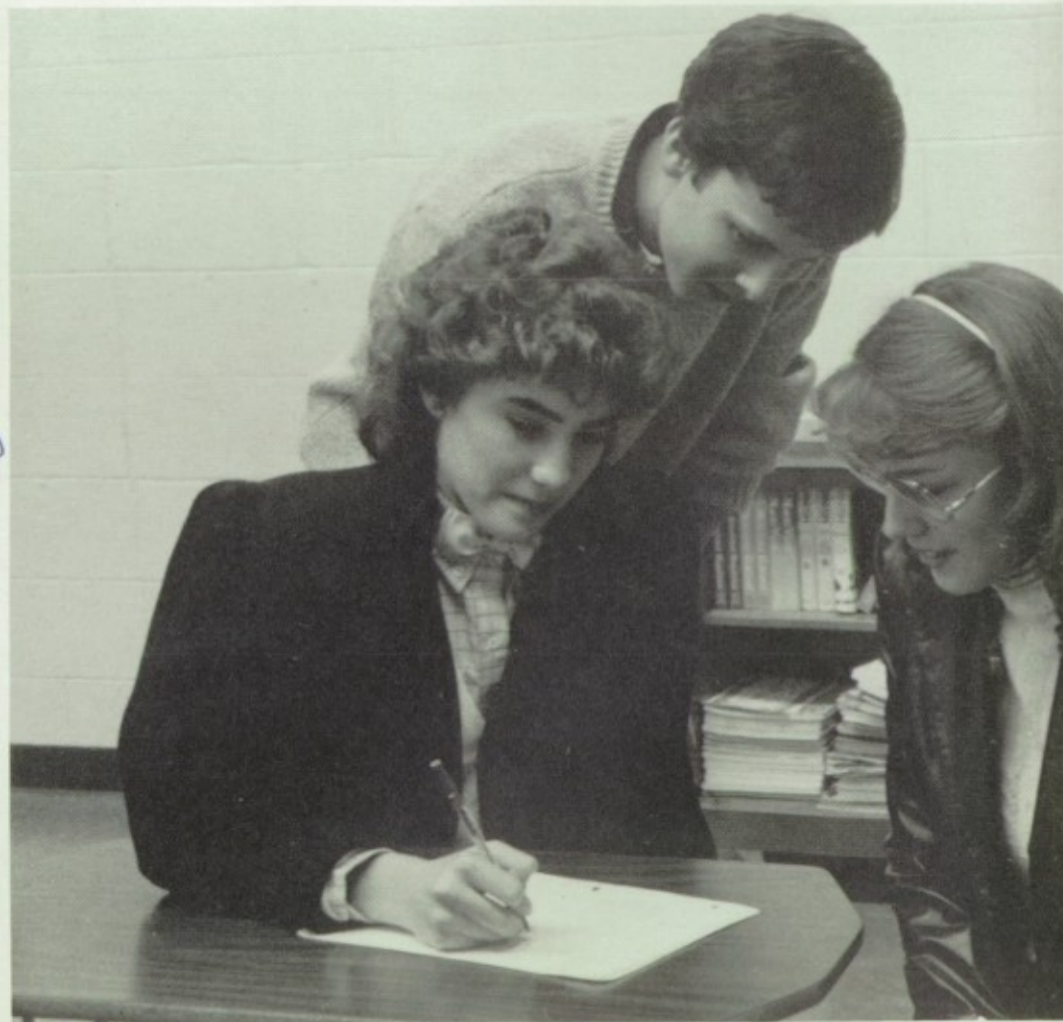

Still quite busy, the SCA made their final arrangements by getting ready for next year. They conducted a tour for orientation of the rising freshmen and held elections for new officers.

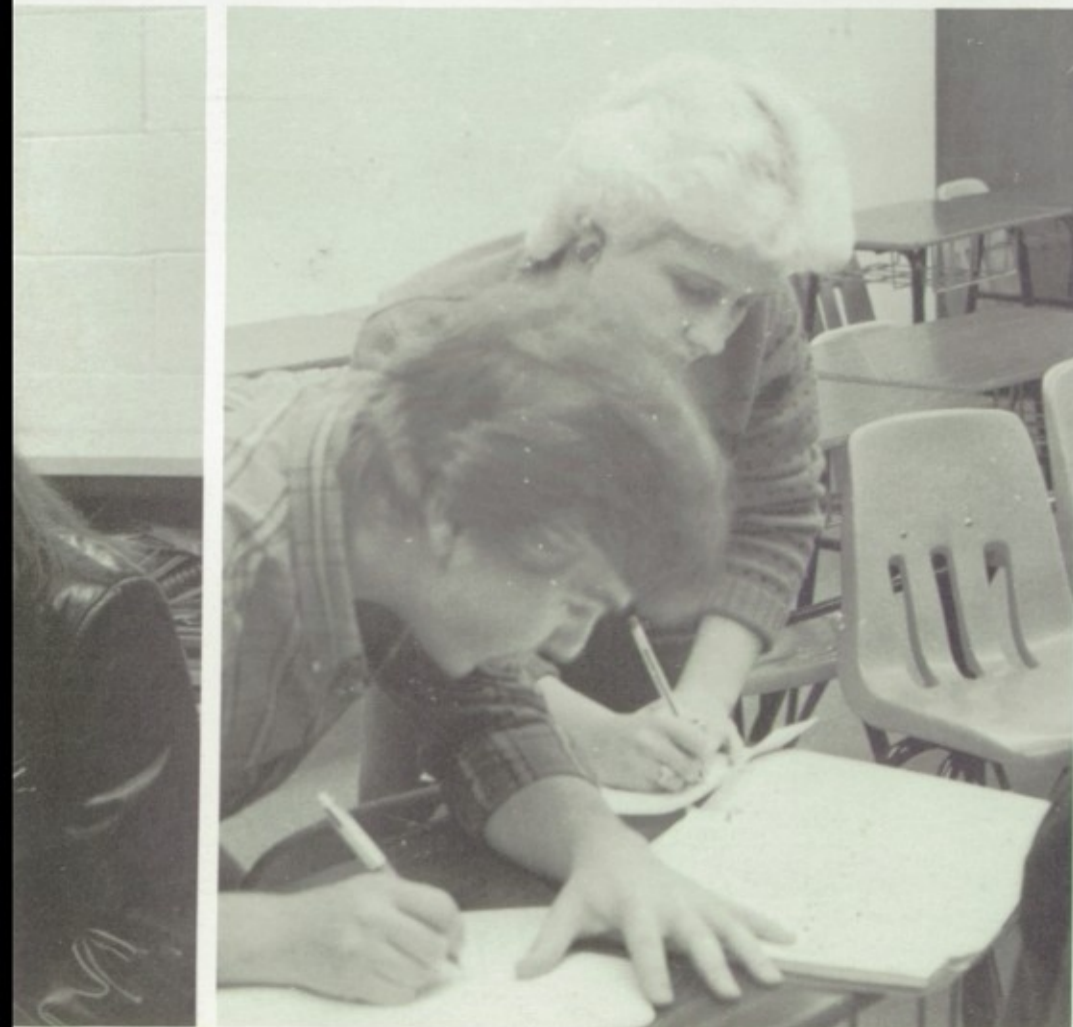

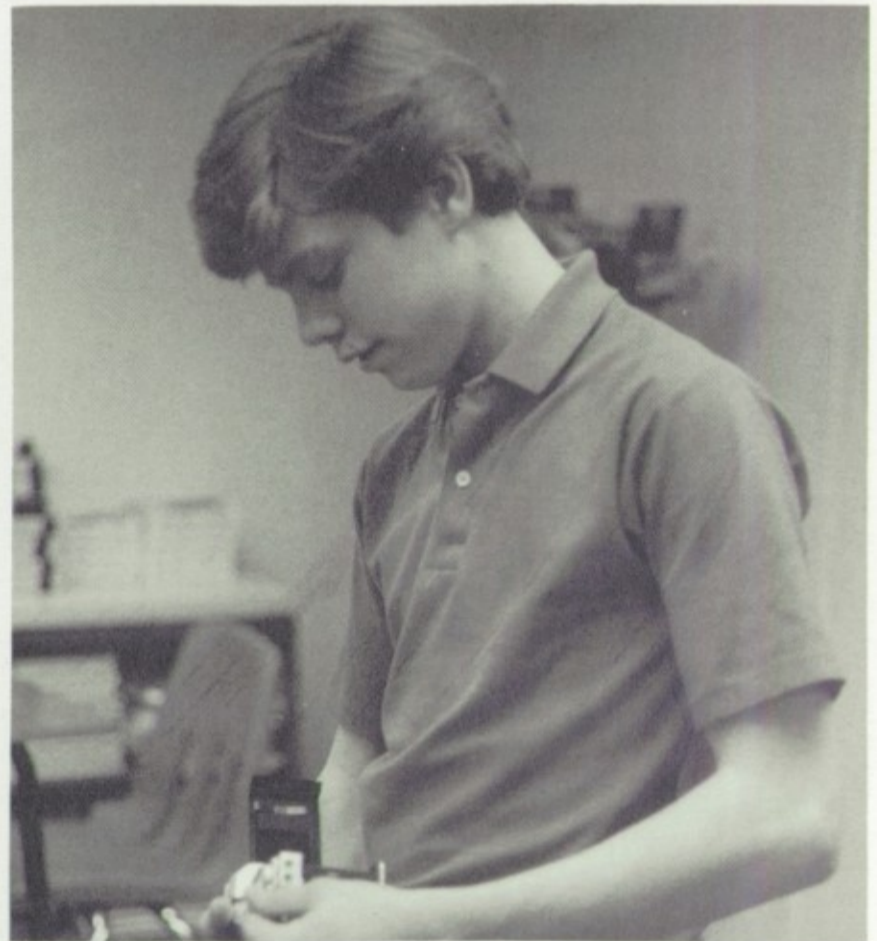
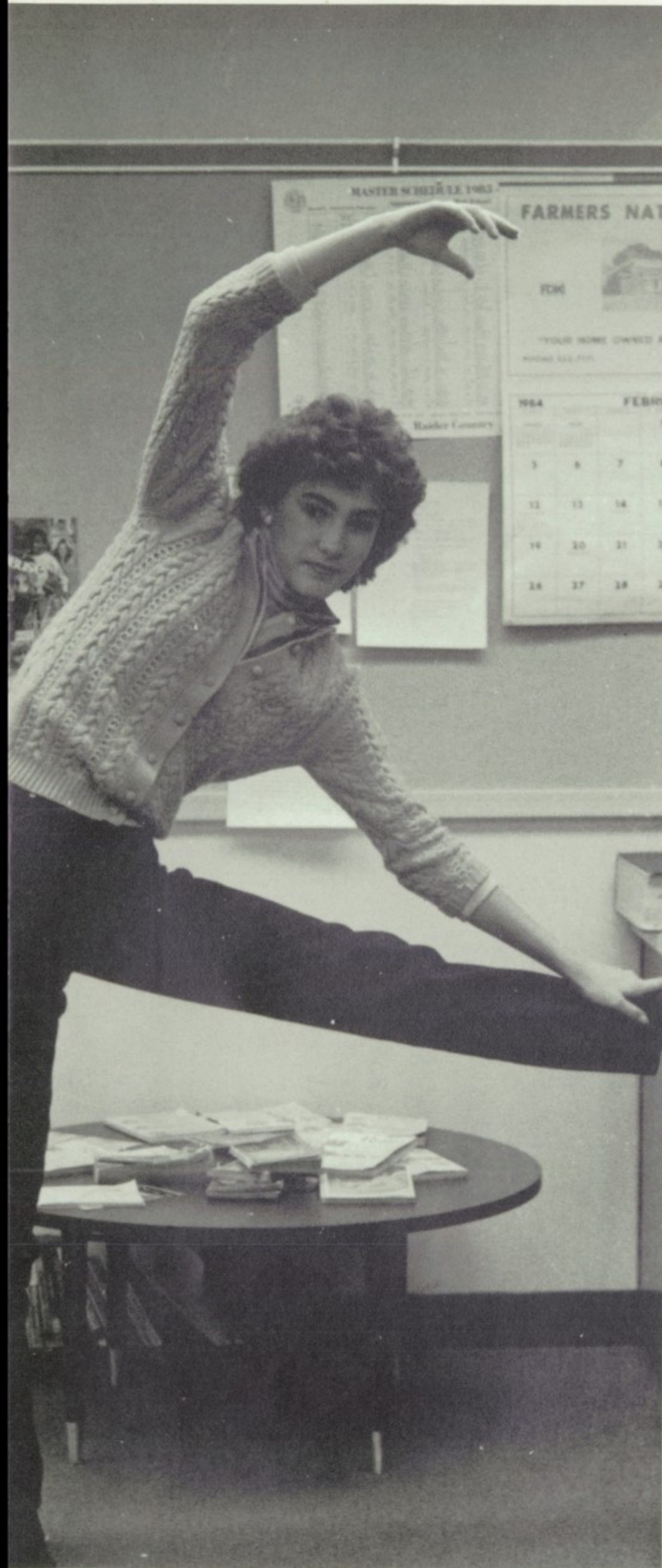

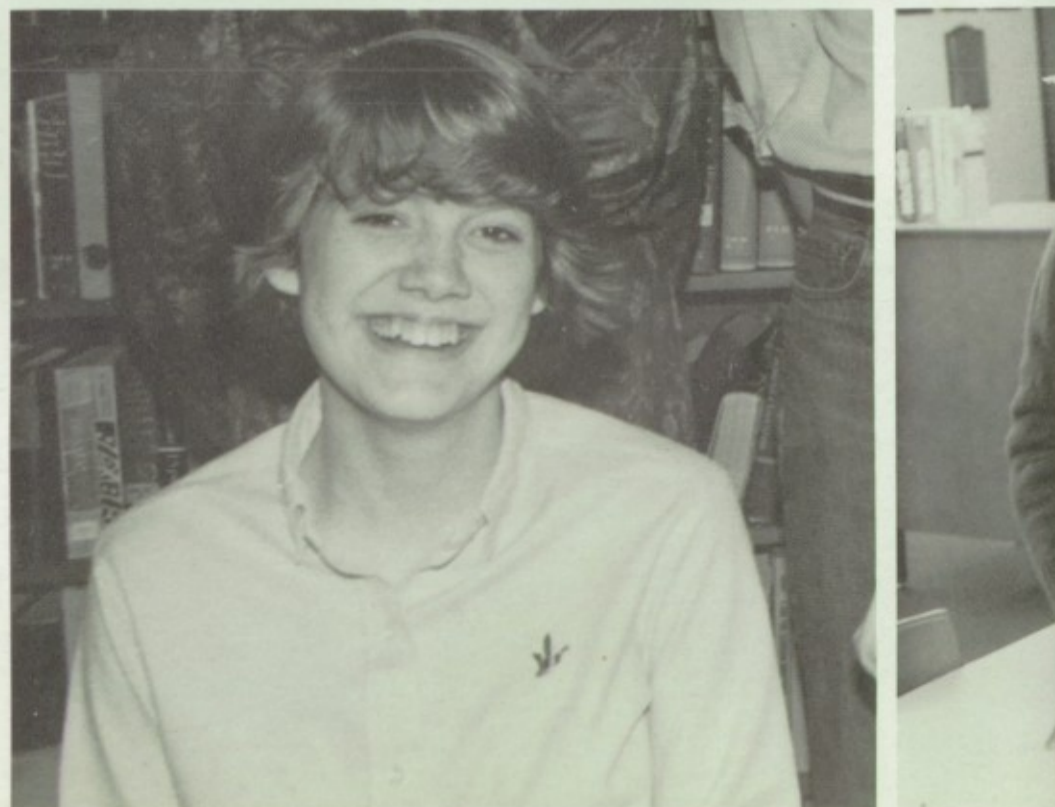
At the first meeting, members were told that they would have to work hard to have a good year. They put in a lot of time and effort to do just that. And their hard work and dedication paid off.

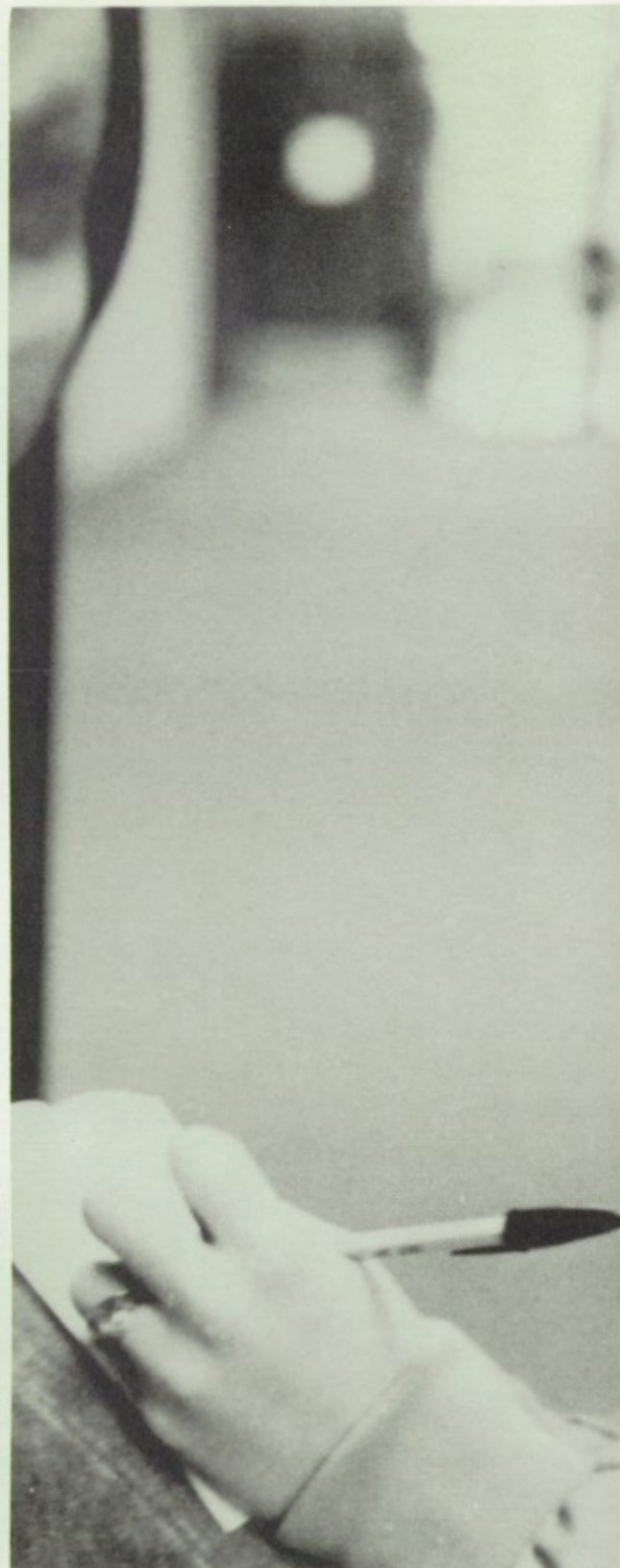
Even with the small number of members, the staff started a new activity, the radio show. The members all take part in this on Thursday afternoons.
